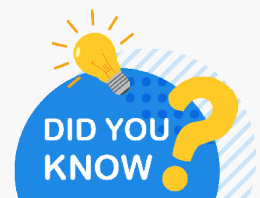

TECH TIPS

Clipboard Manager for More Efficient Copying & Pasting

Using Clipboard Manager can be revolutionary to reshape your work processes. With its new features (Windows 10 update), you'll likely find that Clipboard Manager saves time and simplifies cutting, copying, and pasting.

What is the Clipboard?

When you copy data (Ctrl + C), it is saved to a temporary location called the Clipboard where the data stays until you press the paste (Ctrl + V) key. Before the new features, Clipboard would only allow you to copy and paste the most recently copied item. Now, you can paste older items.

How to enable the Clipboard Manager

To enable Clipboard Manager:

- Press the  (Windows key)
- Click the **Turn on** button

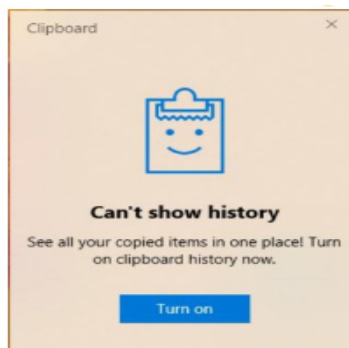


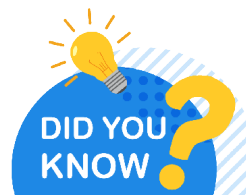
Figure 1: Clipboard Manager Screenshot

How to use a copy from the Clipboard

With the Clipboard history panel open, click on an entry in the panel. If an app is opened that allows pasting from the Clipboard, it will automatically paste into that app. If not, it will remain as the most recent item in the Clipboard.

Additionally, the Pin feature can save your frequently used items. You can find the Pin by clicking the three dots or the Pin in the upper right-hand corner of an entry.

If you're looking to reshape your workflow with efficient copying and pasting, give Clipboard Manager a try!

ePAR Insider: Tracking Professional Progress with the Interim Review

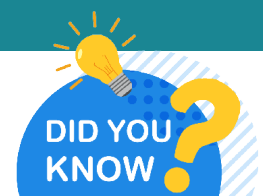

Writing @ Work



Reshape Your Business Writing: The Infinite Possibilities of Quotes

Playwright Tom Stoppard wrote, "...possibilities are infinite with writing; every time you open a new script, there's no limit to what it might contain." And while playwriting differs from business writing, one element is relevant for both – the importance of engaging the audience.

As business writers, we're typically concerned with relating key points, applying correct grammar and spelling, and using appropriate formatting. While these elements are important, consider engaging your reading audience by adding a relevant quote to the introduction and/or conclusion of your writing.

For example, a department memo about a process change to improve client services may spark initial curiosity with the following quote:

"Continuous improvement means that we never perceive current success as our final destination." - John Hunter

Business writing is structured, but it may also be thought-

provoking. Topic-relevant quotes can accomplish this and are just a few key strokes away via an internet search.

So, the next time you're preparing to write a business communication, consider a quote or two to engage your reader with the topic's possibilities.

Quotes may:

- Appeal to a reader's intellect
- Inspire ideas
- Spark curiosity
- Stimulate follow-up discussions
