IN THE MATTER OF CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO THE ADOPTED AND APPROVED SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN OF THE PASSAIC COUNTY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT CERTIFICATION OF THE MAY 17, 1995 AMENDMENT TO THE PASSAIC COUNTY DISTRICT SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN

BY ORDER OF THE COMMISSIONER:

A. <u>Introduction</u>

The New Jersey Solid Waste Management Act (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq.) established a comprehensive system for the management of solid waste in New Jersey. The Act designated all twenty-one (21) of the state's counties, and the Hackensack Meadowlands District, as Solid Waste Management Districts, and mandated that the Boards of Chosen Freeholders and the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission develop comprehensive plans for waste management in their respective districts. On August 30, 1980, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department or DEP) approved with modifications the Passaic County District Solid Waste Management Plan (County Plan).

The Act requires that all district plans be based on accompanied by a report detailing the existing waste disposal situation in the district, and a plan which includes the strategy to be followed by the district in meeting the solid waste management needs of the district for a ten-year planning period. The report must detail the current and projected waste generation for the district, inventory and appraise all facilities in the district, and analyze the waste collection and transportation systems which serve the district. The disposal strategy must include the maximum practicable use of resource techniques. In addition to this strategy, the plan must designate sufficient available suitable sites for the disposal of the district's waste for a ten-year period, which sites may be in the district or, if none are available, in another district. (The Act provides procedures for reaching any necessary interdistrict agreements).

The Act further provides that a district may review its County Plan at any time and, if found inadequate, a new County Plan must be adopted. Amendments to the Act found in N.J.S.A. 13:1E-136 et seq. require that, among other things, counties amend their plans to include an outline of the proposed uses of moneys in the District Resource Recovery Investment (RRIT) Fund as well as establish a schedule for the disbursement of moneys in that fund.

The Passaic County Board of Chosen Freeholders (County Freeholders) completed such a review and on May 17, 1995 adopted Amendment #7-1995 to its approved County Plan. The amendment includes the specified use of and a disbursement schedule for the existing RRIT Fund balance of \$3,159.40, plus all future RRIT Fund moneys, for financing the County's continuing household hazardous waste program.

The amendment was received by the Department on July 19, 1995 and copies were distributed to various administrative review agencies for review and comment, as required by law. The DEP has reviewed this amendment and has determined that the amendment adopted by the Passaic County Freeholders on May 17, 1995 is approved as provided in N.J.S.A. 13:1E-24.

B. <u>Findings and Conclusions with Respect to the Passaic County</u> District Solid Waste Management Plan Amendment

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 13:1E-24a(1), I have studied and reviewed the May 17, 1995 amendment to the County Plan according to the objectives, criteria and standards developed in the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan and N.J.S.A. 13:1E-150 I find and conclude that this plan amendment is consistent with the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan. In this regard, the County Freeholders are notified of the issue of concern relative to the May 17, 1995 amendment which is included in Section B.2. below.

In conjunction with the review of the amendment, the Department circulated copies to 15 administrative review agencies, and solicited their review and comment. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 13:1E-24a(2) and (3), these agencies included various bureaus, divisions, and agencies within the DEP. All agencies contacted are as follows:

2. Issue of Concern Regarding the May 17, 1995 Amendment

Issue: RRIT Fund Use

On April 1, 1992, the County adopted an amendment (which was certified by the DEP on September 11, 1992) to disburse RRIT Fund moneys plus all future allocations through 1995 for various source reduction and recycling activities. Since then, \$3,159.40 has accumulated in interest in the County's RRIT Fund account. The County proposes to use this money, plus future RRIT Fund moneys, to finance the continued operation of its household hazardous waste program. Currently, the County's household hazardous waste program comprises collection days but a permanent mobile collection unit program is planned. Although the DEP is encouraging counties to develop permanent household hazardous collection facilities rather than the continued reliance on household hazardous waste collection days, the Department is approving this use within Section C. of the certification since the County is pursuing development of a mobile collection program subject to available funding.

C. <u>Certification of the Passaic County District Solid Waste Management Plan Amendment</u>

In accordance with N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq., specifically N.J.S.A. 13:1E-21, which establishes specific requirements regarding the contents of the district solid waste management plans, and N.J.S.A. 13:1E-150 which establishes uses of and disbursement schedule requirements for a district RRIT Fund, I have reviewed the May 17, 1995 amendment to the approved County Plan and certify to the County Freeholders that the May 17, 1995 amendment (Amendment #7-1995) is approved as further specified below.

The County Plan inclusion of the specified use of and a disbursement schedule for the existing RRIT Fund balance of \$3,159.40, plus all future RRIT Fund moneys, for financing the County's continuing household hazardous waste program is approved. Currently, the County's household hazardous waste program comprises collection days but a permanent mobile collection unit is planned.

D. Other Provisions Affecting the Plan Amendment

1. Contracts

Any contract renewal or new contract for solid waste collection or disposal which is inconsistent with this amendment to the county Plan and which was executed prior to the approval of this amendment and subsequent to the effective date of the Solid Waste Management Act (July 29, 1977), and which shall further be for a term in excess of one year, shall immediately be renegotiated in order to bring same into conformance with the terms and provisions herein Any solid waste collection operation or disposal set forth. facility registered by the Department and operating pursuant to a contract as herein described, shall be deemed to be in violation of this amendment and of the County Plan if such renegotiation is not completed within ninety (90) days of the effective date of this amendment provided, however, that any such registrant may, upon application to the Department, and for good cause shown, obtain an extension of time to complete such renegotiation.

2. Compliance

All solid waste facility operators and transporters registered with the Department and operating within the County and affected by the amendment contained herein shall operate in compliance with this amendment and all other approved provisions of the County Plan. Any facility operator or transporter who fails to comply with the provisions contained herein shall be deemed to be in violation of N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq. in violation of N.J.A.C. 7:26-1 et seq., and in violation of their registration to operate a solid waste facility or a collection system issued thereunder by the Department and shall be subject to the provisions and penalties of N.J.S.A. 13:1E-9 and 12 and all other applicable laws.

3. Types of Solid Wastes Covered by the District Plan

The provisions of the County Plan shall apply to all solid wastes defined in N.J.S.A. 13:1E-3 and N.J.A.C. 7:26-2.13 and shall not apply to liquid wastes, sewage sludge, septage, and hazardous wastes. All nonhazardous materials separated at the point of generation for sale or reuse are excluded from the waste flows designated in the Interdistrict and Intradistrict Solid Waste Flow Rules set forth at N.J.A.C. 7:26A-1 et seq.

4. Certification to Proceed with Implementation of Amendment

This document shall serve as the certification of the Commissioner of the Department to the County Freeholders and pursuant to $\underline{\text{N.J.S.A.}}$ 13:1E-24c. and f., the County shall proceed with the implementation of the approved amendment certified herein.

5. Definitions

For the purpose of this amendment and unless the context clearly requires a different meaning, the definitions of terms shall be the same as those found at N.J.S.A. 13:1E-3 and -99.12, N.J.A.C. 7:26-1.4, -2.13, and N.J.A.C. 7:26A-1.3.

6. Effective Date of the Amendment

The amendment contained herein shall take effect immediately.

7. Reservation of Authority

Nothing contained herein shall be construed as a limitation on any other action taken by the DEP pursuant to its authority under the law. The County Plan, including any amendment made thereto, shall conform with the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan, with appendices, which includes the Department's planning guidelines, rules, regulations, orders of the DEP, interdistrict and intradistrict waste flow rules, and also includes the compilation of individual district plans and amendments as they are approved.

E. <u>Certification of Approval of the Amendment by the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection</u>

In accordance with the requirements of N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq., I hereby approve the amendment, as outlined in Section C. of this certification, to the Passaic County District Solid Waste Management Plan which was adopted by the Passaic County Board of Chosen Freeholders on May 17, 1995.
