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150th Engineers: Guard construction unit going overseas to deconstruct

When you mention Army engineers, most people think of them as building roads or constructing buildings. For the New Jersey Army National Guard's 150th Engineer Company, their mission in Afghanistan will be the opposite. They will be deconstructing.

The 113 Citizen-Soldiers received a sendoff at the Joint Military and Family Assistance Center in Bordentown, N.J., August 10. Among the well-wishers was New Jersey Lt. Gov. Kim Guadagno.

She addressed the capacity crowd, recalling how these engineers were on the frontlines during Hurricane Sandy replenishing protective berms. Now they are going to a different frontline.

"You are the generation that gives us hope that tomorrow will be truly better than today," said Guadagno.

The unit's mission this time is not restoring dunes, but returning areas in Afghanistan back to how they look prior to the military buildup.

"It is important, not only important in the respect that we are closing down FOBs (Forward Operating Bases) and reducing our nations footprint in Afghanistan, but also has the implied mission that we are helping to bring our brother Soldiers home," said Capt. Jeffrey Hager, commander of the horizontal engineer company.

Hager, of Pemberton Township, has been an officer in the unit since it was a detachment. He sees the mission ahead will not be easy. "But I know the 150th will take it all in stride," added Hager.

"The important work of the 150th in Afghanistan...will allow all of our troops to come home faster and our entire nation wants to thank you for that," said Guadagno.

She expressed her mixed emotions as a parent whose son is attending the Air Force Academy when Guadagno told the parents: "I can't imagine how hard it also is to let them go."

"They are heroes, they want to go," said Guadagno.

The final farewell was on Sunday as a pair of busses rolled out of Hammonton with a police and motorcycle escort. Nearly one hundred riders brought the soldiers to the gate of Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst where the motorcyclists dismounted and saluted the engineers as they entered the installation.

"Missing your loved one gets easier every day because even though it is one day further from the last time you saw them, it is one closer to next time you will," said Hager.

The 150th Engineer Company includes Citizen-Soldiers from 19 of the state's 21 counties. Four-dozen soldiers from Delaware will deploy with the New Jersey Guardsmen as they leave for mobilization training at Camp Shelby, Miss.

NJ National Guard Soldiers graduate War College

Five New Jersey Army National Guard officers crossed the podium at the U.S. Army War College as graduates during the commencement ceremony for the Army War College class of 2013 distance education program ceremony July 27 at the Carlisle Barracks.

Friday's graduation marks the largest class of New Jersey Army National Guard Officers to attend the course in recent history, according to Col. Walter L. Alvarado, Joint Forces Headquarters Chief of Staff.

Alvarado said the New Jersey Army Guard normally only receives three seats for the War College per year.

"It's important, because this helps us develop our strategic thinkers for the future," he said.

The U.S. Army War College educates and develops leaders for service at the strategic level while advancing knowledge in the global application of landpower. The course seeks to empower senior leaders to be skilled critical thinkers and complex problem solvers. Graduates of the course are also granted a master's degree in strategic studies.

For the graduates, the commencement marked the completion of a two-year ordeal, which tested their time and talents.

"It's a big relief, like taking off a ruck sack after a long road march," said Lt. Col. Edward Chrystal, recent graduate and deputy commander of the 50th Infantry Brigade Combat Team. "The biggest challenge of this non-residence course is balancing the course requirements with your full-time job and family."

For Chrystal and his fellow graduates, the course offered a chance to step outside of their comfort zone and experience the challenges they would face in the next level of leadership.

"I think critical thinking and strategic leadership are foundational for senior leaders, and I think we've all been taken out of our box, so to speak, and how to think as a total force instead of just a tactical unit," said Lt. Col Brian Scully, executive officer for the Joint Training and Training Development Center. "It's been a really wonderful and broadening experience," he said.

Scully said the course is designed to help senior leaders develop strategies to combat new and unprecedented challenges. Students of the course are presented with scenarios which have no traditional or tried-and-true solutions.

"Campaign planning at the end was particularly challenging," he said. "We were presented with problems where there was no solution, so you had to be willing choose the least bad option and really look at your priorities."

During the ceremony, keynote speaker, Lt. Gen. Jeffrey Talley, Chief of the U.S. Army Reserve, encouraged the class of 348 military officers and civilian leaders to take the lessons they learned there and seek assignments outside of their comfort zone.

"Figure out how you can be a better, broader leader," he said, "Serve in the interagency ... serve out of your regiment ... serve outside of your component ... serve outside of your Service – and America and the armed forces will be better served for you doing so."

Alvarado, a 2009 graduate of the school, echoed Talley's advice, encouraging the recent graduates to seek more challenging positions, and to expect to be challenged by their leadership more.

"We do expect more out of them now that they've graduated, we do expect them to be strategic leaders. With the Army constantly changing, we need adaptive leaders who are able make sure that we have an organization to successfully lead in the next 10-15 years."

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119th CSSB mechanics keep AT rolling along

FORT INDIANTOWN GAP, Pa. — Scorching rays from the unyielding early morning sun illuminate the scores of steel soldiers in the maintenance yard standing motionless in formation. Their plain, uniform color steel coats create a proud military display, while the way they are positioned seems as if they are eagerly waiting for their next set of orders to come. In the distance, the metal facade of the half raised 30-foot bay doors and a faint, rag-tag symphony of clanging metal tools, humming hydraulic instruments and colorful mechanic language fills the air.

"We keep the vehicles moving," said Sgt. Jeff Turner, acting motor pool sergeant and light wheel mechanic with the 119th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion (CSSB), New Jersey National Guard, while standing in an open bay near a torn-down high mobility multipurpose wheeled vehicle, or more commonly known as HMMWV.

Turner, a 16-year veteran and mechanic with the Army National Guard, has been with this unit for more than six years and is currently on his sixth Annual Training (AT) period with them. For Turner, this two-week training period presents an opportunity to continue honing his technical skills as well as develop his team by responding to both actual and simulated scenarios.

"On AT, we get to do our MOS (Military Occupational Specialty) most of the time," said Turner. "We maintain all the vehicles for the unit."

Pfc. John Bayers, a generator mechanic with the 119th CSSB, has been in the New Jersey Army National Guard for more than a year and is in the throes of his first AT period.

"This is what I've been waiting for," said Bayers.

Bayers felt confident and prepared for his first AT as a result of the intense preparation they completed in the preceding months. He

said they focused heavily on familiarization and learning the technical specifications for all the vehicles in use during AT.

Bayers said, "we're only on day three and we already have two vehicles that need to be up and running as a priority for AT."

All the mechanics in the 119th CSSB understand that having operational vehicles is critical and that it takes more than just training to complete a successful mission. It's the culmination of classroom knowledge and real-world application that has grown the level of experience and talent in the 119th CSSB.

"We do what we do to get the job done; we always find a way," said Turner.
