Governor Murphy Appoints New Commissioner to the New Jersey Department of Human Services

Carole Johnson was appointed to be Commissioner of the Department of Human Services by Governor Phil Murphy. She previously served in the Obama White House as senior health policy advisor and member of the Domestic Policy Council health team. There, she worked to increase health insurance coverage for millions of Americans, improve services and choices for individuals with disabilities, expand supports for older Americans, increase coverage of mental health and substance use disorder treatment, and improve health and economic security for all Americans. The Commissioner-designate also has served on Capitol Hill working for the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging and for members of the U.S. Senate Finance Committee and U.S. House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee. In addition, she managed health care workforce policy issues for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Health Resources and Services Administration. Johnson previously was policy director for the Alliance of Community Health Plans, an association of nonprofit health plans; program officer with the Pew Charitable Trusts Health and Human Services Program; health policy researcher at the George Washington University; and, senior government relations manager with the American Heart Association.

Mr. Hock has been with the division since 1990. Prior to that he served in the DHS Office of the Commissioner's Quality Assurance Unit from 1982-1990. His career began in 1979 as a social worker in the Division of Youth and Family services investigating child abuse complaints.

New Jersey Hearing Aid Project

Free refurbished hearing aids for eligible low-income seniors are available through an innovative initiative by the New Jersey Division of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DDHH), Montclair State University, and Sertoma/Hearing Charities of America. Eligibility is limited to those individuals who are at least 65 years of age, are New Jersey residents, and have an income not exceeding 250% of the federal poverty level - \$27,189 if single or less than \$33,334 if married.

The project involves collecting used hearing aids, reconditioning the devices and dispensing to eligible New Jersey residents. To donate a used hearing aid to the project, please send in a padded envelope, box or unlabeled prescription container to:

Hearing Evaluation Council Seeks Members

The New Jersey Department of Health's Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) Program (www.nj.gov/health/fhs/nbs/ehdi/) is seeking an individual to represent New Jersey's Deaf community as a member of the EHDI advisory board, known as "The Hearing Evaluation Council." As per New Jersey Public Law (N.J.S.A. C.26:2-103.8), the role of the Hearing Evaluation Council (HEC) is 'to provide ongoing advice to the New Jersey EHDI Program regarding implementation of New Jersey's newborn hearing screening law and regulations.'

HEC members are appointed by the New Jersey Commissioner of Health and hold office for a term of two years and until each member's successor is appointed. HEC meetings are held between one to four times a year either in-person or via webinar with individual meetings lasting two hours in duration. In addition to a member of the Deaf community, New Jersey State mandate requires that the HEC be comprised of: a child of Deaf adult(s); a pediatrician; a person who is hard of hearing; an otolaryngologist; an audiologist and citizens of New Jersey who are interested in the concerns and welfare of children with hearing loss.

Any Deaf individual with an interest in New Jersey's universal newborn hearing screening program (serving children from birth to age three years), who wishes to apply for this volunteer position should send a letter of interest along with either a resume or a description of relevant attributes and experiences to:

New Jersey Department of Human Services

DIRECTOR, Division of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

The Director, as the chief administrative officer, assumes a position of leadership in directing and managing the overall goals and program of the Division of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DDHH). DDHH serves New Jersey residents who are deaf, hard of hearing, deaf-blind or have speech disorders. Services and programs are provided that foster independence and improve the quality of life for the individuals served. The DDHH provides information and referral services, provides technical assistance workshops related to hearing loss, and operates assistive technology device demonstration centers. In addition, the Division operates an Equipment Distribution Program and the New Jersey Hearing Aid Project, which provides reconditioned hearing aids to eligible applicants.

Job Description: This position reports to the Commissioner or other senior officials in the Department of Human Services and is responsible for supervising the Division's daily program management and administration as well as providing operation and policy direction. The Division Director advocates for New Jersey's deaf and hard of hearing citizens by promoting increased accessibility to programs, services and information routinely available to the State's population.

Qualifications: This position requires a Bachelor's degree supplemented by a Master's degree in Rehabilitation Counseling, Business Administration, Public Administration, Social Work, Education, Special Education or related field and a minimum eight (8) years of experience with programs for the deaf and hard of hearing, including five (5) years of supervisory experience in organization, administration, and fiscal management.

Note: A successful candidate is expected to have experience providing social/community, medical/health, rehabilitation/education, or vocational/occupational services with deaf and hard of hearing individuals. Competence in American Sign Language preferred as well as knowledge of Assistive Listening Devices.

Residency Law: The New Jersey First Act requires that public employees reside in New Jersey, unless exempted under the law or currently a NJ State government employee. If not a NJ resident, relocation must take place within one year after employment. Please refer to the New Jersey First Act.

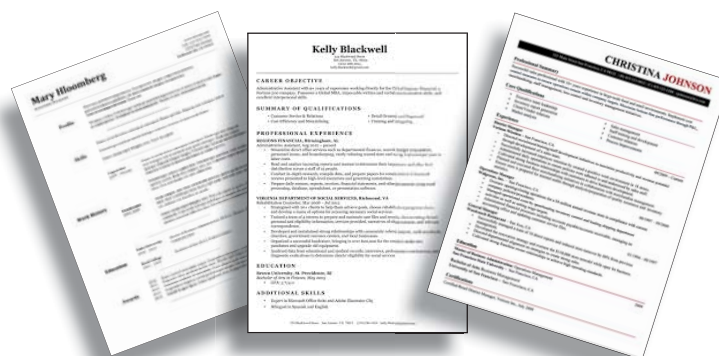
