Did YOU know?? Our Youth Advocates surveyed over 200 youth. Of those who said they had ever been homeless, 26 said they were able to stay with a friend or family, 11 had to sleep outside and 10 went to a shelter.



- 116 unique community attendees participated in the Charrette
  - 75 Participated in the Housing Option fishbowl
  - 48 Participated in the Education and Training fishbowl
  - 45 Participated in the Permanency fishbowl
  - 39 Participated in the Specific Populations fishbowl
- 23 experts shared their experience, research and best practices
- 26 staff represented YARH Steering Committee membership
- More than 43 pages of notes
- 55 recommendations to improve policy, practice and results for youth in the child welfare system – Coming Soon!

# A Note from our Youth Advocate Shaquanna:

As adolescents, you are constantly seen as teens just trying to find their place in this big world, but trust me it is hard to do it alone. I have tried to fit into this world alone, and do it all alone, just because I did not want to ask for help at times. It is okay to ask for help. It does not mean you are corny, or there's something wrong with you. You just need someone to show you the way. Sometimes we need that extra push, or someone to pull things out of our way so that we can see clearly. When I have asked for help and advice on certain things, support came along with it. For the first time, I actually did not feel so alone. Having support strengthens your skills, abilities, and makes you strive even harder for your goals. It feels good to know that someone is there to push, and cheer you on to the finish line. Based on my experience, support systems are efficient. However, it is truly up to you to use the support that you helped build.
