New Jersey Displaced Homemaker Programs

The New Jersey Division on Women (DOW) was established by statute in 1974 as a pioneering state agency for women's advocacy. Today, DOW is proud to continue the tradition of advocating for women's rights and opportunities by funding organizations, agencies and programs that serve New Jersey women.

DOW funds 15 displaced homemaker programs and fosters services that empower women. DOW is committed to supporting services for displaced homemakers to help them become economically self-sufficient. Displaced homemaker programs are listed in this brochure. If there is no program in your county, please contact a program in a neighboring county.

Displaced Homemaker Program History

In 1979, New Jersey enacted the Displaced Homemakers Act to assist individuals who lost their primary source of income due to divorce, separation, death or disability of a spouse and must obtain or upgrade skills to transition into the labor market.

In 2013, legislation was enacted designating May as "Displaced Homemakers Awareness Month" in New Jersey.



Who Are Displaced Homemakers?

Displaced homemakers are individuals who have worked in the home for a number of years and, due to the divorce, separation, death or disability of a spouse, now find themselves as the primary source of household income. In many cases displaced homemakers may be underemployed and unable to support either themselves or their children. Displaced homemakers may need to return to the workforce after having lost their primary source of financial support.

DOW's displaced homemaker programs help participants obtain or upgrade skills for the labor market. The goal is to help individuals become economically self-sufficient through education, job readiness, networking, outreach, referrals and emotional support.

Displaced Homemaker Program Core Services

Displaced homemaker programs enhance the employability and earnings of displaced homemakers and improve an entire family's quality of life. With supportive counseling and training, displaced homemakers are encouraged to reach their full potential.
