## RESOLUTION # 5

## MICROENTERPRISES ON PRESERVED FARMS

1	WHEREAS, the preservation of farmland in New Jersey is one of the
2	cornerstones of maintaining a thriving agricultural land base large enough to sustain the
3	agricultural sector of the state's economy into the future; and
4	WHEREAS, farmland preservation is most attractive to farmers if they have
5	some opportunities not traditionally or strictly related to farming remain open to them in
6	the future to help supplement their farm income; and
7	WHEREAS, legislation (A-2389) has been introduced and passed through the
8	Assembly Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee, and similar legislation (S-
9	2620) has been introduced in the Senate setting forth that "(a)ny person who owns
10	qualifying land may apply for a special permitto allow a rural microenterprise to occur
11	on the land."; and
12	WHEREAS, that legislation gives sole discretion for the review, granting or
13	denying of those applications to the State Agriculture Development Committee (SADC),
14	and further provides that the SADC shall, within 90 days of receiving such an
15	application, either approve, approve with conditions or deny the application; and
16	WHEREAS, the legislation establishes three categories of microenterprise
17	activities for which application can be made, including: (Class 1), which shall include
18	customary rural activities, which rely on the equipment and aptitude historically
19	possessed by the agricultural community, including, but not limited to, snow plowing,
20	bed and breakfasts, bakeries, woodworking, and craft-based businesses; (Class 2),
21	which shall include agriculture support services, which have a direct and positive
22	impact on agriculture by supplying needed equipment, supplies, and services to the
23	surrounding agricultural community, including, but not limited to, veterinary practices,

seed suppliers, and tractor or equipment repair shops; (Class 3) which shall include unrelated microenterprises, which have no direct relationship with the agricultural use of the property or the surrounding agricultural community, including, but not limited to, dog boarding services, professional office space, and personal training studios; and

WHEREAS, the creation of these microenterprises also would promote the saving and upkeep of older barns, as they would be the most likely locations for these businesses: and

WHEREAS, the legislation carries with it conditions and restrictions that, in the view of the Department of Agriculture, will constrain the microenterprises sufficiently to prevent them from becoming a point of contention that diminishes public support for the preservation of farmland through the use of public funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the delegates to the 100<sup>th</sup> State Agricultural Convention, assembled in Atlantic City, New Jersey, on February 4-5, 2015, do hereby support the passage by the Legislature and the signing by the Governor of A-2839 and S-2620.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that we urge the SADC to interpret the provisions of this legislation as broadly as possible to support the farmer and/or landowner making application under this measure, provided there is no clear evidence of degradation to the agricultural operation also occupying the property as a result of the establishment of the microenterprise.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that we call upon the agricultural community members who may make application under this measure to be mindful of the farreaching implications to further support of the use of public funds for the preservation of farmland when deciding upon the types and scope of microenterprises they propose.
