Founded in 2002, the African American Heritage Museum of Southern New Jersey (AAHMSNJ) boasts an impressive collection of items that show African Americans in a historical context, including graphics, drawings, paintings, memorabilia, advertisements, household and decorative items. Permanent exhibits in Atlantic City's Noyes Arts Garage and in Newtonville provide a visual and visceral understanding of how the African American culture has changed over the centuries. A traveling exhibit with over 12,000 historical and cultural artifacts is displayed at schools and in the community. The museum is also committed to shining a light on local artists whose extraordinary work may otherwise go unseen. In 2022, AAHMSNJ marks its $20^{\text {th }}$ anniversary documenting the struggle of one group of Americans as they carved out their own place in the wider cultural landscape.
