RESOLUTION #29

HIGHLANDS REGIONAL MASTER PLAN

1	WHEREAS, the Highlands Act, signed into law in August 2004, divided the
2	850,000-acre Highlands region into two areas: a preservation area, where development
3	would be strictly regulated, and a planning area, where development would be
4	monitored; and established a Highlands Water Protection and Planning Council charged
5	to prepare and implement a regional master plan for the entire Highlands region; and
6	WHEREAS, with lessons learned by the agricultural community in the Pinelands,
7	the Highlands law included significant relief for agricultural and horticultural activities and
8	related development in the preservation area, and as a result, agricultural development
9	and activities in the preservation area are part of a separate process from the strict
10	regulations that are imposed by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection
11	upon "major development" (defined as one-quarter acre of impervious cover or one acre
12	of any soil disturbance) in the preservation area; and
13	WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Agriculture developed and adopted
14	rules to implement the separate process for agricultural development and activities in the
15	Highlands Preservation Area; and
16	WHEREAS, 495 farms covering 40,321 acres of farmland had been preserved in
17	the Highlands region as of December 1, 2015 – 210 farms covering 16,257 acres in the
18	Preservation Area and 285 farms covering 24,064 acres in the Planning Area; and
19	WHEREAS, the Highlands Development Credit Bank Board has made offers to
20	purchase credits from 20 landowners meeting the hardship criteria since the initial HDC
21	purchase program was established in September 2009, and of those, 17 landowners'
22	credits were purchased resulting in the preservation of 603 acres while three landowners
23	chose not to proceed; and

WHEREAS, of the 65 towns and five counties to apply for Highlands Regional Master Plan conformance review, 47 municipalities and two counties have received approval from the Highlands Council for their conformance plans.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the delegates to the 101st

State Agricultural Convention, assembled in Atlantic City, New Jersey, on February 1011, 2016, urge the Department to continue to monitor and contribute to the future implementation of the Highlands TDR program and Plan Conformance process in order to maximize program success and provide equity protection for affected landowners.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we support the TDR Conservation Restriction developed in coordination with the Department and the Highlands Development Credit Bank Board and approved by the Highlands Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage the continued coordination between the State TDR Bank and the HDC Bank Board to further the implementation of TDR programs in the Highlands and statewide.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we applaud the Legislature's extension of the dual appraisal valuation process through June 30, 2019 for farms in the Highlands region, a measure that was signed into law by Governor Christie in February 2015. The process allows appraisals for farmland preservation acquisitions in the Highlands to be based on either current zoning and environmental laws and regulations or those in effect as of January 1, 2004 – whichever yields the higher value.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we support the new Highlands Open Space Partnership Funding and Highlands Development Credit Purchase Program that establish new programs for land acquisition and purchase of HDCs, initially funded through money received by the Highlands Council as mitigation for linear utility projects.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we support the Department's involvement in the Regional Master Plan (RMP) Monitoring Program to evaluate progress in achieving the goals of the RMP through the implementation of its policies and programs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we strongly urge the Governor, Senate President and Assembly Speaker to consider the agricultural background, knowledge and/or experience of any new potential Highlands Council members, as well as their residency, to ensure that farmers in the preservation area – who are most directly affected by the RMP – have additional representation on the Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage the Governor to do a complete independent review of the Highlands Act and its programs as to its effect on the Highlands Region municipalities, economy and agricultural viability.
