A hand up during Stand Down in Newark, Oct. 16

Some of New Jersey's estimated 8,000 homeless veterans will have a chance at a "hand up ... not a hand out" on Saturday at the North Jersey Stand Down in Newark.

Soldiers and Airmen of the New Jersey Army National Guard will assist the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs by preparing food and offering medical services to the homeless vets who show up at Newark's JFK Recreation Center from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Last month, a similar Stand Down was held at the National Guard Armory in Cherry Hill.

The aim of the annual Stand Downs is to provide homeless veterans and their family members with access to healthcare, medical screening, counseling on veterans' benefits, substance abuse counseling, legal and employment services, social services, vocational rehabilitation services, religious counseling, a hot meal, a haircut, and winter clothing. The goal of the program is to bring a wide range of resources together in one location so the veteran can access the various available services and be able to recognize that the community is concerned and committed to bring these services to them.

"Stand Down" derives its name from the military term referring to the temporary removal of exhausted combat troops from the battlefield to a safe place, behind the lines, for rest and recovery.

No more savings bond program for state employees

The U.S. Department of the Treasury is discontinuing the offering of paper U.S. savings bonds through payroll savings plans. This change is effective beginning in January 2011. Because of this change, the State of New Jersey will no longer withhold deductions from employees' paychecks after Pay Period 26, 2010. Any Bond Balance remaining at the end of this calendar year will be refunded to you in a separate check.

While U.S. Savings bonds will no longer be available to you through payroll deductions from the State of New Jersey, you will still have the opportunity to continue to save automatically by using the Treasury Direct online system – a free online system that allows you to purchase, manage, and redeem electronic (paperless) savings bonds. CFC campaign kicks off; looking for federal employee participation

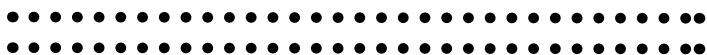

NOOOOOO!!! I have been in some stores and seen it – Christmas decorations and other “stuff” for the December holiday. We haven't even had Halloween yet and the stores want me to think about buying holiday presents. That just isn't fair.

If your list, like mine, includes some children – you know that toys will be filling their wish list. And you know that they are sure to have enough to overflow their toy chests already; the gifts will simply be more things they have to pick up and put away at the end of the day.

Unfortunately, toys are not recyclable, per se. Meaning when your son or daughter tires of a toy, or it is broken, you simply cannot toss it into the blue bin.

What can you do to keep them out of the landfill?

If the toy uses batteries, make sure you recycle them. And buy recyclable batteries when you have to buy new ones.

If your child tires of or outgrows a toy – there are a variety of ways to recycle the toy. Check out local nonprofits, hospitals or maybe your church nursery to donate the toy for another child's use. Or, donate it to Goodwill, Vietnam Veterans donations, or other similar place. Last, you may have a consignment shop that will sell your toys for you or you can sell them online and make a few dollars to buy this year's toys.

Do you live in a “kid neighborhood”? Set up a toy exchange with friends and families. It will be a yard sale with no money – set some basic rules so no one brings one set of wooden blocks and takes home five high-priced video games – and your kids will have something new to play with for virtually nothing.

When buying toys, look for toys made of wood or recycled plastic.

Encourage your children to use their imaginations – give them cleaned out milk cartons, egg cartons, old CDs, crayons, markers, scissors, glue – heck throw in some pieces of junk mail and magazine for artwork – and let them make their own toys.

Last, get your kids outside and take them to a park or the local playground. Meet a family or two there and you can socialize while the kids blow off steam and get some exercise. You could even join in and remember the fun times of going down the sliding board, climbing the monkey bars, or trying to swing up to the sky.

Holiday mailing dates given for overseas packages, cards

For those mailing packages to friends and loved ones in the military overseas, Christmas comes early. And Hanukkah comes even earlier.

It depends on how you plan to send it, but if it's traveling the slowest way — parcel post — mail that package by Nov. 12 to get it there by Dec. 25, according to recommended holiday shipping dates provided by the Military Postal Service Agency.

Hanukkah begins Dec. 1 this year, so you'll need to send it 24 days earlier — by Oct. 19 — if it's going parcel post.

Here are the other recommended mail deadlines. Subtract 24 days from each deadline to get it there in time for Hanukkah:

- Space Available Mail (SAM): Nov. 20 to contingency locations (APO/FPO/DPO AE Zip 093); all other overseas military locations by Nov. 26.

- Parcel Airlift Mail (PAL): Dec. 1 to contingency locations; all others by Dec. 3.

- Priority Mail: Dec. 4 to contingency locations; all others by Dec. 10.

- First-class cards and letters: Dec. 4 to contingency locations; all others by Dec. 10

- Express Mail Military Services: Not available to contingency locations; other locations by Dec. 18. Check with your local post office to determine if this service is available to a particular APO/FPO/DPO address.

Family Matters Blog: Free tutors ease homework woes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13, 2010 - Last night, I sat down to help my daughter with her homework and very quickly realized I was in over my head. It's been a while since I took 3rd grade math and was hard-pressed to remember terms like place value, front-end estimation and common factors.

"Is that right?" she asked me, thrusting her worksheet under my nose. I had to hesitate for a moment before admitting I had no idea, and quickly delved into her math book to give myself a refresher.

I had a moment of panic as I realized I would have to relearn a whole host of complicated math terms in the years ahead. I think I desperately need a math refresher course for parents, or a very experienced tutor.

It was a tough evening for me, but I realized our military families have additional, weightier challenges. They frequently move, and must keep up with the different requirements of different teachers in each school. And when a parent deploys, the other must assume the sole role of homework helper along with a host of other responsibilities. And it's even tougher when both parents deploy.

Fortunately, the Defense Department offers military families access to free, online tutoring at Tutor.com. The site offers round-the-clock professional tutors who can assist with homework, studying and test preparation. Services are available to students of any age — from kindergartners to high school seniors — with help offered in more than 16 subjects.

Once online, the student and tutor work together in a secure virtual classroom, where they can chat, draw on a shared whiteboard, upload files and browse the Internet together.

Active-duty servicemembers, National Guard and reserve personnel on active duty in a deployed status, Defense Department civilians in a deployed status and their dependents are eligible to participate. Families who aren't eligible can access the service for a fee.

Government benefits must be through EFTs for all

Prepare for the change. Americans who enroll for federal benefits on or around March 1, 2011 will have to choose Direct Deposit or Direct Express Debit MasterCard. The Direct Express debit card is used when the applicant does not have a bank account.

It costs the federal government \$1.03 to issue a check but only 10.5 cents to issue an electronic fund transfer. Putting all government payments into EFTs will save the government about \$400 million dollars and about 12 million pounds of paper.

By 2013, the recipients of the more than 136 million benefit checks that the federal government mails out each year will have no choice but to be on the EFT program.

October is open enrollment for state employees

Open enrollment for 2011 – state health benefits and tax savings programs

October is the State Health Benefits Program and State Employees Tax Savings Program open enrollment period — your annual opportunity to review SHBP and Tax\$ave coverage and make any changes for you and/or your dependents for the 2011 plan year. During the Open Enrollment you may:

- Enroll in SHBP plans if you have not previously done so, change to a different SHBP medical plan and/or dental plan, and add eligible dependents – including children up to age 26* under federal health care reform changes – see the *Health Capsule* newsletter for details.
- Enroll, or renew enrollment, in Tax\$ave Flexible Spending Account plans for the coming plan year.** See the *Tax\$ave News* for new reimbursement limits on over-the-counter medications and eligibility of children up to the age of 26.

Starting this year, open enrollment publications are only available online. See the Health Capsule and Tax\$ave Newsletter and fliers for detailed open enrollment information. Go to: www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions/ and click the Open Enrollment links under “Special Announcements:”

- To change or enroll in SHBP plans, contact your human resources representative or benefits administrator to obtain an application. Medical and prescription drug coverage changes are made on the same application. Dental coverage changes are made on a separate application.
- To change or enroll in Tax\$ave plans, see the information on the Tax\$ave Open Enrollment Web site.
- Changes made during this Open Enrollment will be effective on January 1, 2011 for all employees.

*Optional coverage for dependent children until age 31 is available under the provisions of Chapter 375, P.L. 2005.

**Re-enrollment is required each year for continued participation in a Tax\$ave FSA plan.

N.J. Honor Guard program has openings for new members

The New Jersey National Guard Honor Guard Program is looking for new members to serve at funerals of veterans around the state.

Retirees and active National Guard members of the Army and Air Guard can apply for the openings. Retirees with 20 years or more of service from any branch can also apply. The Honor Guard members are men and women, enlisted and officers.

All personnel must meet Army/Air Force height and weight standards of AR 600-9 and their appearance must meet AR 670-1 standards.

Current Guard members are paid one day's active duty pay, but no less than \$50 plus one retirement point for each day's work. Retirees receive \$50 per day.

Many days can find the Honor Guard with more than one mission; but each person registers for the time they are available. Most services take place within a 50 mile radius of their assigned Honor Guard Office; hours are 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Some missions can be done in the evening hours. The Honor Guard provides services seven days a week, depending on the schedule of missions.

The N.J. National Guard Honor Guard Program provides services mostly for Army veterans but has worked at other branch's funerals.

There is an initial training period for all personnel. Everyone will be taught how to perform all assignments and phases of the ceremony. If someone has a special talent such as bugle playing for Taps, it is greatly appreciated.

Anyone interested must contact the program office at 609-530-7090. They will be referred to a local regional team leader to establish an appointment time and location for an interview or in the case of a bugler, an audition.

NJARNG to give flu vaccine

Each year in the United States approximately 36,000, or nearly 1 out of every 10,000 people, die from influenza or its complications. Additionally, approximately 226,000 influenza-associated hospitalizations occur annually.

Vaccination remains the primary method for preventing influenza and its complications. Vaccination is mandatory for all uniformed personnel. The DoD requires the services to achieve a green status no later than Jan. 1, 2011. The 2010-2011 trivalent influenza vaccine (TIV) strains are A/California/07/2009 (H1N1)-like, A/Perth/16/2009 (H3N2)-like, and B/Brisbane/60/2008-like antigens.

The NJARNG will implement the Influenza Vaccine Immunization Program throughout the state, immediately upon receipt of influenza vaccine from the state medical command no later than Dec. 1, in order to protect the individuals at risk from developing influenza or its complications.

Flu shots for veterans available at Philadelphia VAMC

Veterans eligible for VA health care are reminded to receive their annual flu shot – free of charge – at the Philadelphia Veterans Affairs Medical Center or any VA outpatient clinic in the community.

The flu shot is available at the Philadelphia VAMC Free Flu Vaccine Clinic, 9 a.m. - noon and 1 - 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. Veterans will also be offered the flu vaccine at any medical care appointment, including specialty clinics and the four VA community-based outpatient clinics in the Philadelphia area.

Health care providers say the flu vaccine is the most effective way for Veterans to protect themselves and their loved ones from getting sick over the winter months. In addition, Veterans 65 and older have the option of a high-dose vaccine this year, which may offer even more protection for those who receive it.

“For the first time, public health officials are recommending that everyone 6 months and older receive a flu vaccination,” said Darren Linkin, M.D., Philadelphia VAMC hospital epidemiologist. “Universal vaccination will keep everyone healthier and decrease the spread of flu to those who are most vulnerable.”

The Philadelphia VAMC provides health care to 60,000 Veterans in Philadelphia and six surrounding counties in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. In addition to the main campus in West Philadelphia, there are VA outpatient clinics at Ft Dix, Sewell and Camden, N.J., and in Horsham, Pa. (the Victor J.
