INTRODUCTION

New Jersey enjoyed another record-breaking year in 2021.

A grand total of 725 projects were filmed here from January to December. This includes 68 features, 10 telefilms and mini-series, 132 television series and specials, 34 music videos, 145 industrial, educational, documentary, and short films, 283 commercials and 53 web programs and webs series.

This production work generated \$501 million for the state economy, a record annual revenue. Projects receiving tax credits created 5,529 jobs in 2021.

Since the New Jersey Film and Digital Media Tax Credit Program was signed into law in 2018, revenue from film and television activity has increased 647%.

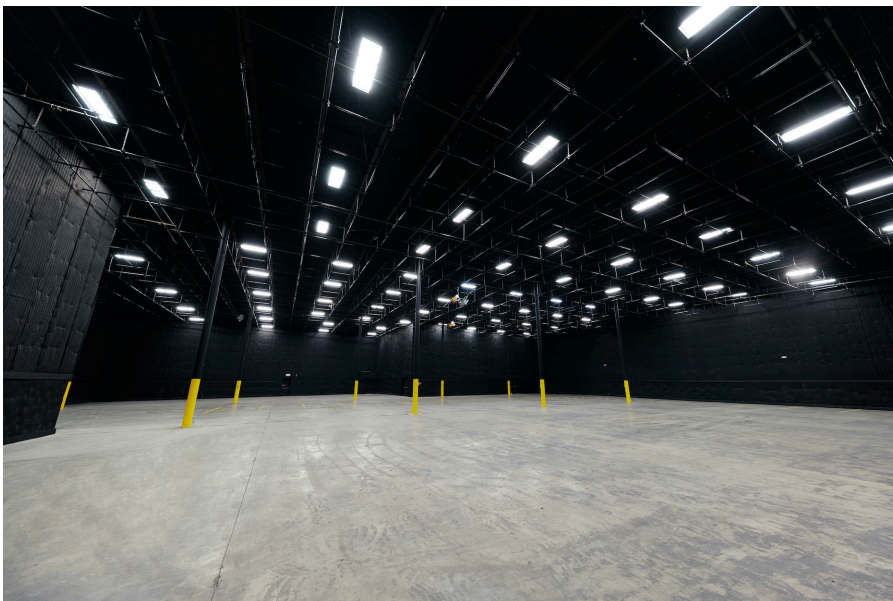
CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

While the COVID-19 pandemic slowed production activity to a crawl in 2020, social distancing, mask wearing, the availability of vaccines and strict COVID safety protocols on set brought the film industry roaring back to New Jersey in 2021. Back in 2018, I predicted that the Garden State Film and Digital Media Jobs Act would prove to be a complete game changer for our film and television industry. The COVID-19 pandemic is turning out to be another watershed moment, both in human history and within the entertainment industry economy. People forced to quarantine in their homes for months on end emerged with a voracious hunger for fresh content, and studios and networks were happy to provide them with new TV shows and movies to watch. The result:

New Jersey enjoyed over half a billion dollars in revenue from film production, shattering 2019's previous record total of \$421 million.

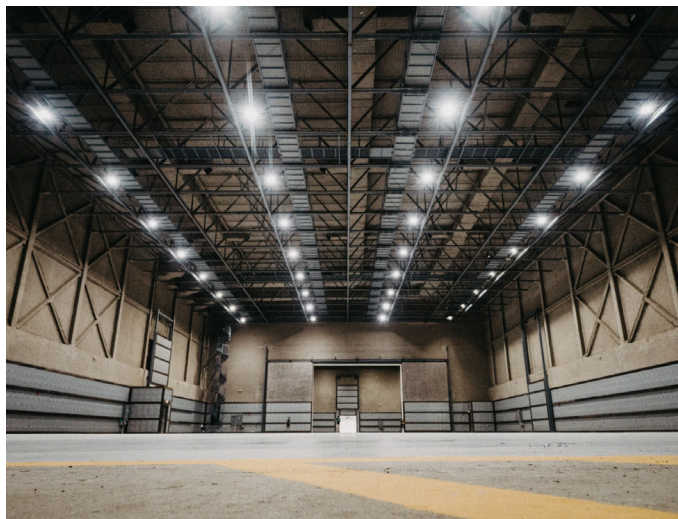
Productions chose New Jersey in record numbers last year, with the Commission receiving an average of about 14 new project inquiries per week. This is due to a multitude of factors, not all of them related to the pandemic. Certainly, production companies leery of working in the close confines of New York City came across the river to New Jersey and availed themselves of our abundance of practical locations, excellent cooperation from local governments and ample parking. They embraced our robust tax credit program and praised its diversity bonus, which attracted content creators seeking to make stories

focused on minority, women and LGBTQ+ themes. The final pieces of the puzzle fell into place starting in the spring when Palisade Stages, the first major soundstage built in-state, opened its doors in Kearny. Its 23,000 square feet of studio space was quickly booked. This news was followed two months later by the ribbon cutting for Cinelease Studios Caven Point in Jersey City, the first purpose-built soundstage in New Jersey containing three cavernous stages totaling 70,000 square feet. Another studio in Kearny is planning to open in early 2022, and studio developers have shown interest in constructing

soundstages in Bayonne, Secaucus, Newark, Fort Monmouth and Deerfield Township.

“Film in the state where filmmaking began” has been our slogan since 2019. New Jersey is the birthplace of the motion picture industry and we continue to celebrate that glorious history. New Jersey is experiencing a production renaissance, not only because of the record revenues the state has enjoyed, but also because New Jersey is reclaiming our important position in the international film community. Shakespeare said that past is prologue, and indeed the silent film era in New Jersey now informs the present and the future of the production industry. Look no further than the Academy Awards for evidence of this: in the pre-tax credit era, the last time we had a film shot in New Jersey enter the Best Picture race was in 2013 with *The Wolf of Wall Street*, which only shot for 3 days in Closter. However, since the first year of the tax credit, we have had at least one of our projects nominated for Best Picture each year: *Joker* and *The*

Irishman in the 2020 race, *The Trial of the Chicago 7* in 2021 and *West Side Story* in 2022. This is not an aberration – it has become a trend.

Not since *The Sopranos* have New Jersey locales been seen on so many screens across the world, and the excitement in our communities continues to increase, with residents reporting sightings of Oscar winners and nominees like Anthony Hopkins, Naomi Watts, Morgan Freeman, Ben Kingsley and Florence Pugh. And nothing better illustrates New Jersey’s return to its former glory as the Hollywood before Hollywood than the return of New Jersey celebrities to their home state. Zach Braff (*South Orange*), Kevin Smith (*Red Bank*), Anne Hathaway (*Millburn*) and Harlan Coben (*Newark*) all made projects in New Jersey in 2021, and we look forward to welcoming back more homegrown luminaries in future years.

2020 was a difficult, harrowing year for all of us, but it’s comforting to know that the imagination, creativity and dedication that power the film and television industry could not be dimmed by the pandemic. We’re grateful to Governor Murphy, his administration and our state legislators for their faith and the foresight to believe that, given the opportunity, the film industry would return to its roots. How exciting it is to know that this is only the beginning.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

A man leaves New York in 1967 to bring beer to his childhood buddies in the army while they are fighting in Vietnam. A forty-year-old woman with everything on the line - her high-stakes career, ticking biological clock, bank account - risks it all for a secret romance with the one person who could destroy her comeback. An elderly man discovers an alien spaceship that has mysteriously landed in his backyard. Twin brothers arrive at their mother's house and begin to suspect that something isn't quite right. These loglines seem to have little in common but this: they are all among the extremely diverse stories filmed in New Jersey this past year.

Skydance Media's *The Greatest Beer Run Ever*, starring Zac Efron and Bill Murray, is based on John Donahue's memoir of the same name. The film tells the true story of a 26-year-old U.S. Marines veteran who decides to sneak into the frontlines of the Vietnam War, track down his buddies and deliver messages of support (and beer) to them. Apple TV+ will be distributing Peter Farrelly's latest film, which shot at several locations in Jersey City, including White Eagle Hall, the Barrow Mansion, Van

Voorst Park and St. Anthony of Padua Catholic Church. St. Joseph's Church in Paterson and an apartment building in Newark were also used in the film.

Gabrielle Union, known for such romantic comedies as *She's All That* and *Bring It On*, starred in and produced *The Perfect Find* for AGC Studios and Netflix in Jersey City, Newark and Orange. The film is another adaptation of a novel, this one by Tia Williams, where Union plays a fashion editor whose life falls apart after she's fired from her magazine and dumped by her fiancé. She takes a job at a rival publication and struggles to persuade her new

coworkers, all digital savvy millennials, that her old school values have merit. Worse, she finds herself attracted to the handsome, 22-year-old videographer assigned to work with her. Filming took place in office buildings in Journal Square, Liberty State Park, the Newark Museum, Military Park, Halsey Street in Newark and the National Newark Building, which also provided production office space.

Hampshire in the final season of *The Sopranos*. The many locations utilized in *Jules* include the municipal buildings in both Boonton Town and Township and Rockaway Valley and Powerville Roads. Filming also took place at a house in Chatham, an office building in Little Falls, Corrado's Market in Fairfield, Bell Works, the Gibraltar Rock Quarry in Belle Mead and Supor Studios in Harrison.

Hollywood always looks across the ocean for opportunities to remake foreign films. The 2014 horror movie *Goodnight Mommy*, Austria's entry for the Academy Award, has become a cult classic since its release. Animal Kingdom, purveyors of such modern horror pictures as *It Follows* and *It Comes at Night*, produced the English language version featuring Naomi Watts. She plays the mother of twin boys, played by Cameron and Nicholas Crovetti, who arrive at her country home to find her completely covered in bandages from plastic surgery. Slowly, the boys begin to suspect that this woman is not really their mother after all. Amazon Studios is releasing the film, which was shot entirely at a house in Bedminster.

Academy Award winner Sir Ben Kingsley and Emmy winner Jane Curtin star in *Jules*, a comedy-drama from Big Beach Films, the production company behind such Oscar nominated films as *Little Miss Sunshine* and *A Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood*. After an alien crash-lands in his backyard, Kingsley's character and an unlikely group of people come together to help this extraterrestrial stranger find his way back home and, through their trials, find a deeper friendship with each other. The director, Marc Turtletaub, hasn't worked in New Jersey since the mid-2000's, when he produced the indie films *Duane Hopwood* in Atlantic City and *Sherrybaby* in Union and Essex Counties. The producers of *Jules* sought a charming rural town and set their sights on Boonton and Boonton Township, which previously stood in for New

that she can't explain. This is the first feature from director Parker Finn, who adapted his 2020 short *Laura Hasn't Slept*, the winner of the Special Jury Recognition Award at the SXSW Film Festival. Among the many locations used for the film are the recently closed Union County Jail in Elizabeth, the W Hotel in Hoboken, the Arlington Diner in North Arlington, the Murphy Varnish Lofts and Rutgers University in Newark.

Kevin Smith has considered making a third *Clerks* film since 2013. Last year he finally did and, fittingly, he returned to his original location, the humble but

working at the convenience store, so expect plenty of meta commentary and callbacks to previous entries in the View Askewniverse. In addition to the Quick Stop, Basic Center Cinemas and Gianni's Pizza in Red Bank, the Matawan Cemetery and the Bayshore Medical Center in Holmdel were used as locations.

Speaking of indie royalty, Zach Braff also returned to his home state for his latest film, *A Good Person*. Audiences enjoyed his character on the ABC sitcom *Scrubs*, and locations in North Jersey served as the backdrop for his first film, 2004's *Garden State*. This time around he brought his then-girlfriend, the Marvel

now historic Quick Stop in Leonardo where he made the 1994 film that launched his career. This time, however, Smith did not need to film during off-hours when he wasn't working the front counter and his budget was considerably larger than \$27,000. The threequel reunites original cast members Brian O'Halloran and Jeff Anderson as Dante and Randall, along with *Clerks II* additions Rosario Dawson and Trevor Fehrman, and of course features Smith and childhood best friend Jason Mewes as Jay and Silent Bob. The plot begins after Randall has a heart attack and decides he wants to make a movie about

Cinematic Universe's new *Black Widow*, Florence Pugh, along with Morgan Freeman, Molly Shannon and Celeste O'Connor. Pugh plays Allison, whose life falls apart following her involvement in a fatal accident that was filmed on the NJ Turnpike extension in the Meadowlands. Braff also returned to his alma mater, Columbia High School in Maplewood (class of '93), for some filming, even casting one of the teachers as an extra. Beyond the neighborhoods where he grew up in and around the Oranges, Braff also shot at the Loyola Jesuit Center in Morristown, Dingbatz in Clifton, Pastime Bar in Elizabeth and a house in Rutherford.

Yet another successful New Jerseyan returned home last year: Anne Hathaway. The Millburn native starred in a mystery-drama entitled *Eileen*, shot entirely in North Jersey. Endeavor Content and Likely Story produced the film for Searchlight Pictures. It is based on Ottessa Moshfegh's novel set at a prison facility, where a woman's friendship with a new co-worker takes a sinister turn. Thomasin McKenzie (*Jojo Rabbit*) and Shea Whigham (*Boardwalk Empire*) costar, with William Oldroyd in the director's chair for his follow up to 2016's critically acclaimed *Lady Macbeth*. The script takes place in a fictional, blue collar New England town in the 1950's. A house in Cranford, a liquor store in downtown Metuchen and the Bergen New Bridge Medical Center in Paramus were chosen as the locations for the film.

Eileen was not the only film that Anne Hathaway starred in last year. The Oscar winner paired with legendary actor Sir Anthony Hopkins for James Gray's newest film, *Armageddon Time*. While not a New Jerseyan himself, Gray has directed two previous films in the Garden State: *The Yards* (2000) and *Two Lovers* (2008). For his latest drama, Gray found inspiration in his childhood growing up in Queens during the 1980s. The film costars Emmy winner Jeremy Strong, last seen in Aaron Sorkin's Best Picture nominee *The Trial of the*

Chicago 7, and features a cameo by Jessica Chastain playing Maryanne Trump Barry. Focus Features is producing and distributing the film, which received a seven-minute standing ovation at the 2022 Cannes Film Festival. Locations include Avenue A in Bayonne, the Sacred Heart Recreation Center in Jersey City and a house in Teaneck.

New Jersey's contributions to popular music can't be overstated, and a number of music-themed motion pictures have been filmed here, including *Eddie and the Cruisers*, *Cadillac Records*, *The Perfect Age of Rock 'n' Roll* and *Jersey Boys*. The latest music biopic to be made here is *Spinning Gold*, the story of Neil Bogart and his legendary recording company, Casablanca Records. Fittingly, it is written and directed by his son, Timothy Scott Bogart, and was filmed largely at a warehouse in the Kearny Point Industrial Complex. The facility was used to replicate the recording studio where acts such as KISS, Donna Summers, the Isley Brothers, Gladys Knight, Parliament and the Village People would record their hit records. The film boasts an intriguing cast including Michelle Monaghan, Jason Isaacs, Michael Ian Black, Peyton List, Dan Fogler, Sebastian Maniscalco and Jay Pharoah.

Judd Apatow is producing *Bros* for Universal Pictures, and it is a major achievement in representation for the LGBTQ+ community. Not only is the film one of the first romantic comedies about two gay men from a major studio, but all the roles are played by openly LGBTQ+ cast members, even the straight characters. Comedian and actor Billy Eichner will also make history as the first openly gay man to co-write and star in his own studio film. Nicholas Stoller, a veteran of Apatow Productions, having directed *Forgetting Sarah Marshall* and *Get Him to the Greek*, co-wrote and

directed this film about two men with commitment problems who attempt a relationship with each other. Among the locations used in the film are downtown Cranford, The Fox and the Falcon in South Orange, an

apartment building on Moore Street in Hackensack, St. Mary’s Hospital in Passaic, a house in Nutley and various locations in Newark, including the Newark Museum and the Method Climbing Gym on Lombardy Street.

Jersey City was abuzz last fall with yet another celebrity sighting: Nicholas Braun, the tall, lanky actor known for playing Cousin Greg on HBO’s *Succession*, was seen standing in front of local pub Fox & Crow on Palisade Avenue. He was appearing in the new thriller *Cat Person*, about the brief relationship between a twenty-year-old sophomore college student and an older man who is a regular at the movie theater where she works. The script is based on a very successful short story that appeared in *The New*

Yorker magazine in 2017. Emilia Jones, the breakout star of 2022 Best Picture winner *CODA*, stars opposite Braun, and the film also features Isabella Rossellini, Hope Davis and Michael Gandolfini. In addition to Jersey City, the film also shot at the former Toys R Us headquarters in Wayne, the Seventh Avenue neighborhood in Newark, Fairleigh Dickinson University, downtown Cranford, Teaneck Cinemas and a house in Livingston. Susanna Fogel joins a long line of successful female directors who have produced outstanding work in New Jersey, including Penny Marshall (*Big, Riding in Cars with Boys, The Preacher’s Wife*), Susan Seidelman (*Desperately Seeking Susan, She-Devil*), Nora Ephron (*You’ve Got Mail*), Darnell Martin (*Cadillac Records*) and Halle Berry with her recent directorial debut *Bruised*.

The *Big Bang Theory* fans received an unexpected treat in early 2022 when Mayim Bialik’s first directorial effort, *As They Made Us*, premiered in theaters. Bialik was entirely behind the camera for the film, which she also wrote. She shot it in June and July, which is even more impressive considering she was also the host of *Jeopardy* from May through early June. The film stars *Glee* actress Dianna Agron

as a divorced mom trying to find new love and make peace with her dysfunctional family, played by Dustin Hoffman, Candice Bergen and *Big Bang Theory*

costar Simon Helberg. Yale Productions produced the film, which is the third project they've shot in-state since the beginning of the tax credit program. While the script was written for Los Angeles, filming took place at Felician University and various other locations in Rutherford, a condo complex in Clifton and houses in Bloomfield, Belleville and Glen Ridge.

Dr. Ibram X. Kendi has been a leading voice promoting equity and racial justice in America. In January 2021, Netflix announced that they would be partnering with Dr. Kendi to produce three new projects based on his work. One of them, *Stamped from the Beginning*, was filmed at Cobalt Stages in Hoboken. The film is a hybrid documentary/scripted feature directed and produced by Oscar and Emmy Award-winner Roger Ross Williams (*The Apollo*) through his production company One Story Up and executive produced by NAACP Image Award-winner Mara Brock Akil (*Being Mary Jane*). The filming will be completed in 2022; no release date is set yet.

A number of telefilms and miniseries were produced in New Jersey throughout the year. Jared Leto stars as Adam Neumann in the Apple TV+ miniseries *WeCrashed*, about the rise and fall of WeWork. Anne Hathaway costars as his wife Rebekah and filming took place at the Star Lake Camp in Bloomingdale for 5 days. Blumhouse Television produced a documentary series for HBO Max called *What Happened, Brittany Murphy?* about the eponymous actress who died under disputed circumstances when she was only 32. Although born in Atlanta, Murphy was raised by her mother in Edison and the filmmakers visited her old neighborhood to gather footage for the show. An 8-part series for Hulu called *Mike* will explore the wild, tragic and controversial life and career of heavyweight champion Mike Tyson. Featuring Moonlight breakout star Trevonte Rhodes and directed by Craig Gillespie, the mind behind the Oscar nominated *I, Tonya*, the film shot at a closed

police precinct in Newark, a house in Bloomfield and in an area close to Tyson's former mansion in Bernardsville. Another project, along with *Bros*, that explores and celebrates the LGBTQ+ community is the Amazon docuseries *Always Jane*, about transgender teenager Jane Noury, who lives in Sparta. The four-part series spotlights Jane and her family as she nears high school graduation and prepares for college. She is pursuing a career in modeling and acting and appeared in Rihanna's *Savage X Fenty Vol. 3* fashion show, which premiered on Amazon in September 2021. The co-head of television for Amazon Studios, Vernon Sanders, said the show "is a revealing look at one family's uplifting and heartfelt journey, anchored by Jane's incredible candor and wit about her life thus far. We know Jane's triumphant story and her extraordinary family will resonate with our Prime Video viewers."

Television Series and Specials had another big year. The first major television project to shoot in New Jersey following the pandemic shutdown was season one of the CBS crime series *The Equalizer*, starring Newark's own Queen Latifah in the title role most recently played by Denzel Washington in two major motion pictures. Filming continued through May 2021, and three episodes of Season 2 were shot in NJ beginning last October.

Network police procedurals are ever popular, and CBS's *FBI: Most Wanted*, Dick Wolf's spin-off of

his popular FBI show, continued filming seasons 2 and 3 in New Jersey. Among the many North Jersey locations used were the Alpine Scout Camp, the Renaissance Newark Airport Hotel in Elizabeth, the Prudential Center and American Dream in East Rutherford.

Law and Order: Organized Crime, another Dick Wolf production, was a cause for celebration among the die-hard fans of the long-running Law & Order series as well as for New Jerseyans. Starting in 1999 and for many years hence, Law & Order: Special Victims Unit filmed in a North Bergen studio and in nearby cities and towns. This new spin-off brings back fan-favorite character Detective Elliot Stabler, memorably played by Christopher Meloni. Season One filmed at the Newark Museum, Newark City Hall, Liberty State Park and Bell Works.

Ben Stiller last worked in New Jersey in 2000, starring in and directing scenes for the comedy classic Zoolander. More recently, Stiller is exclusively working behind the camera on Endeavor Content's critically acclaimed Apple TV+ series Severance, which stars Adam Scott, Patricia Arquette, John Turturro and Christopher Walken as employees of a company that surgically divides its employees' memories between their work and personal lives. This unique show, described as equal parts satirical and terrifying, shot at Bell Works, the former Bell Laboratories, whose mid-century modern design perfectly fit with the cold, corporate aesthetic that Stiller was aiming for. The show will be returning to Holmdel in late 2022 for its second season.

Horror maestro M. Night Shyamalan, who previously crossed the Delaware River from Philadelphia in 2003 for his fourth feature, The Village, has returned. Season 3 of his Apple TV+ show Servant stars Rupert Grint of Harry Potter fame, along with Toby Kebbell and Lauren Ambrose. Ocean City served as the backdrop for the Season 3 premiere, with the entire main cast present on the boardwalk for the filming.

Harlan Coben, the prolific, award-winning author of mysteries and thrillers, was born in Newark, raised in Livingston and now lives in Ridgewood. His novels are frequently set in the suburbs of New Jersey, but heretofore none of the film or TV adaptations had been shot in his home state. That changed in 2021 when MGM adapted his 2011 book Shelter, the first part of a young adult crime saga, as a pilot for an Amazon series which has since been greenlit and will be filming in 2022. The story centers around a teenager investigating his girlfriend's disappearance and discovering that it may be connected to his father's untimely death years earlier. Livingston High School was appropriately used as a location, along with the Americana Diner in West Orange, the Oakeside Cultural Center in Bloomfield, downtown Newark, the Union Beach Police Department and Veterans Memorial Park in Keyport.

Ways and Means stars Patrick Dempsey as a jaded politician working across the aisle with an idealistic young Congresswoman to break through the gridlock in Washington. This pilot for a proposed series shot for multiple weeks at numerous locations in the state, including Trenton City Hall, Newark City Hall, NJPAC, Fairleigh Dickinson University, Wightman's Farm in Harding and St. Peter's Church in Morristown.

In the early 1990's, west coast rappers dominated the hip hop scene, but that all changed in 1993 with the release of *Enter the Wu-Tang: The 36 Chambers*. That album from the 9 member Wu-Tang Clan, along with albums from the Notorious B.I.G. and Nas, brought attention back to the east coast rap scene. The story of the group's ascent to stardom is told in the Hulu series *Wu-Tang: An American Saga*. Season 2 of this critically acclaimed show was filmed in a studio at Kearny Point and a warehouse in Secaucus, and on location in Liberty State Park, NJPAC, the Second Presbyterian Church in Elizabeth, Newark Symphony Hall, Military Park, the Robert Treat Hotel, the National Newark Building, the Hoboken PATH Station and Park East Terrace in Paterson. The third and final season is set to film in New Jersey in 2022.

Two variety competition shows were filmed in New Jersey during the last 12 months. The first was *Wild 'N Out*, the long-running MTV show created and hosted by Nick Cannon. The entirety of Season 17 was filmed at Cinelease Studios Caven Point. Cinelease's layout worked perfectly, as Viacom needed one stage to shoot on and another to build and store the show's elaborate sets.

The second was USA Network's *America's Big Deal*, filmed in an historic theater in downtown Newark. The COVID-19 pandemic touched every industry, and its economic effects will linger for years to come. Movie theaters and performing arts centers were hit particularly hard and like many such venues, Newark Symphony Hall struggled through the pandemic. The location was understandably ecstatic when *America's Big Deal* chose Symphony Hall to live broadcast the show's first season. This is a competition show with a bit of the flavor of *Shark Tank*: in each episode, five entrepreneurs have the opportunity to sell their respective products on TV and to a panel of experienced businesspeople, and the winners can have those products sold in big box or chain stores. Filming began in mid-October and continued through the end of the year.

New Jersey continues to host a large number of popular reality shows. Joining *The Real Housewives of New Jersey* and *Jersey Shore Family Vacation* in the drama

category were MTV's *Families of the Mafia*, *We TV's Love After Lockup*, Bravo's *Summer House* and TLC's *90 Day Fiancé: The Other Way*. From the culinary tourism genre, *Fly Brother* with Ernest White II took viewers around Newark, specifically Vonda's Kitchen and Seabra's Marisqueira; *American Restaurant: Then and Now* visited Mastoris Diner & Restaurant in Bordentown; and *Man vs. Food* took on eating challenges at No Pao Restaurant in Newark, Tito's Burritos and Wings in South Orange and Jimmy Buff's Restaurant in West Orange. True crime fanatics could tune into the Investigation Discovery or Oxygen Networks and see New Jersey locations in *I Survived a Serial Killer*; *Murder Nation*; *New York Homicide*; *Where Murder Lies*; *Murder Under the Friday Night Lights*; *Unsolved Mysteries*; *Accident, Suicide or Murder*; *Cold Case Files*; *True Crime Story: Indefensible*; *Killer Siblings*; *Accused: Guilty or Innocent*; *Calls from Inside*; *Evil Lives Here* and *Snapped*. Fan of horror and the paranormal will be pleased to know that *Ghost Hunters* visited the White Hill Mansion in Fieldsboro hoping for a supernatural encounter, and *The Movies That Made Us* went to the original Camp Crystal Lake, Camp No-Be-Bo-Sco in Hardwick, to film an episode on the making of *Friday the 13th*. On the lighter side, *The Great Christmas Light Fight* decorated a house on Deerfield Drive in Florham Park, and Pompton Plains native Jason Biggs showed up at New Jersey houses offering \$25,000 if families could complete a series of challenges for E!'s *Cash at Your Door*.

The state hosted a bounty of commercials and still shoots in 2021. Whoopi Goldberg, a resident of West Orange, appeared in a commercial for Nurtec, shot in a house in Montclair. South Park Studios and Comedy Central shot a hilarious ode to the show for its 25th anniversary at NJPAC. Production company O Positive made a YouTube TV commercial in a house in Montclair, a spot that would air during Super Bowl LVI. The *Sports Illustrated Swimsuit Edition* once again landed in New Jersey, this time featuring American supermodel Haley Kalil at the Hard Rock Hotel in Atlantic City. And Eli Manning starred in a promo for the National Football League, shot in Liberty State Park and at the Miss America Diner in Jersey City.

The Industrial, Educational, Documentary and Short Films category saw a number of very interesting projects this year. Student filmmakers from film

schools like New York University, Columbia University and Montclair State University showed up in droves to shoot their undergrad and graduate films. A variety of feature film trailers and sizzle reels were produced here. And NFL Films shot some internal content with MMA star Ronda Rousey and former New York Ranger Tie Domi.

Music video production enjoyed a resurgence as well, some featuring the return of New Jersey born performers who have risen to international fame. Jack Antonoff, who grew up in Woodcliff Lake and New Milford, returned to Bergen County with his band Bleachers for the video “Stop Making This Hurt,” filmed at the Bendix Diner in Hasbrouck Heights. The music video was nominated for Best Alternative at the 2021 MTV Video Music Awards. Folk rock band The Lumineers also returned to their hometown of Ramsey for “A.M. Radio,” which was shot at Ramsey High School, where founding members Wesley Schultz and Jeremiah Fraites attended, among other locations. And Bruce Springsteen teamed up with John Mellancamp for “Wasted Days,” shot in Asbury Park. Other projects of note include two videos for Reggaeton sensation J

Balvin, both shot at ODR Studios in Newark, and the latest from rapper Nas, teaming up with R&B singer Khalid for “Checkmate.” It was filmed at The Art Factory in Paterson, a very popular location for music videos.

The number of webcasts jumped dramatically as well, including many projects with interesting and intriguing content. The video platform Broadstream is now home to the web series Second Act Snacks, which reviews the food mentioned in Broadway musicals. For their “Jersey Boys” episode, the hosts traveled to Rocket Fizz in Marlton and Belleville Pizza in Belleville. The Daily Show with Trevor Noah shot a branded content piece, partnering with Audi and featuring Daily Show correspondent Desi Lydic, at a house in South Orange. And Barstool Sports, the digital media company that produces content focused on sports, pop culture and pizza, made a cross country competition web series called Barstool vs. America. The premise: 10 days, 8 Barstool Sports employees, 5 cities, \$40,000 and a Jersey Shore beach house on the line. The final episode of the show was filmed on the beaches of Brigantine and Atlantic City.

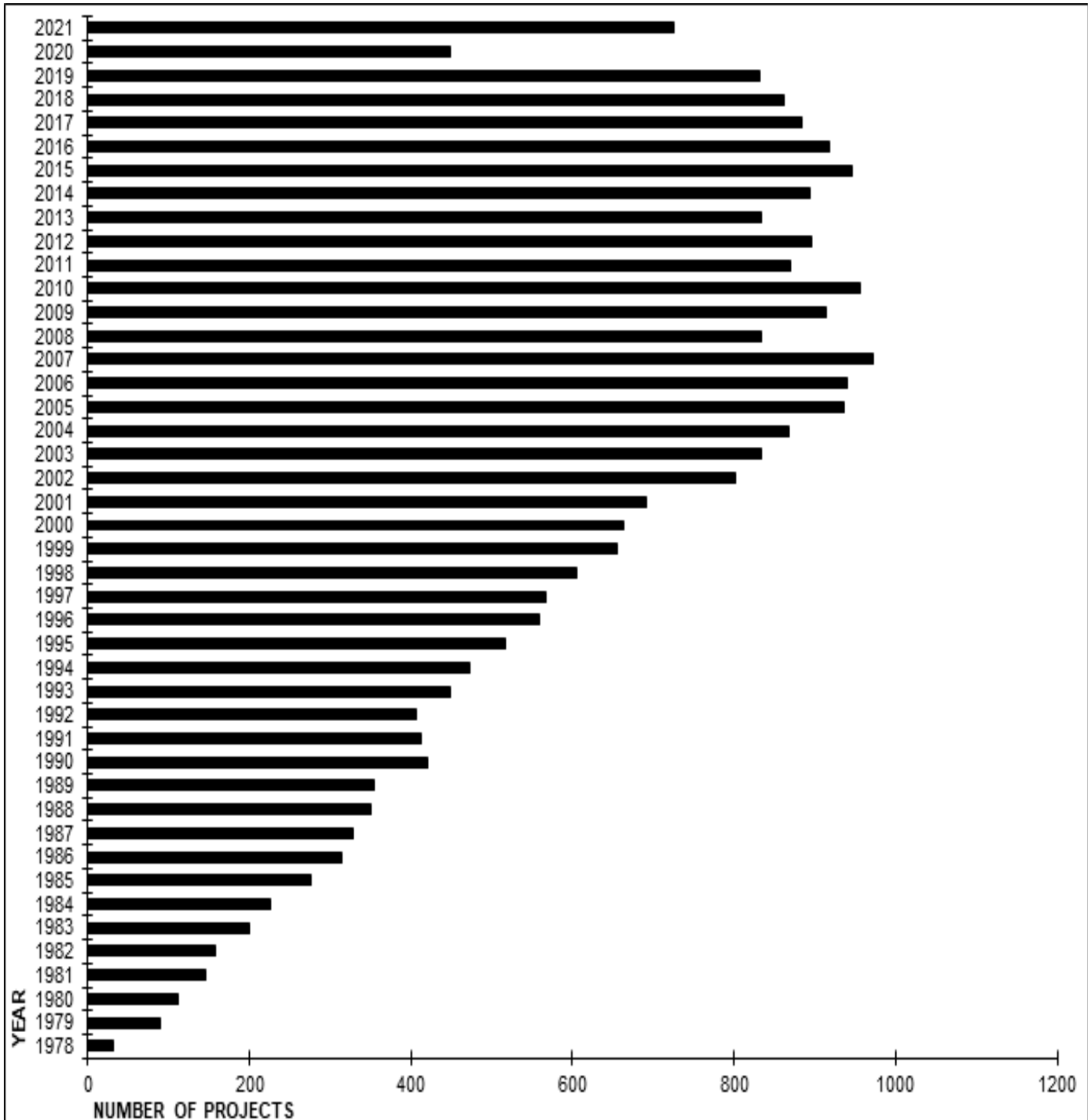

ECONOMIC IMPACT REPORT

A grand total of 725 motion picture and television projects were produced in New Jersey in 2021, enhancing the state economy by \$500,510,724. This includes 29 tax credit projects that generated close to \$400 million in economic activity, created 5,500 jobs and accounted for almost one third of last year's total shooting days. This employment number does not account for the construction jobs created during the construction phase of the state's two new studios, as well as the full-time staff positions at Cinelease Studios Caven Point and Palisade Stages.

Movie and television production improves the local economy in different ways, and its effect on our communities can resonate for years afterward. Let's look at some of the large and small ways that filmmaking has impacted the Garden State.

It's easy to distill the conversation about local spend down to permit fees paid to municipalities and location fees worked out with property owners, but they represent only a small fraction of the money that productions will spend on location. Those who have witnessed a film crew at work know that they usually consist of a battalion of people, all working to realize the producer and director's vision. As such, productions also must rent parking lots for crew and production vehicles, holding facilities for the cadre of extras that will be needed for crowd scenes and catering facilities for meal breaks. A Good Person, for example, filmed in Clifton and rented parking at Montclair State University and the Montclair Swim Club. While filming in Bayonne, Armageddon Time established a basecamp at Veterans Stadium near Bayonne High School. Cat Person used the Life Christian Church and the Essex House in West Orange for their holding and catering facilities. Jules filmed for 4 days in the Town of Boonton and used the Boonton Elks Lodge for their holding and catering. When Law & Order: Organized Crime filmed at Liberty Landing Marina, they rented the Liberty House Restaurant for their parking and staging. NJPAC rented out their parking lot to the 82 vehicles used by Smile when shooting took place at the Murphy Varnish Lofts in Newark. CBS'

Ways and Means shot in 2021 before the widespread availability of COVID vaccines so the producers had to reserve two separate locations in Trenton for the main crew and the extras, and when the show shot at Newark City Hall, they used the Prudential Center as holding for 190 people.

The increase in film production in New Jersey has also afforded New Jersey residents more opportunities to work in front of and behind the camera. Free production assistant Boot Camps, sponsored by NBCUniversal, were held in Newark in March and Old Bridge in November. They enabled younger New Jersey residents, with a special emphasis on women and people of color fresh out of college, to get a foot in the door of the production industry. Other valuable opportunities arose as well. The History Channel's The Food that Built America and Empires of Excess shot back-to-back at Ironbound Studios in Newark and employed 10 local production assistants, 5 locals in the art department and another 5 locals in the construction department. America's Big Deal also hired PA's from Newark and put out a call for paid audience members on the New Jersey Motion Picture and Television Commission's website and social media. Armageddon Time and Cat Person asked the Commission to circulate flyers looking to fill cast and crew positions, offering opportunities in their production office, art department, props department, locations department, on their COVID compliance team and as set PA's. A Good Person casted minors from Newark and Belvidere while Harlan Coben's Shelter cast an actor from Flemington.

The promotional value to hosting a film or television production should never be overlooked. Viewers tend to seek out the locations they see in their favorite movies and TV shows; just look at the film tourism that has resulted from The Sopranos. That show ended in 2007 but interest in it has sustained. The evolution of social media into platforms where celebrities can connect with their legions of fans has also created opportunities for local businesses to get unique exposure. When Gabrielle Union was in

Newark making *The Perfect Find*, she posted to her over 20 million followers on Instagram that “Halsey Street is a vibe...PERIOD.” She then highlighted 12 Newark businesses that gifted her various products, including hats, socks and coffee, and gave a special mention to Closet Savvy Consignment where she bought an outfit. The *Big Bang Theory* fans that closely followed the production of Mayim Bialik’s directorial debut *As They Made Us* also were made aware of Yellow Rose Vegan in Maplewood when the film’s Instagram account posted a thank you to the business for providing vegan kosher pastries and a tie-dye cake to their crew appreciation party.

The excitement in our municipalities has been palpable as well, with several towns sharing their great experiences hosting film productions in their communities. Caren Demyen, the downtown director in Cranford, raved about their experience with *Cat Person*, saying that the film’s location manager, Rob Coleman, was “very detailed in his communication and took the time to get to know everyone in the Township. He made the entire process very easy and I think a lot of people didn’t even know the movie was filming in town!” Middlesex County allowed *Law & Order: Organized Crime* to use their County Prosecutor’s Office Training Center in Edison, and the production was gracious enough to host a meet and greet between county officials and Christopher Meloni. *America’s Big Deal* paid New Jerseyans \$50 per day to join the audience of the competition show. And the president and CEO of Newark Symphony Hall, Taneshia Laird, could not speak more highly of hosting *Wu-Tang: An American Saga*, saying that their rental of the venue represented the first earnings they had since March 2020, over a year earlier.

It works both ways. Once a production comes to NJ and witnesses all that we have to offer, they’ll want to come back. The producer of the Endeavor Content movie *Eileen*, Jamin O’Brien, who previously filmed the Amazon feature *Chemical Hearts* in the state, told the Commission that he was very excited to return to NJ and that he has two other projects he would like to bring here. Josh Church, an executive at Apatow Productions, told the Commission, “We had such a fantastic time shooting *Bros* in New Jersey, thank you again for all your help along the way. I know there were well-timed emails and calls when we needed

some help, much appreciated.” And the producers of *Jules* were so charmed by Boonton that they told the town’s officials that they are considering calling the fictional town in the film “Boonton.”

Specific examples of NJ-based businesses that the tax credit projects used include:

- *A Good Person*, which hired In Thyme Catering, based in Moonachie.
- *Cat Person* used George’s Meals on Wheels out of North Bergen for their catering
- *Clerks III* used Galloway casting agency Weist/Baron/Ryan Casting and George’s Meals on Wheels as well.
- *Goodnight Mommy* used Roadhouse Catering in Haworth.
- While scouting Hudson County locations for *The Greatest Beer Run Ever*, director Peter Farrelly stayed at the Hyatt Regency Jersey City.
- *The Perfect Find* used Newark’s Cornbread Soul and Jersey City’s Vibe Juice to cater their wrap party.
- *Sparkle - A Unicorn Tale* used Kphat Productions based in Swedesboro as their production services company. Owner Roy Koriakin has several other projects coming up in 2022.
- *Spinning Gold* rented film equipment from Union Township’s Monster Remotes.
- *Ways and Means* filmed during record snowfalls in New Jersey; as a result, they hired a local snow removal company in Trenton to clear the streets and sidewalks around their filming locations at the State House Complex and Trenton City Hall, and paid \$20,000 for their services.
- *Wu-Tang: An American Saga* reserved 10 rooms at the Marriott in Lyndhurst.

Wild ‘N Out, which filmed a full season’s worth of shows at Cinelease Studios in October, was gracious enough to share very detailed budgetary information with our office; let’s take a closer look at how they spent their dollars in-state to exemplify the ways that a production can provide a huge boost to the local economy. 4Wall Entertainment based in Moonachie provided rentals for the set, lighting and

camera equipment in the amount of \$738,510. Herc Rentals, which has an office in Newark, provided the grip equipment for \$32,644. The show’s art department purchased construction materials at Dyke’s Lumberyard in Weehawken, in addition to the local Lowe’s, for a total of \$467,006. All Racks Industries in Linden provided the metal racks for the wardrobe department at a cost of \$2,575. In terms of supplies for the various departments, the production paid \$71,000 for the production office, \$32,585 for make-up and wardrobe and \$565,282 for props and set purchases and rentals.

Host and executive producer Nick Cannon, along with the other members of the cast and talent, stayed at the W Hoboken, Courtyard by Marriott and the Westin; the spend for this line item was \$107,450. Cast and crew members needed to be shuttled back and forth to set; the total for renting shuttles, paying for parking and taking Ubers came to \$672,421. In Thyme, the aforementioned Moonachie catering company, provided meals for the cast and crew at a cost of \$112,471. The production spent \$37,260 on stocking the green rooms for the cast and talent; shopping for this was done at the Sephora at Newport Centre Mall as well as the local Panera, BJ’s, Acme, Chick-Fil-A, Target and of course Uber Eats. Hard Out Productions, a company based in East Hanover,

provided folding tables for \$10,482. And while film productions have been making strides to minimize their carbon footprint, trash removal will always be an important service - this production used Wilenta Carting in Secaucus for trash removal and dumpsters and was charged \$8,982.

As our chairman mentioned in his introduction, the New Jersey film and television industry is experiencing a wonderful renaissance. And just as the European Renaissance was characterized by a reverence for classical antiquity and an effort to surpass those ideas and achievements, New Jersey’s production renaissance pays homage to the pioneers of the film industry like Thomas Edison, Alice Guy Blaché and Oscar Micheaux, who expanded the art form of cinema, built studios in-state and produced important works that speak to the cultural and sociological shifts happening in American society. At the same time, we are surpassing the wildest dreams of those early filmmakers, bringing award-winning talent back to the Garden State, amazing artists who are producing films that are groundbreaking on multiple levels. To paraphrase the tagline for Louis Malle’s 1980 Best Picture nominee Atlantic City, New Jersey is “where dreamers can become winners.” The sky’s the limit, and the citizens of the great Garden State are coming along for the ride.

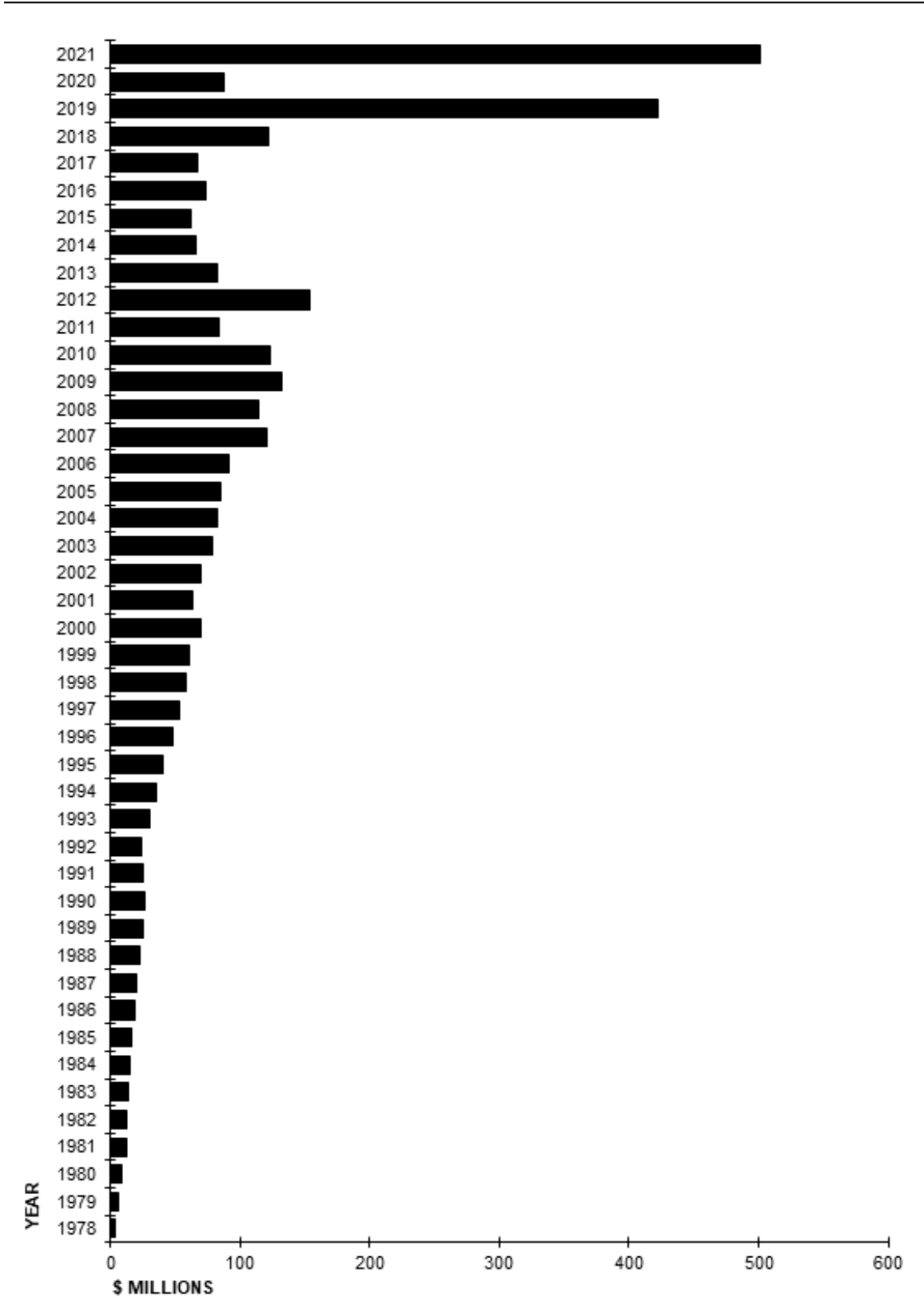
