Introduction

The following list is a resource guide to funding for historic preservation and other related fields. This list is not comprehensive, and the information is subject to change. Inclusion on this list does not present an endorsement of the programs offered by these organizations, and the Trust is not responsible for the accuracy of the information presented. All information included in this guide was obtained from current publications distributed by the listed funding organization, materials found on the organization's website, or information found in current foundation and government grant award guides. This guide is updated periodically.

Most funding organizations urge prospective applicants to discuss their projects first with the organization's staff before proceeding with an application. If the respective application's due date has passed, use the date provided as a guide to next year's funding cycle. Always check with the funding organization to confirm deadlines and to obtain current grant application procedures.

Programs: The <u>Collections Assessment for Preservation (CAP)</u> program provides small and mid-sized museums with partial funding toward a general conservation assessment. The assessment is a study of all of the institution's collections, buildings, and building systems, as well as its policies and procedures relating to care of collections.

About: The National Trust for Historic Preservation is leading the movement to save places where our history happened. Through its financial assistance programs, the National Trust for Historic Preservation demonstrates that preserving our heritage improves the quality of life in American communities.

Programs: National Trust Preservation Funds (NTPF) are an umbrella group of grant funds intended to encourage preservation at the local level by supporting ongoing preservation work and by providing seed money for preservation projects.

Battlefield Preservation Fund

Grants from the Battlefield Preservation Fund will serve as a catalyst to stimulate efforts to preserve battlefields, viewsheds, and related historic structures and to leverage fund-raising activities. Grants from this fund range from \$2,500 to \$10,000.

Deadline: There are three deadlines per year in February, June, and October.

Annual grants:

• The Cynthia Woods Mitchell Fund for Historic Interiors

The purpose of the fund is to assist in the preservation, restoration, and interpretation of historic interiors. Grants from the <u>Cynthia Woods</u> <u>Mitchell Fund for Historic Interiors</u> generally range from \$2,500 to \$15,000.

• Hart Family Fund for Small Towns

Grants from the <u>Hart Family Fund for Small Towns</u> are intended to encourage preservation at the local level by providing seed money for preservation projects in small towns. Grants from the Hart Family Fund for Small Towns generally range from \$2,500 to \$15,000.

• Johanna Favrot Fund for Historic Preservation

The <u>Johanna Favrot Fund for Historic Preservation</u> aims to save historic environments in order to foster an appreciation of our nation's diverse cultural heritage and to preserve and revitalize the livability of the nation's communities. Grants from the Johanna Favrot Fund for Historic Preservation generally range from \$2,500 to \$15,000.

Moe Family Fund for Statewide and Local Partners

The Moe Family Fund for Statewide and Local Partners fund provides funding to current dues-paying members of the National Preservation Partners Network (NPPN) with grants focused on priority issues for the preservation field. Applicants are encouraged to embark on projects and activities outside the existing scope of their work, but the Fund also will support initiatives that take existing programs to a new level.

• The Peter H. Brink Leadership Fund

The purpose of the <u>Peter H. Brink Leadership Fund</u> is to support the leadership and effectiveness of staff and board members of preservation organizations to fulfill their mission and to create a stronger, more effective preservation movement. Grants from the Peter H. Brink Leadership Fund reimburse travel costs and provide an honorarium for the mentor up to a maximum total of \$2,500. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis throughout the year.

Deadline: One deadline per year and is restricted to a specific area or project type.

African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund:

• African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund

Grants from the <u>African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund</u> are designed to advance ongoing preservation activities for historic places such as sites, museums, and landscapes representing African American cultural heritage. Grants made from the African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund will range from \$50,000 to \$150,000.

• Conserving Black Modernism Grant Program

<u>Conserving Black Modernism</u>, a part of the Action Fund's national grant program, is designed to empower and equip preservationists and stewards with funding and technical support to preserve the material heritage, innovation, and legacy of modern architectural sites designed by Black architects.

Descendant and Family Stewardship Initiative

Grants from the <u>Descendant and Family Stewardship</u>
<u>Initiative</u> support project management, capacity-building,
grantmaking, and convenings for place-based organizations, in a twoyear collaboration.

• HBCU Cultural Heritage Stewardship Initiative

Grants from the <u>Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU)</u> <u>Cultural Heritage Stewardship Initiative</u> provide funding to HBCUs to develop Cultural Heritage Stewardship Plans to ensure they are equipped to preserve and maintain their historic campuses and historic assets. Grants made from the HBCU Cultural Heritage Stewardship Initiative will range from \$60,000 to \$150,000.

• Preserving Black Churches

Annual grants from <u>Preserving Black Churches</u> are intended to preserve historic Black houses of worship—either with active

congregations and nonactive congregations—and advance ongoing preservation activities while strengthening capacity for historic congregations, and preservation and community organizations to steward, manage, and better utilize their historic structures. Grants from Preserving Black Churches range from \$50,000 to \$200,000.

Grant Programs with Partners:

• Backing Historic Small Restaurants

A partnership with American Express, the <u>Backing Historic Small</u> <u>Restaurants Grant Program</u> help restaurants address critical needs amid ongoing economic challenges.

• National Fund for Sacred Places

The <u>National Fund for Sacred Places</u> is a program of Partners for Sacred Places in collaboration with the National Trust for Historic Preservation and provides training, planning grants, and capital grants from \$50,000 to \$500,000 for congregations of all faiths. About: The Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) is administered by the <u>State, Tribal</u>, <u>Local</u>, <u>Plans & Grants (STLPG) Division</u> of the National Park Service. STLPG manages competitive grant programs, in addition to annual formula grants to states and tribes, through the HPF. Competitive grants assist with a variety of historic preservation projects through partnerships with state and tribal historic preservation offices, local communities, and preservation organizations.

Programs: The <u>State, Tribal, Local, Plans & Grants Division</u> manages several grant programs to assist with a variety of historic preservation and community projects focused on heritage preservation. The funding for all of the below grants, regardless of program, comes from the <u>Historic Preservation Fund</u>.

Save America's Treasures Grants

The <u>Save America's Treasures</u> grant program was established in 1998 to celebrate America's premier cultural resources in the new millennium. The National Park Service administers Save America's Treasures grants in partnership with the <u>National Endowment for the Arts</u>, the <u>National Endowment for the Humanities</u>, and the <u>Institute of Museum and Library Services</u>.

African American Civil Rights Grants

The <u>African American Civil Rights</u> (AACR) documents, interprets, and preserves sites and stories related to the African American struggle to gain equal rights as citizens. Projects are split into two categories: physical "preservation projects" and "history projects." Preservation grants are for the repair of historic properties. History grants are for more interpretive work, like exhibit design or even historical research.

• Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Grant

The <u>Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Grant</u> is a subgrant program to support the rehabilitation of historic properties in rural communities.

• History of Equal Rights Grants

The <u>History of Equal Rights Grants</u> aims to preserve sites related to the struggle of all people to achieve equal rights in America. This program funds physical preservation work and pre-preservation planning activities for sites

that are listed in or determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places or as a National Historic Landmark.

• Semiquincentennial Grants

The <u>Semiquincentennial Grant</u> program was created by Congress in 2020 to honor the 250th anniversary of the United States by restoring and preserving sites and structures listed on the National Register of Historic Places that commemorate the founding of the nation. This program funds physical preservation work and pre-preservation planning activities for sites that are listed in or determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places or as a National Historic Landmark.

HBCU Grants

This grant program was established to identify and restore historic structures on Historically Black Colleges & Universities (HBCUs) campuses considered to be the most historically significant and physically threatened. This program funds physical preservation work and pre-preservation planning activities for sites that are listed in or determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places or as a National Historic Landmark.

• Underrepresented Communities Grants

The <u>Underrepresented Communities Grant Program</u> (URC) works towards diversifying listings submitted to the National Register of Historic Places. Projects include surveys and inventories of historic properties associated with communities underrepresented in the National Register, as well as the development of nominations to the National Register for specific sites.

• Tribal Heritage Grants

<u>Tribal Heritage Grants</u> assist Indian Tribes in protecting and promoting their unique cultural heritage and traditions.

• Disaster Recovery Grants

<u>Disaster Recover Grants</u> offer emergency funding for the Historic Preservation Fund to assist communities with preservation and repair work at historic sites

• Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections

<u>Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections</u> seeks to strengthen institutional resiliency in the face of a changing climate. Cultural institutions, including libraries, archives, museums, and historical organizations, may apply for funds to improve conditions for collection storage and display; improve systems and resilience for collections; reduce energy usage and costs; and indepth preservation studies and plans.

The <u>Research and Development</u> program supports projects that address major challenges in preserving or providing access to humanities collections and resources.

Program: Action & Incubation Grants provide funding to nonprofit organizations or government entities such as public libraries, museums, historical societies, academic institutions, religious groups, or community organizations, for planning, development, or implementation of public humanities projects. Organizations can only apply for one grant per round and must select either Incubation or Action. Incubation Grants support the planning and development of public humanities projects for audiences in NJ. Action Grants are geared toward implementation and continuation of public humanities projects.

Programs: The Cultural Trust offers three different grant programs on rotation.

• Institutional and Financial Stabilization Grants for Arts Organizations (IFS Arts)

Institutional and Financial Stabilization Grants for Arts Organizations address the financial and institutional challenges that threaten nonprofit arts organizations' stability and help them build greater operational capacity to manage and advance their work.

• Institutional and Financial Stabilization Grants for History/Humanities Organizations (IFS History/Humanities)
Institutional and Financial Stabilization Grants for History/Humanities
Organizations support very similar projects to the IFS Arts program, but for New Jersey's nonprofit history and humanities organizations.

• Capital Historic Preservation Grants for Arts, History, and Humanities Organizations(Capital Historic Preservation)

Capital Historic Preservation grants support capital projects at historic sites, and are open to New Jersey nonprofit arts, history, and humanities organizations. Eligible sites must be listed on the New Jersey and/or National Register of Historic Places or contribute to the significance of a historic district listed on the New Jersey and/or National Register of Historic Places.

About: The NJ State Council on the Arts (NJSCA) supports, encourages, and fosters public interest in the arts; enlarges public and private resources devoted to the arts; promotes freedom of expression in the arts; and facilitates the inclusion of art in every public building in New Jersey.

Programs: NJSCA awards grants on a highly competitive basis. Only non-profit organizations or New Jersey artists may be considered for NJSCA funding. Generally, the grants are organized by the artistic discipline of the applicant which, in addition to dance, theater, music, crafts, etc., also includes arts basic to education, presenting organizations and folk arts.

• Arts Education Special Initiative Grants (AESI)

New Jersey arts organizations and units of government, colleges, or universities with an arts education-based mission are invited to apply for this grant program to support new or expanded programs that make substantial contributions to quality arts education in schools and youth agencies.

Arts Project Support (APS)

Arts Project Support (APS) provides support for a project that meets the Council's eligibility requirements. A project is defined as a public activity or event that occurs once a year either as a single day or weekend presentation, or a series of the same presentation occurring within a very limited and specific timeframe (12-weeks or less). Priority will be given to projects that provide opportunities to engage new voices, reach new communities, or encourage innovation in the field.

• Creative Aging Initiative Grant

The Creative Aging Initiative Grant (CAI) provides \$10,000 to eligible arts organizations, libraries, veterans homes, senior and community centers, colleges/universities, and units of government to cover costs for arts learning experiences with New Jersey older adults aged 55 and over.

• Folk & Traditional Arts Project Grants

The Folk & Traditional Arts Project (FTAP) grant program provides emerging to mid-career folk and traditional artists access to opportunities that significantly advance skills in their art form.

Programs: The NJHC offers General Operating Support Grants, Project Grants, County History Partnership Grants and more to support a variety of programs and activities related to New Jersey history.

• Project Grants

Eligible individuals and organizations may apply for funding for expenses of specific projects relating to New Jersey history. Eligible categories include conservation of historical materials (manuscripts, books, costumes, historical visuals); editorial and publication projects; educational initiatives; partnership projects; exhibitions; media (films, radio, videotape, digital media); public programs; and research (including archaeological projects, fellowships, oral history, and National and New Jersey registers of historic places nominations).

• General Operating Support Grants

Provides general assistance to historical organizations, museums, historic sites, archives, libraries, and similar organizations. To qualify for assistance, organizations must have collections or programming relating to the history of New Jersey.

• Caucus Archival Projects Evaluation Service (CAPES)

CAPES (Caucus Archival Projects Evaluation Service) provide free professional assessment of archival paper collections by consultants of the New Jersey Caucus of the Mid-Atlantic Regional Archives Conference.

Open Space Trust Funds:

Over the years, many counties and over one hundred municipalities have passed referenda dedicating a percentage of their revenue for open space acquisition and protection. In some cases, historic preservation is also named as a use for these funds. Call your Cultural and Heritage Commission or county/municipal clerk to find out if a specific municipality has Open Space Trust Funds allocated for historic preservation.

About: The Trust Fund, established in 1998, is a dedicated program supporting open space land acquisition, recreation development, as well as historical preservation and farmland protection throughout Bergen County. In 2013 the Trust Fund added the Floodplain Protection program.

Program: The Trust Fund is divided into two separate programs: County Program and Municipal Park Improvements. The County Program uses Trust Fund dollars on a countywide basis for projects involving any of the five areas: Land Acquisition, the development of new and/or the rehabilitation of existing County Park facilities, Historic Preservation, Floodplain Protection and Farmland Preservation. As part of the Municipal Park Improvement Program, each of Bergen County's seventy municipalities is eligible to apply to this program for help to improve their municipal open space and recreation facilities.

About: In November of 1998, Camden County's voters overwhelmingly approved passage of the referendum. Pursuant to the vote, a trust fund of approximately \$2M was established for purposes of preserving parks, natural areas, historic sites, and farmland. The County is committed to preserving parks, natural areas, historic sites,

and farmland, not only for their scenic value, but for their use and enjoyment, and for purposes of cultural and ecological enrichment. The Camden County Open Space Preservation Trust Fund Advisory Committee was appointed by the Camden County Board of Chosen Commissioners for purposes of providing guidance regarding implementation of the Trust Fund and the principles of Open Space preservation that it represents.

Program: Applicants may apply for open space acquisition, farmland preservation, enhancement of existing recreation facilities, and historic preservation. Applications for Historic Preservation projects (maximum award \$50,000) and Recreation Facility Enhancement projects (maximum award \$25,000) are due by the deadline date noted in cover letter to be eligible for funding in that year.

<u>Hunterdon County Open Space, Farmland, and Historic Preservation Trust Fund:</u>

About: Hunterdon County voters overwhelmingly approved authorization of the Board of County Commissioners to implement and continue an Open Space, Recreation, Farmland and Historic Preservation Trust Fund.

Program: The proposition authorizes the County of Hunterdon to impose an annual levy for an amount or at a rate deemed appropriate for any or all of the following purposes: Acquisition of lands for recreation and conservation purposes: lands acquired for recreation and conservation purposes, maintenance of land acquired for recreation and conservation purposes, acquisition of farmland for farmland preservation purposes, historic preservation of historic properties, structures, facilities, sites, areas, or objects, and the acquisition of such properties, structures, facilities, sites, areas, or objects for historic preservation purposes, and payment of debt service or indebtedness issued or incurred by the County of Hunterdon for any of the previous purposes set forth.

About: The Monmouth County Historical Commission (MCHC), established by the Board of County Commissioners, is dedicated to preserving the county's rich architectural heritage. The Historic Preservation Grant Program helps municipalities and non-profit organizations financially by offering matching funds for restoration projects on historic structures.

Programs: MCHS grants are awarded on highly completive basis.

• Preservation Grant Program

Municipalities and non-profit organizations may apply to the <u>Preservation Grant Program</u> for matching grants (1:1) with a minimum of \$5,000 and a maximum of \$10,000. Eligible projects include preservation, restoration, or rehabilitation of publicly accessible historic structures (usually 50 years or more) in Monmouth County. Applications are due annually in November.

• Monmouth County History Regrant Program

Funded by the New Jersey Historical Commission, the Monmouth County History Regrant Program aims to strengthen local history organizations, foster public engagement and preserve the county's rich history. Eligible organizations may apply for General Operating Support (GOS) which provides funding for the core operations of nonprofit historical organizations or Special Project (SP), which supports public-facing history projects and programs undertaken by history organizations, other nonprofits, government agencies, schools and libraries.

About: Monmouth County was the first County in New Jersey to establish an Open Space Trust Fund. To meet open space and recreation needs, the Monmouth County Board of Chosen Freeholders established the Open Space Trust Fund in 1987, preceded by a referendum question for an Open Space Tax that was approved by voters.

Program: The Monmouth County Municipal Park Improvement Grant Program assists municipalities by providing additional funding needed to make park improvements in municipal parks and open space. The grant program is funded at \$6 million a year and up to \$500,000 per project. All projects must be for park, recreation, open space, and historic preservation purposes.

About: The Morris County Board of County Commissioners created the Morris County Historic Trust Fund (Fund) to help support the preservation of the county's exceptional abundance of historic resources. The Fund was created after Morris County voters approved a referendum in November 2002 authorizing the Commissioners to allow historic preservation funding under the Open Space Trust Fund, as permitted under state legislation.

Program: The Fund considers grants for the acquisition, stabilization, rehabilitation, restoration or preservation of historic resources by municipalities, qualified non-profits and the County. All funded activities must be in conformance with the Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation. Applications for plans and reports associated with the implementation of a historic preservation project are also eligible. Historic resources must be listed, or certified as eligible for listing, on the New Jersey and National Registers of Historic Places, in order to be eligible for the program.
