




Rhododendron viscosum

common in wet soils in Pine Barrens white flowers bloom late spring

Vaccinium corymbosum

- Height up to 15 feet
- Seed

1/2 inch dark blue berries in clusters

Facts New Jersey state fruit bees make honey from flowers





Betula nigra 'Cully'

40-70 feet

3 inch cylindrical nutlet


thrives in moist soil along streams papery bark



Height 20-25 feet Seed 1/2 inch capsule Facts exfoliating bark, dark pink blossoms in late summer

up to 20 feet 1 inch pome

tart fruit made into jelly in the fall fragrant white spring flowers



Height Seed Facts Prickly Pear actus

Opuntia humifusa

1 - 2 inches pulpy red fruit NJ's only wild cactus edible flowers in early summer



Aronia arbutifolia

Height	2-10 feet
Seed	1/4 inch red pome
Facts	hardy, native shrub grows in damp soils







Cornus florida

Seed

Height 20-40 feet

1/3 inch red drupe, clusters of 3 or 4

Facts striking fall color showy white blossoms in spring





Cornus mas

20-25 feet 1/2 inch red drupe in clusters vellow flowers in early spring

yellow flowers in early spring fruit eaten by birds in summer






Facts can grow 6 feet per year deciduous conifer, loses needles






Fraser Fir

distinctive dark green soft needles excellent Christmas tree



toothed leaves appear in summer



Abies concolor

- Height 30-50 feet, over 125 feet in the wild
- Seed

often used as a Christmas tree may live to 350 years

up to 130 feet pea-sized yellow-green drupe over 150 million years old leaf and kernel used medicinally

Ilex glabra

- Height 3-8 feet
- Seed Facts

1/4 inch drupe, green then black Mockingbirds and Thrushes eat fruit leathery evergreen leaves

Blue Prince and Princess olly

5-8 feet

1/4 inch berries in clusters on princess

dark, shiny, blue-green foliage evergreen ornamental shrub



Canadian emlock

Tsuga canadensis

Facts

Height	70-100 feet
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Seed 1/2-1 inch cone

> extremely shade tolerant susceptible to woolly adelgid defoliation

Ostrya virginiana

- Height 25-40 feet
- Seed Facts

1/3 inch nutlet in pod, clustered also called Hornbeam thin, gray, shredding bark



Red Cedar uniperus Juniperus virginiana

40-50 feet

1/4 - 3/8 inch berry-like cone


pioneer evergreen, aromatic wood, 50 different bird species eat berries

entucky Coffeetree Gymnocladus dioicus

Height 60-75 feet

Seed 5-10 inch dark red pod

Facts seeds used as a coffee substitute poisonous, but safe after roasting






Larix laricina

Height 50-60 feet

Seed 3/4 - 1 inch egg shaped cone

Facts deciduous conifer, called Tamarack pitch used to heal wounds





Kalmia latifolia

6-10 feet

1/4 inch round capsule

showy, pink-spotted flowers hard brittle wood used for pulleys



Kalmia angustifolia

Height up to 3 feet

Seed 1/4 inch oblong capsule

Facts poisonous to animals and humans called lambs-kill, sprouts after fire





Magnolia stellata

- Height 10-20 feet
- Seed 4 inch cylindrical cluster

Facts Japanese origin brilliant star-shaped flowers







Magnolia grandiflora

up to 80 feet

4 inch egg-shaped red cluster


broad-leafed evergreen rusty hairs on underside of leaves



Height 40-50 feet

Seed 1 - 1 2/3 inch samara

Facts deep red leaves planted as an ornamental shade tree






Quercus rubrum

- Height 70-90 feet
- Seed 3/4 to 1 inch acorn

Facts New Jersey's state tree acorns important food for wildlife



hardy, often used as an urban tree continuous center trunk






Diospyros virginiana

Facts

- Height 30-60 feet
- Seed 1 1 1/2 inch berry

also called possum-wood sweet fruit, ripens in fall after frost





Pinus echinata

t 80-100 feet

1 1/2 - 2 1/2 inch cone

also called smooth-bark pine important timber tree




Chaenomeles speciosa

Height up to 10 feet Seed 2-3 inch pon

marmalade made from fruit blooms red flowers in early spring

rhododendron means "red tree" evergreen

does not seed

bronze leaves in the fall bright pink flowers in mid-spring



Height 6-20 feet Seed Facts

1/3-1/2 inch pome, ripens to purple

salt tolerant, early white blossoms edible fruit





Picea omorika

- Height up to 100 feet
- Seed

Facts

2 1/2 inch purplish cone

white bands on underside of needles landscape ornamental





Liquidambar styraciflua

Height 50-75 feet

 $1-1 \frac{1}{2}$ inch spike ball

turns yellow, purple, or red in fall corky winged bark



Liriodendron tulipifera

Height up to 200 feet

Seed 2-3 inch samara cluster

Facts tallest tree in New Jersey instruments are made from wood



American Elm Imus americana

Height 60-80 feet

Seed

1/2 inch disc-shaped samara

Facts susceptible to Dutch elm disease this is a disease resistant strain



7-10 feet

1/3 inch oblong drupes in clusters semi-evergreen lustrous leaves very fragrant white flowers

Viburnum x burkwoodii




Height Seed Facts

9-12 feet1/3 inch oblong drupes in clusters

branches form large flat tiers white flower bunches in May
