174%	New Jersey Taxpayers pay 174% percent more to cover the cost of health insurance for state workers than the average New Jersey private-sector employer pays for their employees – an average of \$16,525 more per employee family.
\$2.8 Billion	In Fiscal Year 2014, the State made a health benefit payment of roughly \$2.8 billion representing 9 percent of the State's \$31.855 billion budget.
\$3,925	New Jersey state employees pay an average of \$3,925 less each year towards their health insurance than a NJ private-sector worker.
\$837 Million	New Jersey's health insurance is so generous, that the State will soon be further burdened by the so-called "Cadillac Tax" in Obamacare on high-cost, high-benefit plans and will have

	to pay a federal tax: \$261 million in FY18 and a staggering \$837 million in FY22.
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14%	Without reform, by 2024 health care benefits alone are projected to consume over 14% of New Jersey's state budget.
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
