ROLL CALL/CALL TO ORDER/MINUTES APPROVAL:

Roll call was conducted in-person. The Board of Trustees meeting was called to order at 9:35 a.m. Minutes from the April 18, 2024, meeting was approved with an edit adding Mr. Pyle's question re. TPH URI rate compared to hospitals in the community. Staff checked with Dr. Soliman who provided a comparison to other state psychiatric hospitals (comparing apples to apples): TPH's URI rate is lower.

March Monthly Report:

- Dr. Lebel asked about the meaning of POES. POES means Physician Order Entry System. POES is going live in the Raycroft Complex on May 21, 2024. The next Complex to go live with POES will be the Lincoln Complex.
- Dr. Lebel asked about the total number of physicians on staff; answer: expectation is that TPH should have 20 physicians and 20 psychiatrists on staff, but that not all positions are filled at this time.
- Dr. Lebel underscored that there are eleven patients older than 65 at TPH and asked about the complications of finding appropriate placement after discharge.
- Mr. Gallagher was pleased to see the Restraint use was down in April. Statistics for use of force by Human Service Police are very low. They are kept separately from TPH restraint use data.
- Mr. Gallagher suggested when reviewing patterns and trends re. violence at TPH
 that those who do most harm be identified, and their behavior addressed. Dr. Lebel
 commented that at his Violence Prevention presentation last week, Dr. Ahmad
 showed the progress being made in decreasing violence, in particular among five or
 six outliers whose assaultive behavior decreased as they made therapeutic
 progress.
- Ms. Torre was very pleased that there were no A or A+ incidents, no 30-Day readmissions, and that TPH is off quarantine status related to COVID.
- Mr. Pyle asked how TPH could reduce patients on CEPP status below 20%. Ms.
 Johnson points out the difficulty of getting patients discharged who have immigration
 status issues. In fact, the established goal for patients on CEPP status at TPH is
 20% and TPH is at 20.7% now.
- Mr. Pyle asked how many patients are voluntarily committed to TPH: answer: only 2 or three.
- Mr. Weisfeld asked for clarification about the numbers detailing the six patients who
 had been involved in the most assaults in April; there is a calculation error that will
 be corrected.
- M. Weisfeld inquired about SkillUp training program. Do the patients get assistance? Answer: They are assigned a Vocational Rehab staff member. He also asked if an evaluation is done post-completion. Answer: Yes, an evaluation is done post completion. Ms. Johnson will provide updates about this program in future Board reports.
- Mr. Weisfeld noted that CMS came for a revisit on May 2. All issues resolved re. beds bolted to floor, adequacy of masks.
- Mr. Weisfeld was very pleased with the 0% chart delinquencies for the month of April. Great Job.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Incident Committee – Dr. Maureen Lebel

Summary of April 30, 2024, Violence Prevention Initiatives and Road to Future

Dr. Ahmad began the meeting with a discussion of some issues of concern with regard to violent or disruptive behaviors among patients. Currently 25 to 30 percent of patients are classified as forensic; staff are functioning in a post-pandemic milieu; some units are experiencing staffing limitations (Assistant Commissioner Flory addressed state efforts to address this issue); and leadership is working to maintain staff morale. Much of the data discussed have been presented to the Board in the annual and monthly reports. Overall, the data show some stability and containment of violent behaviors as reflected in the numbers and rates of assaults and applications of restraints. Spikes in violent behaviors are often a function of outliers. During 2023 five patients accounted for 60 percent of restraints and 10 patients accounted for 37 percent of assaults.

Dr. Ahmad also presented vignettes of the trajectories of several patients' acting out behaviors during treatment.

What followed were presentations about a variety of efforts by staff to address a range of issues to not only stabilize individual patients but prepare patients for healthy and successful discharges including:

- Controlling contraband influx to hospital

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC:

• Ms. Kersey, representing the Hilltonia Association (the Trenton community behind Travers) commented on the black privacy cover added to the fence between TPH and the community and voiced concerns over not being included in the change. She says that the black netting used on the fence is both unattractive and shuts out light. She would like the community to be alerted about future changes that might impact the neighborhood. Ms. Kersey was advised TPH usually notifies the Hilltonia President. Mr. Hollen will continue to make sure that notifications are sent.

Ms. Kersey also commented on the lack of neighborhood notification about patients eloping from TPH. Ms. Kersey was advised there was only 1 elopement/elopements this past year. Elopements are very infrequent. When they occur, an email is sent to the President of the Hilltonia Assn. who is responsible for notifying community residents. hilltonia.association.president@gmail.com is the email established for TPH to notify residents of an elopement. If that email is no longer operational, Mr. Hollen needs to be apprised of the current President's email address. Ms. Kersey will speak with the President to determine if the email remains active.

 Mr. Suppers commented on the need for outreach and education of the local community. He was pleased to know that assaults and violence are decreasing. He asked if there is a way for TPH to receive donations. Mr. Suppers was advised that donations may be made through the TPH Auxiliary.
