

**EARLY NOTICE AND PUBLIC REVIEW OF A PROPOSED  
ACTIVITY IN A 100-YEAR FLOODPLAIN**

To: All Interested Agencies, Groups & Individuals

This is to give notice that the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) on behalf of the Responsible Entity, the New Jersey Economic Development Agency (NJEDA), has determined that the following proposed actions under the Neighborhood Community Revitalization Program (NCR) are located in the 100-year floodplain, and NJDEP will be identifying and evaluating practicable alternatives to locating the actions in the floodplain and the potential impacts on the floodplain from the proposed actions, as required by Executive Order 11988, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands.

The NCR program funds projects that contribute to the economic revitalization throughout New Jersey. These projects are commercial or mixed use projects, typically development and public improvement or streetscape revitalization.

Proposed NCR Project Number NCR40022: This Recreation, Cultural and Parkland Amenities project will rebuild, reinforce and revitalize the South Green Street Park, following its destruction by Superstorm Sandy. The storm significantly affected the waterfront areas of Tuckerton with storm surge and flooding, wind damage and coastal erosion. The park is located at 1300 South Green Street, encompassing approximately 1.1 acres. The principal resiliency components of this project include new mobile public restrooms to replace the former permanent restrooms that were destroyed by the storm, and a new vinyl non-polluting bulkhead to reinforce and harden the waterfront of the park. The entirety of the project area is located within Special Flood Hazard Area Zones AE, as shown on the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) number 34029C0579F dated September 29, 2006.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public education tool. Commenters are encouraged to offer alternative methods to serve the same project purpose, and methods to minimize and mitigate impacts. The dissemination of information and request for public comment about floodplains can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplains, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.
