PVSC's Shoreline River Cleanups Offer Students, Volunteers a Chance to Help Communities

NEWARK, NJ – June is National Rivers Month and, to commemorate it, the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission (PVSC) — along with American Rivers is encouraging local citizens, youth groups and schools to celebrate their local rivers by participating in or organizing a river cleanup. Hundreds of river cleanups across the country are scheduled during June and throughout the year. Volunteers can find a nearby river cleanup or information and tools to organize their own at <u>www.AmericanRivers.org/Cleanup</u>. Each year, millions of tons of trash end up in the nation's rivers. National River Cleanup was launched in 1991 to help keep the country's rivers clean and trash-free. Since then, the program has grown significantly and more than 800,000 volunteers have participated in 6,000 cleanups across the country.

Locally, PVSC has encouraged participation through its River Restoration and Educational Outreach programs to make cleaning up the Passaic River and local tributaries easy and fun. PVSC often sends a member of its crew to help organize and supervise the cleanups; PVSC provides trash bags, gloves, rakes and even specialized equipment, if needed.

"Healthy rivers mean healthy communities. By participating in a river cleanup, people can help serve their communities and make an immediate impact," said PVSC Executive Director Michael DeFrancisci. "Residents of all ages can volunteer – for an hour or a day – to help clean the river they care about."

The PVSC's River Restoration Program was created in 1998 and charged with preserving and protecting over 100 miles of area waterways. To date, the PVSC has removed over 11,100 tons of debris from the Newark Bay, the Passaic River and its tributaries, and has sponsored over 970 individual clean-ups along shorelines and in communities, along with educating about 250,000 students on how they can help protect the Passaic River and our environment.



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In addition to the American Rivers web site, potential volunteers can find river cleanups near them on Facebook, VolunteerMatch.org and USAService.gov. Last year was American Rivers' most successful year yet with more than 300,000 volunteers removing more than 2,400 tons of trash from more than 50,000 miles of our rivers. This year, American Rivers is on track to clean even more river miles. This year alone, several hundred cleanups across the country have already taken place to help protect and restore our nation's rivers.

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In order to protect and preserve local streams and rivers from water pollution, the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission operates one of the country's oldest and largest treatment plants for the wastewaters of northern New Jersey, serving over 1.4 million people in five counties.
