

2022 Annual Report on the Medicinal Cannabis Program



Adopted September 19, 2024

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Introduction

Calendar year 2022 was the second year that, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 24:6I-24, NJ-CRC assumed all duties, powers, and responsibilities concerning oversight of medicinal cannabis activities from the New Jersey Department of Health.

The year saw continued growth in total patient enrollment since program inception and the number operating alternative treatment centers (ATCs). Almost 19,000 new patients joined the program, bringing the total number of new patients to enroll since the program's beginning to 230,176. However, the number of active patients at year's end was down 7% to 114,806, compared to 2021.

The program also added 1,437 active caregivers, for a total of 10,069 caregiver enrollments since the program's inception. The program also added 182 new physicians in 2022. This brought the total number of participating physicians since the program's inception to 1,877. The program served patients with 18 different debilitating conditions, including over 72,000 patients suffering from anxiety.

This report details the statistics and major developments in the program for the calendar year 2022 and provides details on the NJ-CRC's budget and regulatory process for medicinal cannabis activities.

Removal of State Sales Tax For New Jersey Medicinal Cannabis Patients

As of July 1, 2022, participants in the state's Medicinal Cannabis Program no longer pay state sales tax on cannabis and cannabis products purchased at a permitted medicinal dispensary. The gradual elimination of the sales tax was delineated in the Jake Honig Compassionate Use Medical Cannabis Act, P.L.2019, c.153, signed into law by Governor Murphy in 2019.

Alternative Treatment Center Expansion

Under N.J.S.A. 24:6I-46, the Commission may approve an ATC to expand its operations to include adult-use cannabis activities after certification that the ATC's adult-use cannabis activities will not negatively impact patient access to medicinal cannabis. These "expanded ATCs" would then be authorized to operate in both medicinal and adult-use cannabis markets. Preserving patient access and public safety was a top priority when considering an ATC's request to expand into the adult-use cannabis market. Approvals for expansion were conditioned on commitments from ATCs to uphold their promises to patients and communities. If the ATC is a medicinal dispensary, it is required to adhere to the following additional requirements:

- Have business operating hours include at least 14 patient-only hours spread over at least three (3) days per week, and at least one (1) weekend day;
- Provide exclusive parking options for patients and designated caregivers at all times;
- Provide exclusive points-of-sale for patients and designated caregivers at all times;
- Provide express access to the ATC so that patients and designated caregivers do not have to wait in lines intended for the general public;
- Provide patients and designated caregivers with the exclusive ability to reserve products ahead of time so that they can be assured their order will be filled when going to the ATC;
- Provide a patient access telephone line staffed by ATC employees during all business hours to assist patients and designated caregivers trying to access the ATC;
- Within 30 days of being issued the above-listed licenses, hold at least two (2) virtual town halls with registered patients and caregivers to provide information on the ATC's patient access plan; and
- Provide the NJ-CRC with regular reports on patient access.

During calendar year 2022, the NJ-CRC approved 9 businesses for expansion at a total of 42 license locations.

Regulatory Waivers to Expand Access to Medicinal Cannabis Items

On July 28, 2022, the NJ-CRC approved a waiver of N.J.A.C. 17:30A-7.9(a), -10.12, and -13.6(b) to allow medicinal cannabis delivery to the residence of a registered qualifying patient or primary caregiver, as well as curbside pickup for qualifying patients and caregivers. The same day, the Commission also waived N.J.A.C. 17:30A-2.1(c), reducing qualifying patient and primary caregiver issuance and renewal fees from \$100 to \$50. These waivers benefited the patient population by providing patients and caregivers more access to medical cannabis.

2019 Request for Applications (RFA) Award Reissued

On March 24, 2022, the NJ-CRC reissued a 2019 RFA medical dispensary award to PEMAA, LLC. This award was issued after NJ Kindness, LLC notified the NJ-CRC that it was unable to accept the award. PEMAA, LLC was the next eligible applicant in the Southern region, and was therefore issued the award consistent with the scoring criteria set forth in the 2019 RFA. The reissuance of this award ensured that there were a sufficient number of alternative treatment centers in the southern region to satisfy the needs of qualifying patients and provided more access to a robust and diverse retail market for medicinal cannabis.

Public Meetings

During 2022, the NJ-CRC held 11 public meetings. Most of the public meetings were held virtually as part of the agency's continued response to the public health emergency resulting from the global COVID-19 pandemic. In October 2022, the NJ-CRC began holding in-person public meetings. At each meeting, members of the public could share comments with the NJ-CRC. Additionally, the Commission hosted experts and members of the public to provide public comment on several issues, including medical conditions that should be considered for participation in the Medicinal Cannabis Program, patient education and counseling needs, and medicinal product expiration dates.

Budget

In 2022 the method for the Commission's revenue allocation and budgeting was changed to comply with statute. Under N.J.S.A. 24:6I-50, no more than 30% of all revenues collected by the Commission and deposited into the Cannabis Regulatory, Enforcement Assistance, and Marketplace Modernization Fund can be allocated to the NJ-CRC to support its operations and implementation of the medicinal and adult-use cannabis laws. The total budget expenditure for the CRC in 2022 was \$6,872,399.31.

Figure 1: Nature of Patients Qualifying Conditions 2022




Figure 2: 2022 Physicians Enrolled in Medicinal Cannabis Program, by Specialty






Figure 3: Patients by Age Group Bar Chart





Figure 5: Active Patients by County




Figure 6: Active Patients by County (Descending Order)
