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Department of Education Recognizes Career and Technical Education Month

Thousands of New Jersey students will compete in a variety of contests – from ice sculpting to floral design – during New Jersey's month-long celebration of career and technical education, Commissioner Lucille E. Davy today announced.

Governor Jon S. Corzine has proclaimed February to be Career and Technical Education (CTE) Month. It coincides with the Association for Career and Technical Education's annual celebration of the nation's CTE programs, students and teachers.

In New Jersey, 170,000 high school and post-secondary students in career and technical education programs will have the opportunity to take part in events designed to highlight the importance of workforce-oriented education and the practical skills students learn.

"New Jersey's career and technical education programs should be celebrated for providing students myriad opportunities to gain hands-on experience in a chosen career sector and the confidence that often accompanies early exposure to an occupation," said Commissioner Davy. "These programs allow students to explore careers they are interested in and build valuable skills they will need either to enter the work sector or continue their education in that job field."

There are more than 2,000 CTE programs in 16 career clusters offered by the state's 21 county vocational school districts and more than 200 other school districts. Examples of programs include: acting; cabinet making; computer programming; emergency medical technology; fire science; ornamental horticulture; robotics technology; tourism and travel services management; and urban community and regional planning.

More than 42,000 New Jersey students also participate in seven state career and technical student organizations through membership in the Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA); the National FFA Association; the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA); DECA, an association for marketing students; the Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA); the Technology Student Association; and SkillsUSA.
