New Jersey City University stands on the threshold of its second century — a milestone not only of longevity, but of legacy, purpose, and resolve. This moment calls us to honor the struggles and sacrifices of those who came before us, many of whom were the first in their families to step into the halls of higher education, and to build a future that keeps the promise of opportunity within reach for all.

NJCU is more than a university; it is a vibrant, resilient community where dreams take root, aspirations are nurtured, and lives are transformed. Later this fall, we will unveil our **Strategic Plan for Student Development and Community Engagement**, completing the vision set forth in our NJCU Recovery and Revitalization Plan, Academic Master Plan, and Strategic Enrollment Plan — all anchored by our refreshed mission and vision.

Our commitment to access and opportunity extends through strategic partnerships, including the **Essex/NJCU Express** and **HCCC/NJCU Connect** programs, which create clear, supportive pathways for community college students to transition to NJCU. We are also proud to partner with the Boys & Girls Club of Hudson County in a groundbreaking initiative that brings the promise of higher education directly to high school students.

I. MAJOR CAPITAL PROJECTS

- Fitch ratings raised their outlook for NJCU from negative to stable citing all the significant progress towards achieving fiscal balance.
- Moody's upgrades NJCU from negative to stable and affirmed NJCU Ba2 issuer and revenue bond ratings.
- NJCU finalized a \$5.2 million transaction for the Honeywell Lot. This agreement includes a 99-year leaseback agreement.
- The long-term lease with Fort Monmouth challenge has been resolved at NJCU and this critical move is expected to reduce annual costs by \$2 million per year.

- Claremont/Hampshire sales represent a major milestone in NJCU's monetization strategy and have generated over \$ 9 million in net proceeds.
- Advancing capital improvements with major infrastructure projects underway: NJCU is tackling
 major maintenance projects to ensure the campus is both functional and prepared for the
 future. Projects include main furnace upgrades, Rossey Hall chiller replacement and five year
 plan to address the parking garage.
- A new deal between NJCU and the city's public schools which allows Jersey City Arts High Schools to lease entire floors of the campus and have access to other campus facilities.
- NJCU launched LIFT program aimed at helping those with special needs by launching the A Harry Moore School Life Independence and future Transition Program.
- New Jersey City University has been recognized as a top public school and leader in social mobility in US News & World Report's best colleges.
- NJCU has been named by the Military Times for being a veteran friendly college.
- MOU signed to enhance opportunities for students and Hispanic business communities which has created new educational and professional opportunities for NJCU students.
- NJCU and Jersey City Board of Ed signed a new agreement to strengthen visual & performing arts. The district will lease the upper floors at Grossnickle Hall for approximately \$1 million.
- Vodra Hall Dormitory Renovation: \$3.7 million
- Rossey Hall HVAC Chiller Project: \$2.1 million
- Hepburn Hall High pressure steam boiler project \$1.3 million
- A Harry Moore Expansion project: \$1.6 million
