## **Policy Overview**

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Sec. 3(36) defines the term "low-income individual" for the purposes of eligibility; this definition includes the following: An individual who is in a family with total family income that does not exceed the higher of the poverty line, or 70 percent of the lower living standard income level.

To facilitate the determination of low-income status for adults and youth under WIOA, we are forwarding the 2023 Poverty Guidelines and the 2023 Health and Human Services Lower Living Standard Income Levels. The Poverty Guideline for a single person is higher than the Lower Living Standard Income Level; in all other cases, the Lower Living Standard Income Level is the higher figure.
