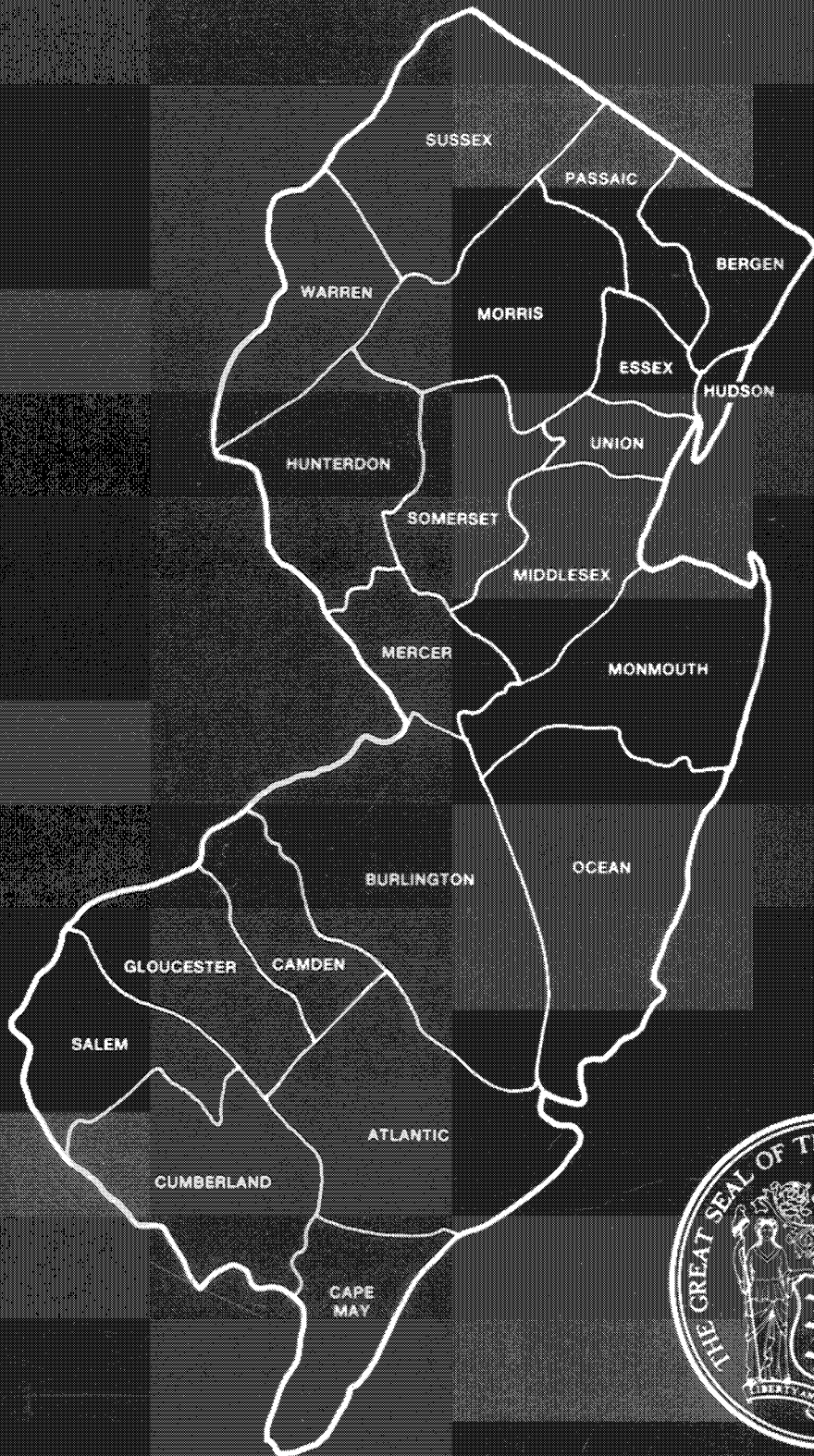



# **THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM**

## **DEFINITION**

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

## **DEVELOPMENT**

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq.) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, i.e., felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this committee have proven valuable to the success of the program. This committee works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies, and procedures.

## **COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA**

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1992, offense and arrest data were received from 481 full-time municipal police departments. Four (4) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 72 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 481 full-time municipal police departments there are ten police departments contracted by other municipalities.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data was received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors, sheriffs' departments, four (4) county police departments, and three (3) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the nine (9) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as fourteen (14) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 558 law enforcement agencies submit their reports to the New Jersey State Police.

## **METHOD**

A State of New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Guide has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

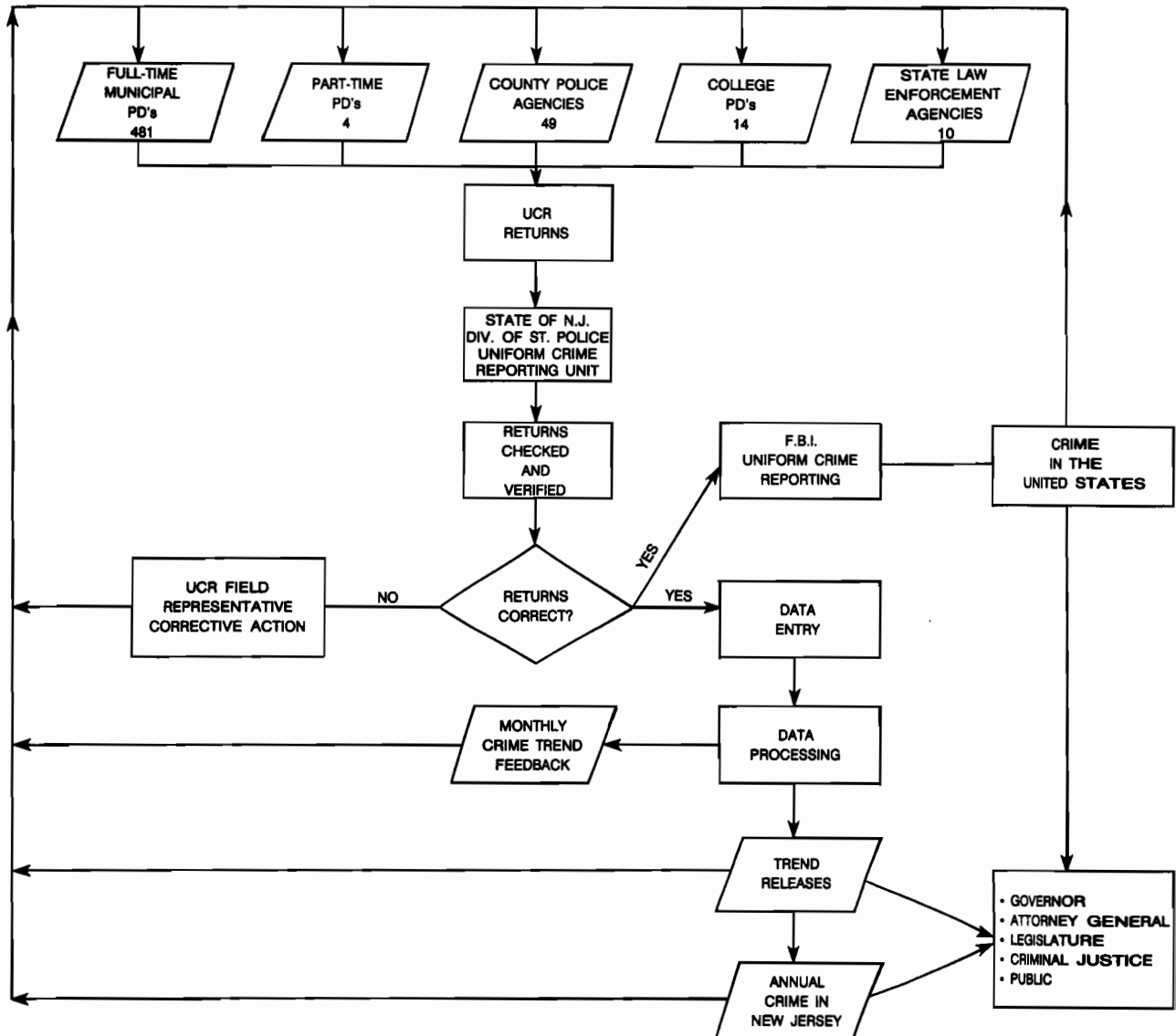
All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications, exclude



manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are further referred to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "Municipal and County Offense and Demographic Data," and Section II, "State Summary and Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

## **VERIFICATION PROCESSES**

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided each contributor, they are not the panacea for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

## **FUNCTION**

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and recordkeeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

## PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,031.3 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

## STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Labor Market and Demographic Research. The 1990 census population count was used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were initially compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER                      Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN-SUBURBAN                Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN                         Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL                                Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER                    High density core area with surrounding rural municipalities.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

# CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part I offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters.

Set forth below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

# **THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW**

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

## **ROBBERY**

### **Decreases:**

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Increased communications technology has led to better communication and increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Units in high robbery areas.

### **Increases:**

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

## **BURGLARY**

### **Decreases:**

- Better deployment of police manpower, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable times and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code has been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

### **Increases:**

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas have led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied for long periods of time.

## **LARCENY**

### **Decreases:**

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deter criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many municipalities.

**Increases:**

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.
- Certain types of property such as tape decks, radar detectors and radios are popular and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicle.

**MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT****Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.

**Increases:**

- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.

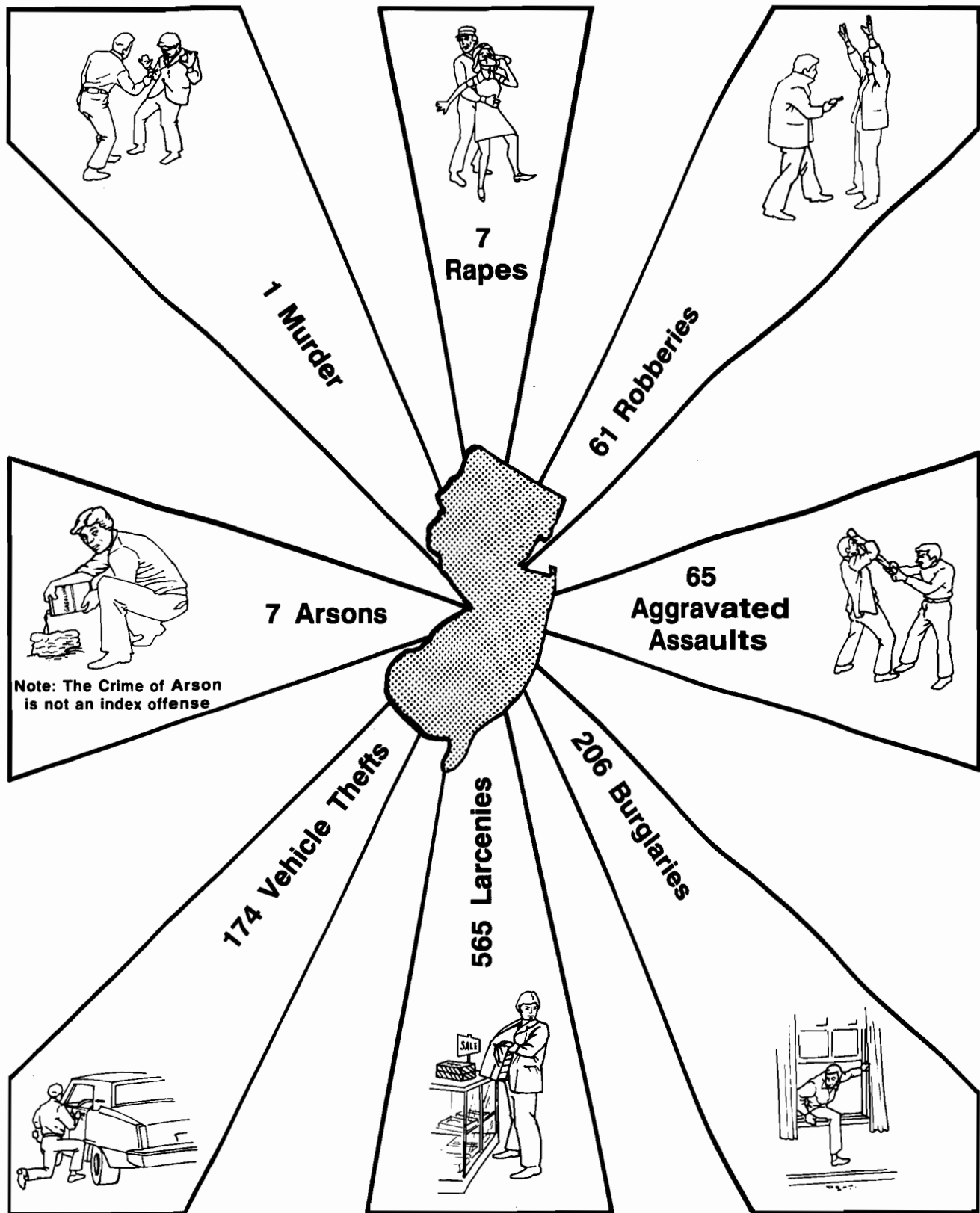

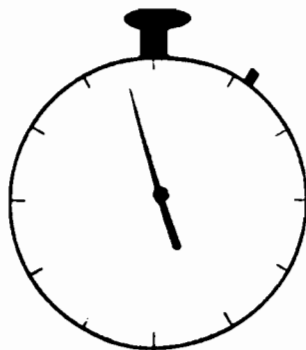

The Crime Clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the index offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of these offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

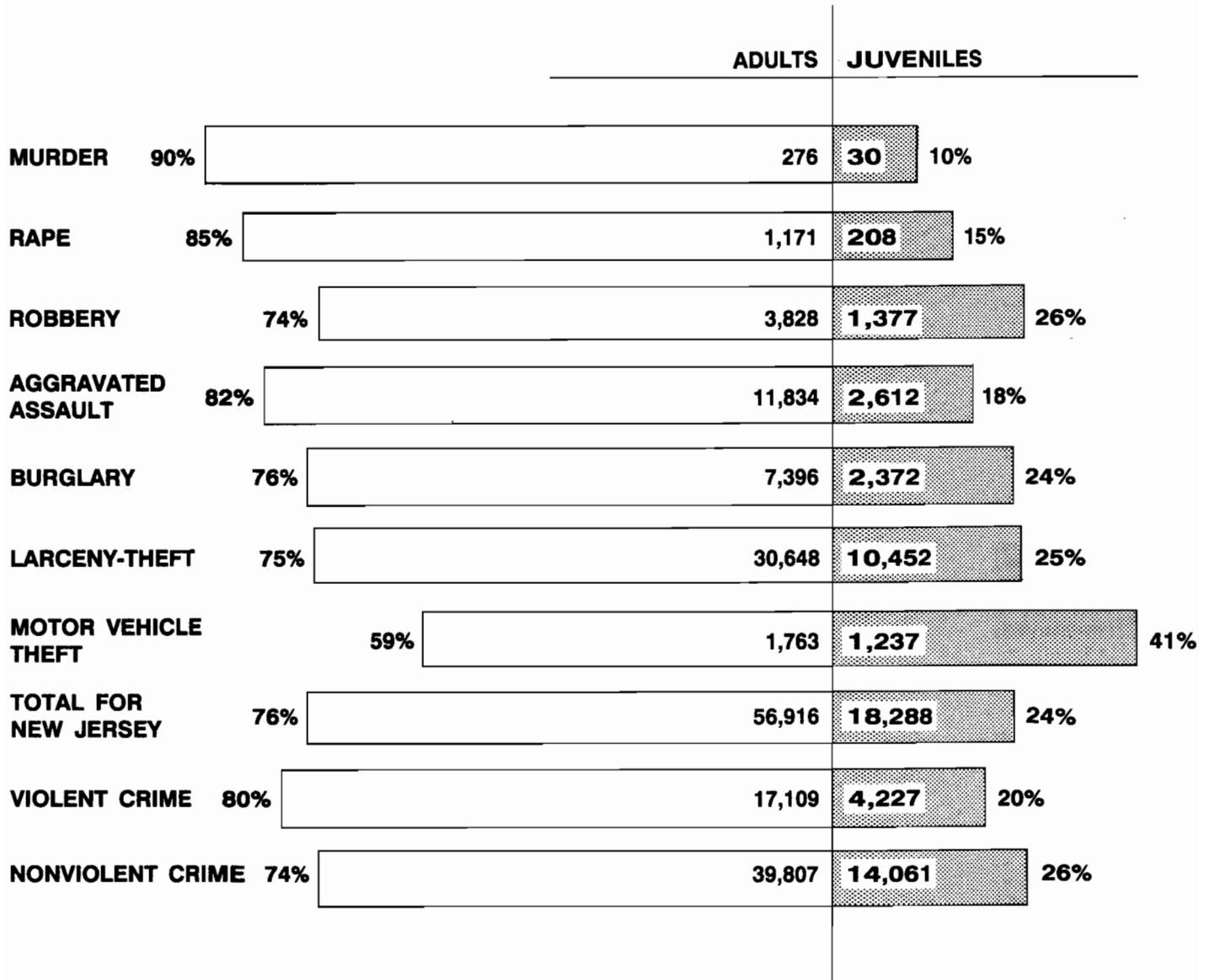

# STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY—1992

## CRIME INDEX—VOLUME/RATE

- There were 394,406 Index offenses reported in 1992, a 6 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- The crime rate of the state is 51.0 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, a decrease of 6 percent compared to 1991.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 36,956 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while November was the lowest with 29,571 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$580.7 million in 1992, a 14 percent decrease from 1991.
- Value of property recovered was \$281.8 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 49 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 64 percent of stolen property and 70 percent of the recovered property value.

## CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 79,608 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 6 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Adult Index arrests decreased 7 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 5 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 20 percent of the total arrests in 1992.
- Males accounted for 78 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 22 percent.
- Fifty-four percent of the Index arrests were white, 45 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 19 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 24 percent of these clearances.

# VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 48,650 violent crimes reported in 1992, a one percent decrease compared to the violent crimes reported in 1991.
- Violent crimes accounted for 12 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate decreased 2 percent to 6.3 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

## **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in July with 4,476 offenses while the lowest number was reported in November with 3,813 offenses.
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$14.9 million.

## **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- Arrests for violent crime offenses increased less than one-half of one percent to 21,951.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 28 percent of the Index arrests and 5 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime increased one percent and juvenile arrests showed a one percent decrease.
- Adults accounted for 76 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 24 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 86 percent and females for 14 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Forty-three percent of those arrested were white, 56 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-four percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 20 percent of these clearances.

# **NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY**

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

## **VOLUME/RATE/TREND**

- There were 345,756 nonviolent crimes reported in 1992, a 7 percent decrease compared to the 372,544 reported in 1991.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 88 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate decreased 7 percent to 44.7 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 1992.

## **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 32,663 while the lowest number was reported in November with 25,758.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$569.9 million.

## **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 57,657 nonviolent crime arrests, this represents a decrease of 9 percent when compared to 1991.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 72 percent of the Index arrests and 14 percent of the total arrests during 1992.
- Juveniles were responsible for 35 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 65 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests decreased 10 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 6 percent.
- Males represented 75 percent and females 25 percent of persons arrested for the nonviolent crime.
- Fifty-eight percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 41 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Sixteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 1992 and juveniles accounted for 26 percent of these clearances.

## **TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY**

- There were 406,915 persons arrested in 1992 which represents a 3 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- The arrest rate for 1992 decreased 3 percent to 52.6 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests decreased 3 percent to 318,125 and juvenile arrests decreased one percent to 88,790 in 1992.
- Adults accounted for 78 percent and juveniles 22 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 34 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 82 percent and females 18 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Sixty-one percent of the total persons arrested in 1992 were white, 38 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.

## POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There were no police officers feloniously killed in the line of duty during 1992 in New Jersey.
- There were 3,988 police officers assaulted during the performance of duty in 1992 in New Jersey.

## CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- The Crime Index in New Jersey decreased 6 percent, while the United States decreased 4 percent and the Northeast Region decreased 7 percent.
- Violent crime in New Jersey decreased 1 percent, the United States decreased less than one percent and the Northeast region decreased 4 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey decreased 7 percent, while the Northeastern states decreased 7 percent and the United States decreased 4 percent.

# MURDER

## DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, and assaults to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 397 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1992, a 3 percent decrease compared to the 410 murders reported in 1991.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and one percent of the violent crime.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The age group of 20-24 accounted for 17 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 48 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 25 percent, blunt objects in 8 percent and physical force in 11 percent.
- Thirty-one percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 14 percent were relatives, and 18 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 18 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 77 percent of the 73 felony murders.
- Sunday was the highest day of the week for reported murders with 70, while Monday and Thursday were the lowest with 46 each.
- November recorded the highest number of murders, with 42, while October had the lowest with 21.
- Thirty-five percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 23 percent in multi-family or apartment dwellings, and 17 percent in single family dwellings.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of murder amounted to \$10,847.

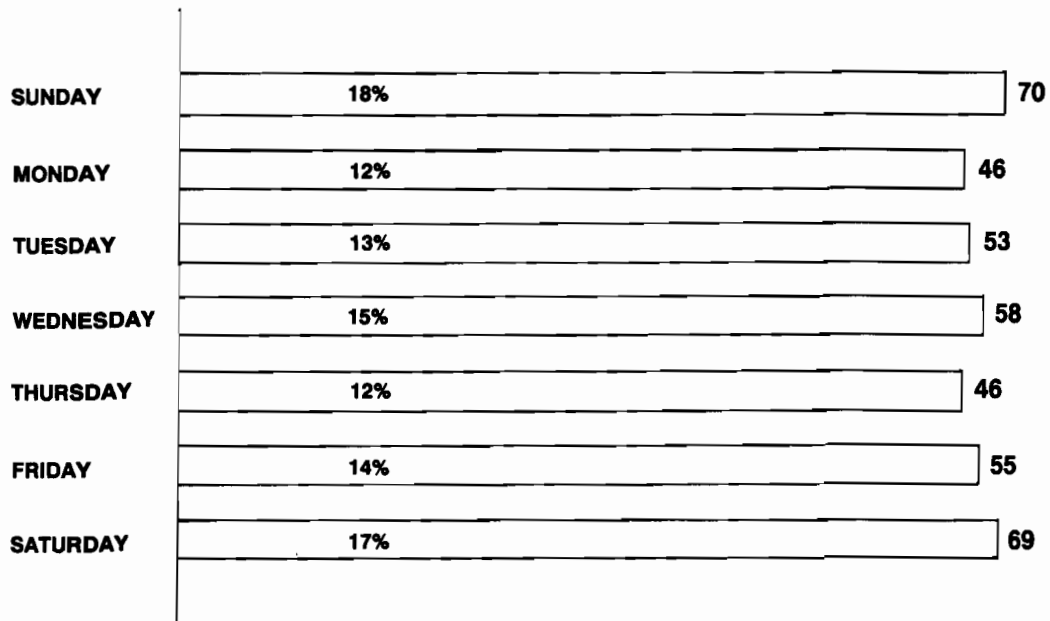
## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 374 persons were arrested for murder in 1992, a 9 percent increase compared to 1991.
- Adult murder arrests increased 9 percent (from 293 to 320) and juvenile arrests increased 10 percent (from 49 to 54).
- Sixty-nine percent of persons arrested for murder were black, 30 percent were white and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-seven percent of the murders were cleared in 1992 (306 out of 397). Juveniles accounted for 8 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of those arrested for murder.

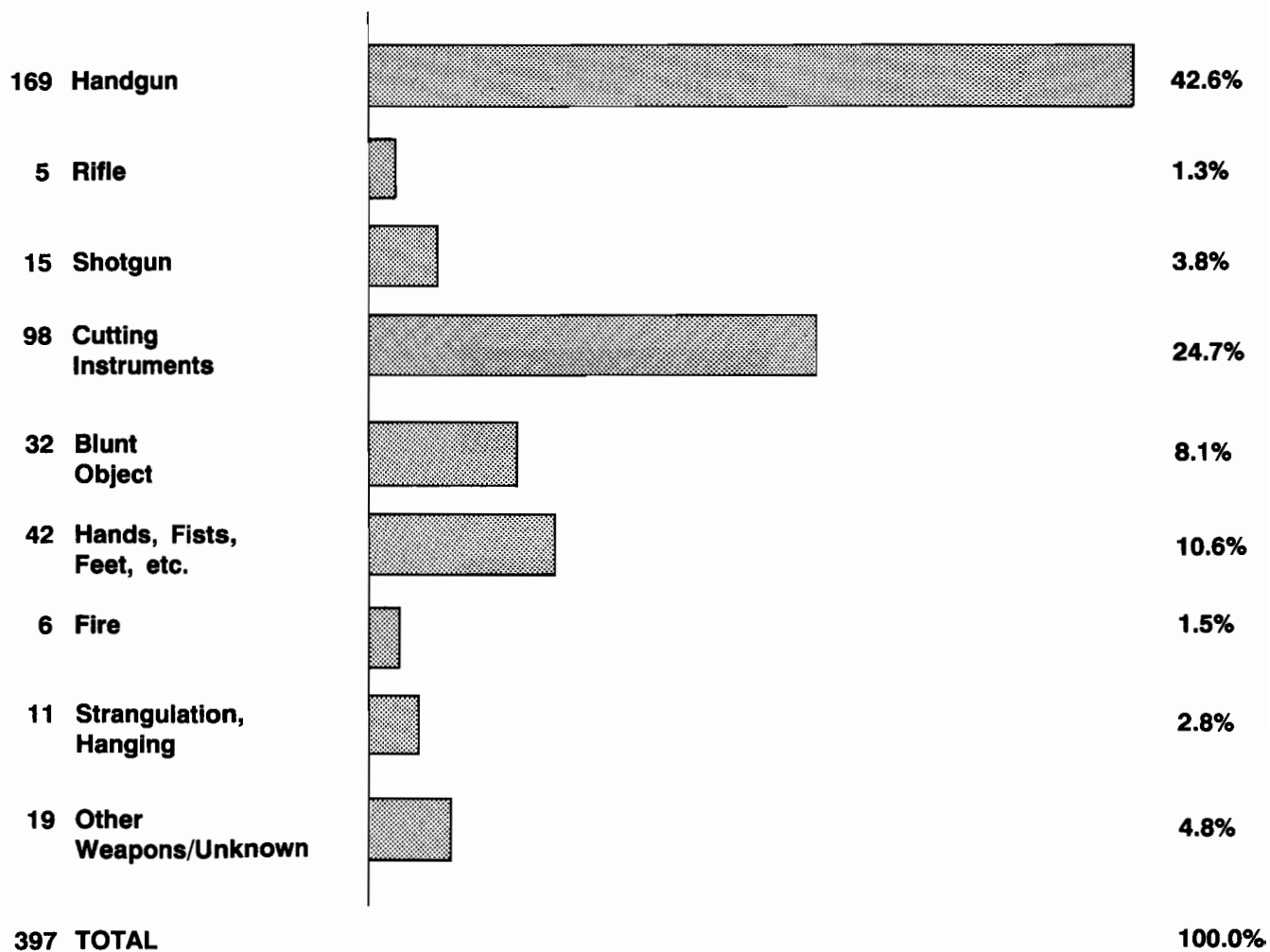

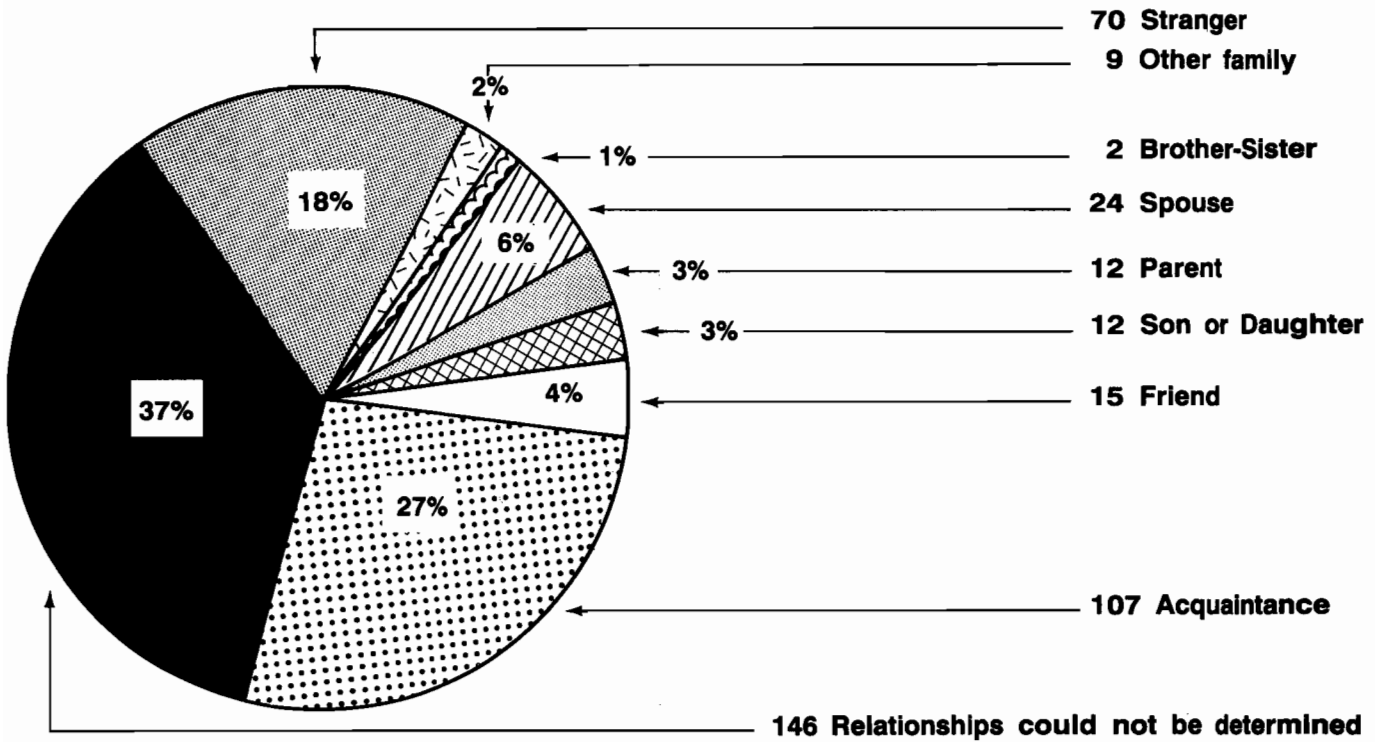


## MURDER—Distribution by Type of Weapon

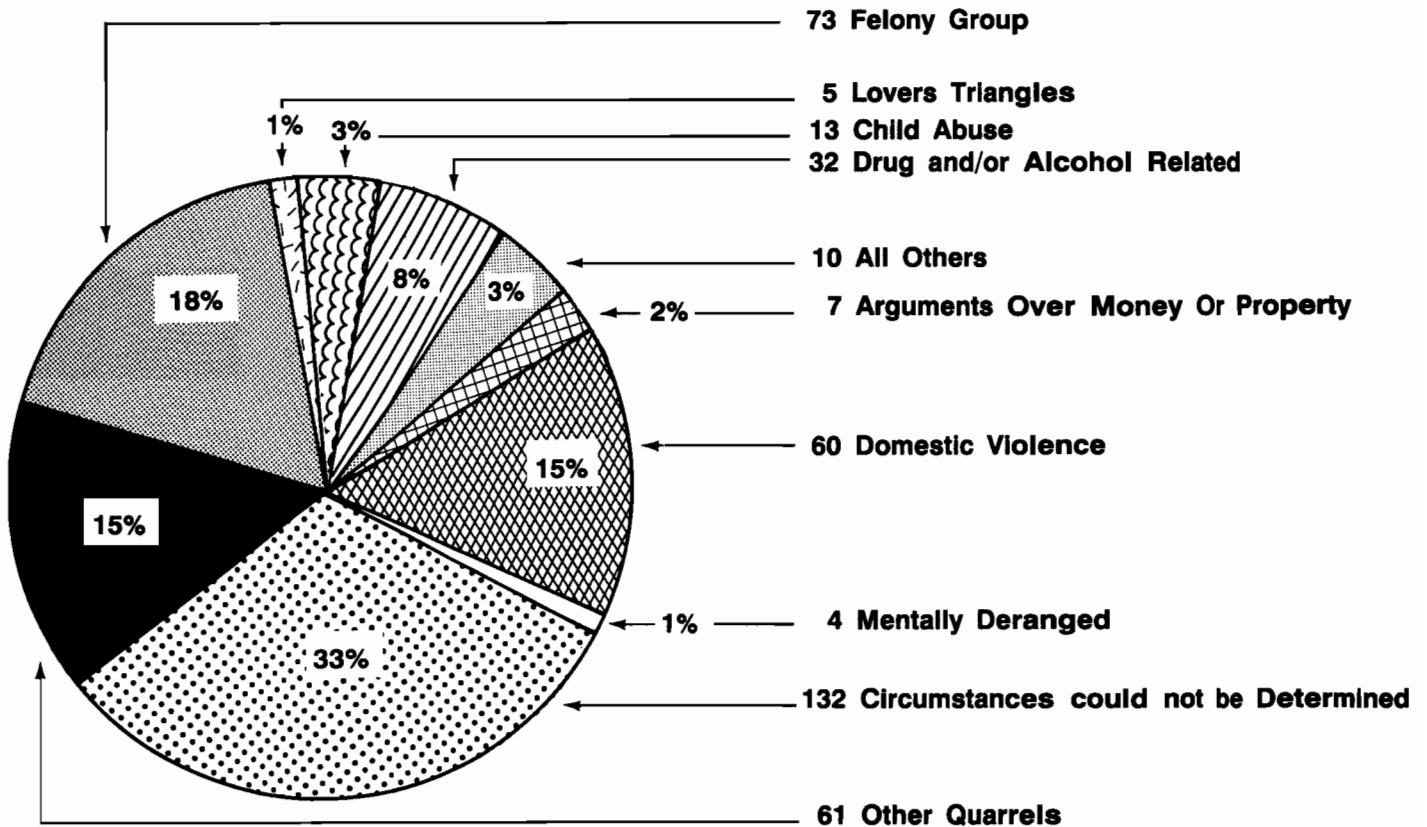

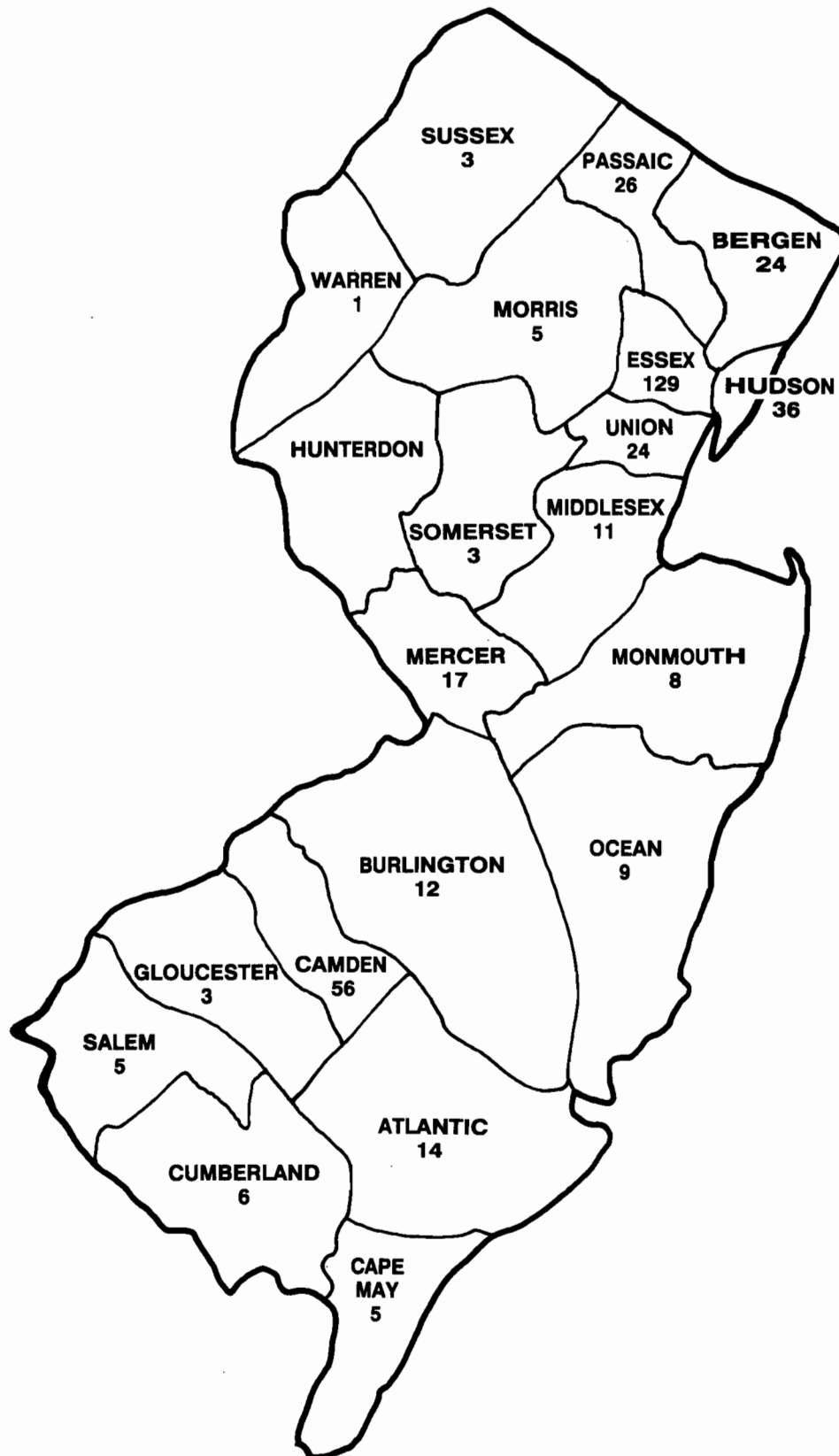
## RELATIONSHIP OF MURDER VICTIMS TO OFFENDER

# RAPE

## Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,399 reported rapes in 1992, an increase of 6 percent compared to the 2,261 in 1991.
- Rape accounted for six-tenths of one percent of the total Crime Index and 5 percent of all violent crimes.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Eighty-two percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 18 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape, amounted to \$33,008.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,319 persons were arrested during 1992, a 6 percent increase compared to 1991.
- Adult rape arrests increased 6 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 5 percent.
- Fifty-one percent of the arrested perpetrators were black, 48 percent were white and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-nine percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Fifty-seven percent of all rape cases were solved during 1992. Juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those cases cleared.

# ROBBERY

## Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 22,220 robbery offenses in 1992, a 2 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Robbery accounted for 6 percent of the total Crime Index and 46 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 2.9 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 72 percent of all reported robberies.
- Bank robberies increased 22 percent and convenience store robberies increased 6 percent.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$14,881,495.

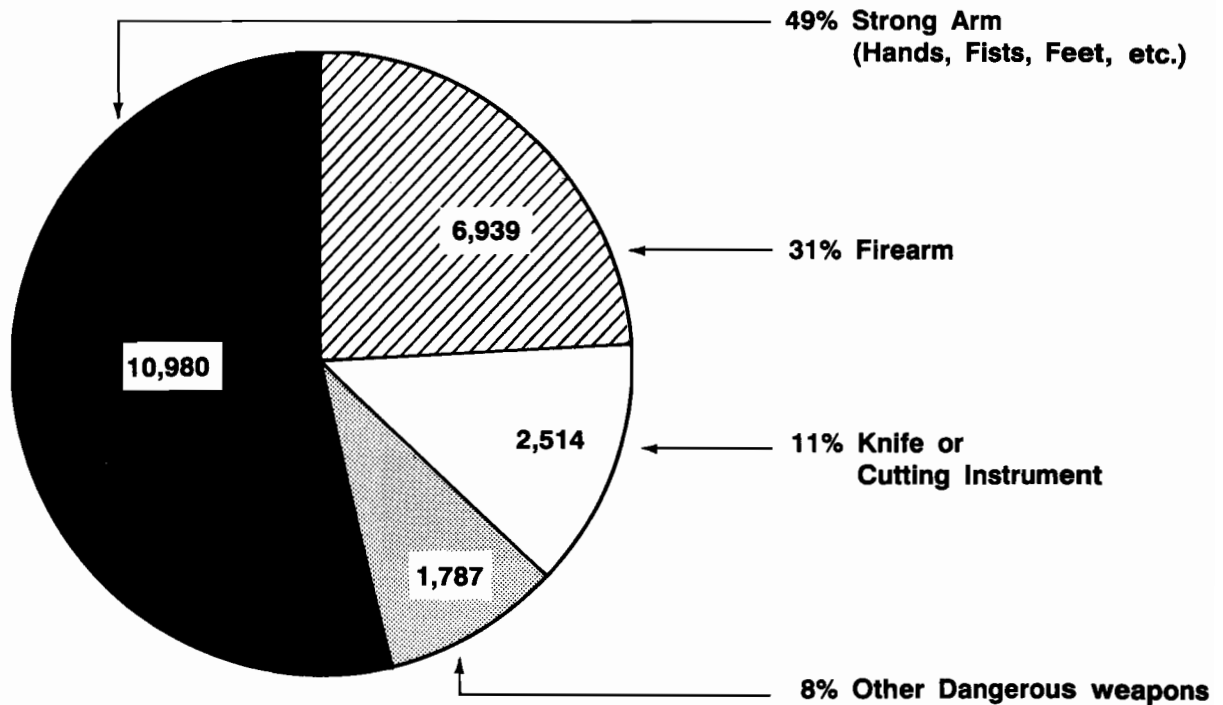

# AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

## Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 23,634 aggravated assaults reported during 1992, a decrease of less than one-half of one percent when compared to 1991.
- Aggravated assaults accounted for 6 percent of the Crime Index and 49 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault remained at 3.1 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 28 percent, and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 31 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 16 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.

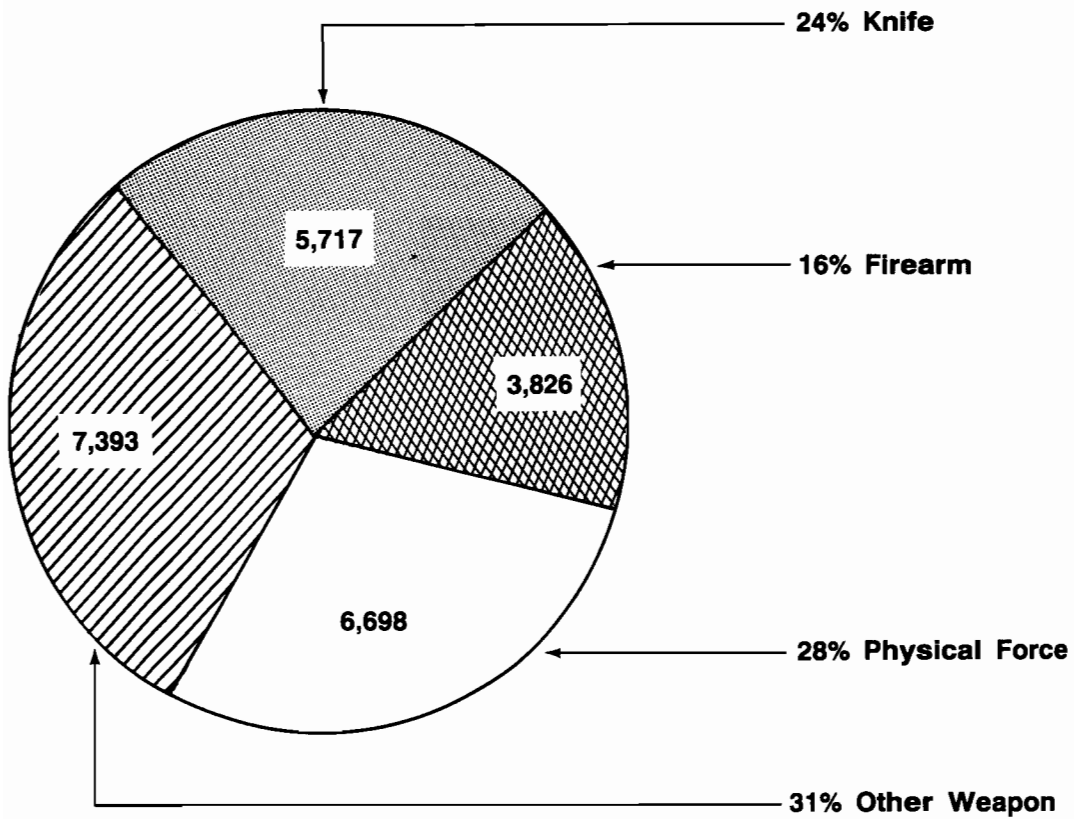

# BURGLARY

## Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 75,536 burglary offenses reported in 1992, a decrease of 4 percent.
- Burglary accounted for 19 percent of the total Crime Index and 22 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population decreased 4 percent to 9.8 in 1992.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- During 1992, 73 percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 16 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and the remaining 11 percent were attempts to forcibly enter.
- Residences were targets in 66 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Fifty-eight percent of the nonresidential burglaries occurred between the hours of 6:00 P.M. and 6:00 A.M.
- Stolen property value as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$86.5 million, for an average loss of \$1,146.
- The average loss as a result of a residential burglary was \$1,172, while nonresidential burglary loss was \$1,095.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 6 percent with 11,191 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests decreased 5 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 8 percent.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 39 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-two percent of burglary arrests were white, 37 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Thirteen percent of the burglaries statewide were cleared and juveniles accounted for 24 percent of these clearances.

# LARCENY-THEFT

## Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 206,687 larcenies reported in 1992, a decrease of 7 percent compared to the 221,817 in 1991.
- Larceny accounted for 52 percent of the total Crime Index and 60 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The larceny victimization rate decreased to 26.7 victims for every 1,000 population in 1992. This represents a 7 percent decrease over the rate of 28.7 in 1991.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 34 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Thefts of bicycles decreased 18 percent in 1992 compared to 1991.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased 9 percent in 1992, with 43,508 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 4 percent and adult arrests decreased 11 percent.
- Males accounted for 68 percent and females 32 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-eight percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 40 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of the arrests.
- Twenty percent of the larcenies were cleared with juveniles accounting for 25 percent of the clearances.

# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

## Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.)

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 63,533 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1992, a 12 percent decrease compared to the 71,868 reported in 1991.
- Motor vehicle thefts accounted for 16 percent of the total Crime Index and 18 percent of the nonviolent crime.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 8.2 victims per 1,000 population represents a 12 percent decrease compared to 1991.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Motor vehicles represented 64 percent of the total value of property stolen during 1992.
- Total value of stolen motor vehicles amounted to \$368.9 million during the year.
- The average value of a stolen motor vehicle was \$5,807.
- Vehicles valued at \$259.5 million represent 92 percent of the total value of recovered property during 1992.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 2,958 persons were arrested for motor vehicle theft, this represents a 15 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 18 percent, while adult arrests decreased 11 percent.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 58 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Forty-two percent of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft were white and 57 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Five percent of the motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 1992, juveniles accounted for 41 percent of these clearances.

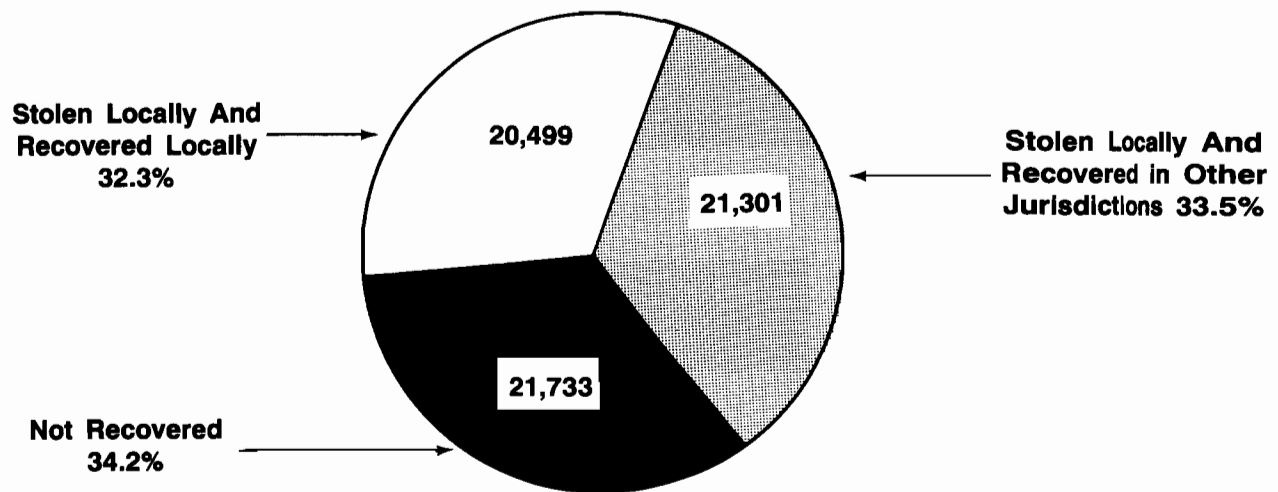

# ARSON

## Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,556 reportable arsons in 1992, which represents an 8 percent decrease compared to 2,776 in 1991.
- The arson rate decreased to 0.3 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Fifty-two percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 58 percent.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 35 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 11 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson amounted to \$46.8 million for an average dollar value loss of \$18,317.
- The average residential loss was \$19,215 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$110,382.
- The average motor vehicle loss was \$4,009.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 581 in 1992, representing a 15 percent decrease.
- Adult arrests decreased 32 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 5 percent.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the arson arrests in 1992.
- Juveniles accounted for 59 percent of the arson arrests.
- Seventy-six percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 23 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 19 percent and juveniles accounted for 44 percent of the clearances.

# **ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES**

## **MANSLAUGHTER**

### **Definition**

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 18 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies of the state for manslaughter during the year. This represents a 58 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Adults accounted for 83 percent and juveniles accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 100 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty percent of the persons arrested were white, 50 percent were black.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 17 percent of the arrests and 83 percent were Non-Hispanic.

## **SIMPLE ASSAULT**

### **Definition**

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 42,176 simple assault arrests in 1992, representing an 11 percent increase when compared to 1991.
- Of the total, 23 percent were juveniles and 77 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 80 percent and females 20 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 38 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Thirteen percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 87 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

## **ARSON**

### **Definition**

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 581 arrests reported for arson offenses, a 15 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Juveniles accounted for 59 percent and adults 41 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Ninety percent of the total arson arrests were males while 10 percent were females.
- Seventy-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 23 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of those arrested and Non-Hispanics accounted for 90 percent.



# FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

## Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,404 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for forgery or counterfeiting during the year. This represents a 12 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Adults accounted for 94 percent and juveniles accounted for 6 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 70 percent of the arrests and females 30 percent.
- Fifty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 28 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests and 75 percent were Non-Hispanic.

# FRAUD

## Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 6,368 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 17 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Adult arrests represented 96 percent and juveniles 4 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 61 percent and females 39 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 30 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Eight percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 92 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

# EMBEZZLEMENT

## Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 98 persons arrested for embezzlement, a 2 percent increase compared to 1991.
- Ninety-four percent of those persons arrested were adults and 6 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 61 percent and females 39 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Sixty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 30 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 21 percent of those arrested and Non-Hispanics accounted for 79 percent.

## **STOLEN PROPERTY (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)**

### **Definition**

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1992, there were 11,558 arrests reported for stolen property, a decrease of 11 percent compared to 1991.
- Of the total, 60 percent were adults and 40 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-eight percent were males and 12 percent were females.
- Forty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 57 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests and 83 percent were Non-Hispanic.

## **CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF**

### **Definition**

Criminal/malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 13,113 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief; a decrease of 2 percent compared to 1991.
- Juveniles accounted for 60 percent and adults 40 percent of persons arrested for criminal/malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 26 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Twelve percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and Non-Hispanics accounted for 88 percent.

## **WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.**

### **Definition**

Under this program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 7,723 arrests reported for weapon offenses; a 10 percent increase compared to 1991.
- Of the total, 67 percent were adults and 33 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of those arrested.
- Fifty-three percent of those arrested were white, 45 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of those arrested and 85 percent were Non-Hispanic.

# PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

## Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 2,537 arrests reported for prostitution and commercialized vice during 1992, representing an increase of 7 percent when compared to 1991.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults with the remaining 1 percent being juveniles.
- Females accounted for 62 percent and males 38 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-three percent of those arrested were white, 47 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 20 percent of the arrests and 80 percent were Non-Hispanic.

# SEX OFFENSES

## Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,458 sex offense arrests during 1992, representing an increase of 3 percent when compared to 1991.
- Adults accounted for 80 percent, and juveniles 20 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-five percent were males and 5 percent were females.
- Sixty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 31 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Fourteen percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 86 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

# DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

## Definition

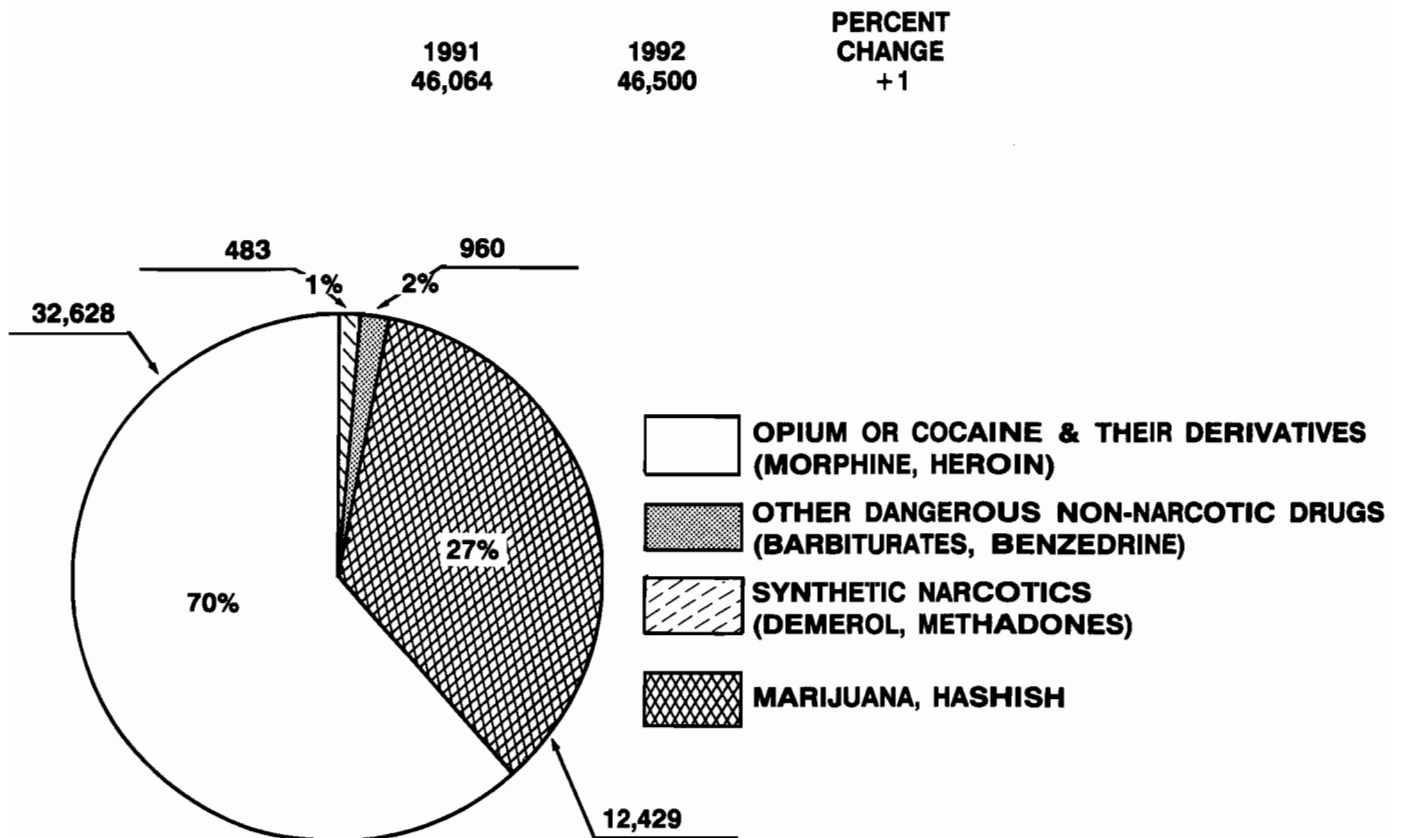
Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing, possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones).
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).

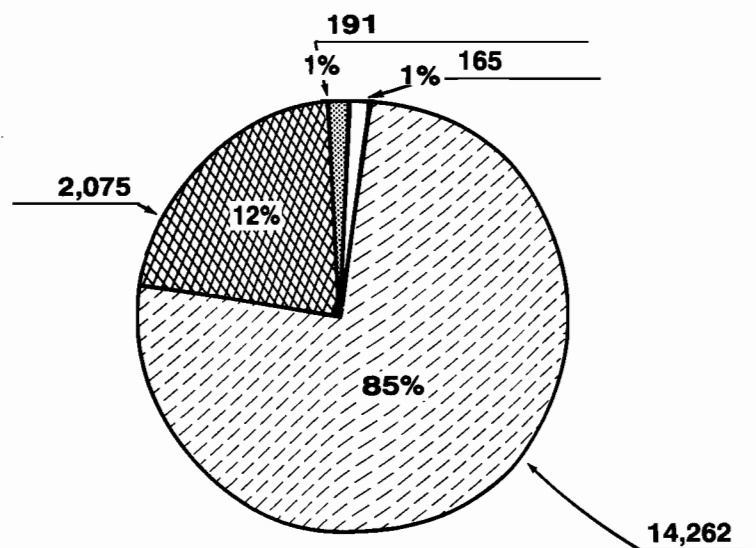
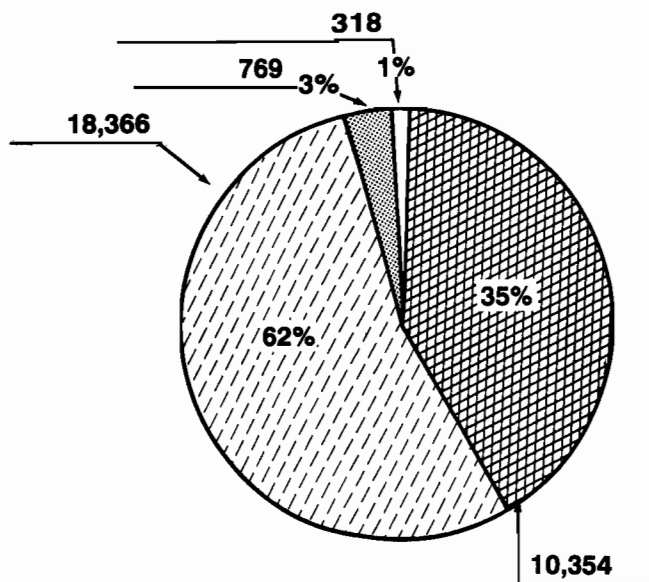
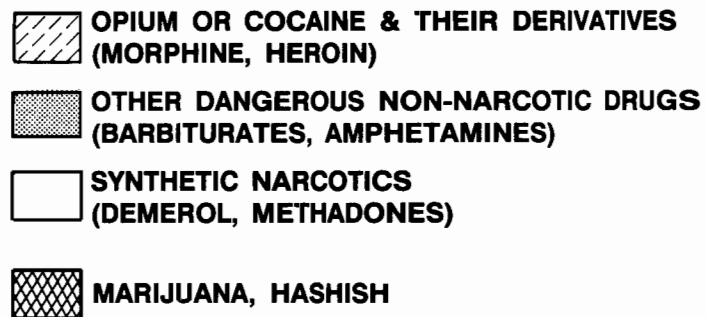
- There were 46,500 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations; a 1 percent increase compared to 1991.
- Adults accounted for 89 percent and juveniles 11 percent of the arrests.

- Twenty-eight percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were under the age of 21.
- Males accounted for 86 percent of all the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 14 percent.
- Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested were black, 47 percent were white, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of those arrested and 85 percent were not Hispanic.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 64 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 36 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for opium or cocaine and their derivatives represented 62 percent of the possession/use category and 85 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 70 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

# **GAMBLING**

## **Definition**

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 595 gambling arrests reported during 1992, resulting in a decrease of 33 percent compared to 1991.
- Eighty-seven percent of the arrests were adults and 13 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 82 percent and females 18 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 19 percent were black, and 8 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 22 percent of the arrests and 78 percent were not Hispanic.

# **OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN**

## **Definition**

The definition of offenses against family and children is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.

- There were 14,901 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1992, representing an increase of 2 percent from the previous year.
- Less than one-half of one percent of the arrests were juveniles, and nearly 100 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 95 percent and females 5 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 46 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests and 87 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

# **DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE**

## **Definition**

Under the New Jersey Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 35,967 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1992, a decrease of 8 percent compared to 1991.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only 1 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 88 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 12 percent.
- Eighty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 12 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Twelve percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 88 percent were not Hispanic.



## **LIQUOR LAWS**

### **Definition**

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 10,949 arrests reported for liquor law violations, a decrease of 20 percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 68 percent of the arrests while the remaining 32 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the liquor law arrests while females accounted for the remaining 19 percent.
- Ninety percent of the persons arrested were white, 9 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 6 percent of those arrested and 94 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

## **DISORDERLY CONDUCT**

### **Definition**

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 39,299 arrests for disorderly conduct in 1992, a decrease of 2 percent compared to 1991.
- Seventy-four percent of the arrests were adults while the remaining 26 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 81 percent and females 19 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 38 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests and 89 percent of those arrested were not Hispanic.

## **VAGRANCY**

### **Definition**

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 166 arrests in this category during the year, a 4 percent increase compared to 1991.
- Juveniles accounted for 27 percent of the arrests while adults accounted for the remaining 73 percent.
- Males represented 76 percent and females 24 percent of the arrests in this category.
- Fifty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 45 percent were black.
- Sixteen percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 84 percent were Non-Hispanic.

## **ALL OTHER OFFENSES**

### **Definition**

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 83,304 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1992, a 2 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Adults accounted for 87 percent and juveniles 13 percent of persons arrested for all other offenses.
- Eighty-two percent of the arrests were males while 18 percent were females.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of those arrested and 89 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

## **CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS**

### **Definition**

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 1,950 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations during 1992; this represents an 8 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Males represented 81 percent and females 19 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 34 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests and non-Hispanics accounted for 86 percent of those arrested.

## **RUNAWAYS**

### **Definition**

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 5,642 runaway arrests reported in 1992, an 8 percent increase compared to 1991.
- Females accounted for 58 percent and males accounted for 42 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 41 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Seventeen percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 83 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

- Adult arrests registered a 1 percent increase and juvenile arrests decreased 1 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 14 percent; juveniles were responsible for 23 percent of those cases cleared.

## **WARREN COUNTY**

### **VOLUME/RATE**

- During the year police of the county reported 1,907 Index crimes, a decrease of 6 percent when compared to 1991.
- Violent crime registered a 10 percent increase while nonviolent crime decreased 7 percent.
- The Index crime rate was 20.8 victims per 1,000 inhabitants, a 6 percent decrease compared to 1991.
- Motor vehicle theft decreased 35 percent, while aggravated assault increased 8 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$1.8 million, of which 19 percent was recovered.

## **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 3,925 persons arrested during the year, a 1 percent increase when compared to 1991.
- Adult arrests registered a 2 percent increase while juvenile arrests decreased 4 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 28 percent; juveniles were responsible for 34 percent of those cases cleared.

## CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS—1992

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

Set forth below are the established municipal groupings as used in this section:

# **CRIME IN THE CITIES**

## CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 20 percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period 1983-1992 and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis were initially categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) to be classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as the "Major Urban".

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15".

## Percent Change

- During the ten year period 1983-1992, the Crime Index in New Jersey has increased 2 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities increased 10 percent and the six major urban cities increased 9 percent.
- Violent crime in the state increased 18 percent, the 15 urban cities increased 16 percent and the six major cities increased 10 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state increased less than one-half of one percent, the "Urban 15" increased 8 percent, and the six major cities increased 9 percent.

### Distribution

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 12 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1983 through 1992 accounted for 26 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers from 1983 through 1992 accounted for 49 percent of all violent crime and 23 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 20 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1983 through 1992 these 15 urban municipalities accounted for 36 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 60 percent of all violent crime, and 33 percent of the state's nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

# STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearing house for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten year period 1983-1992, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 43 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every 4 highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- More than half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Fifty-three percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.

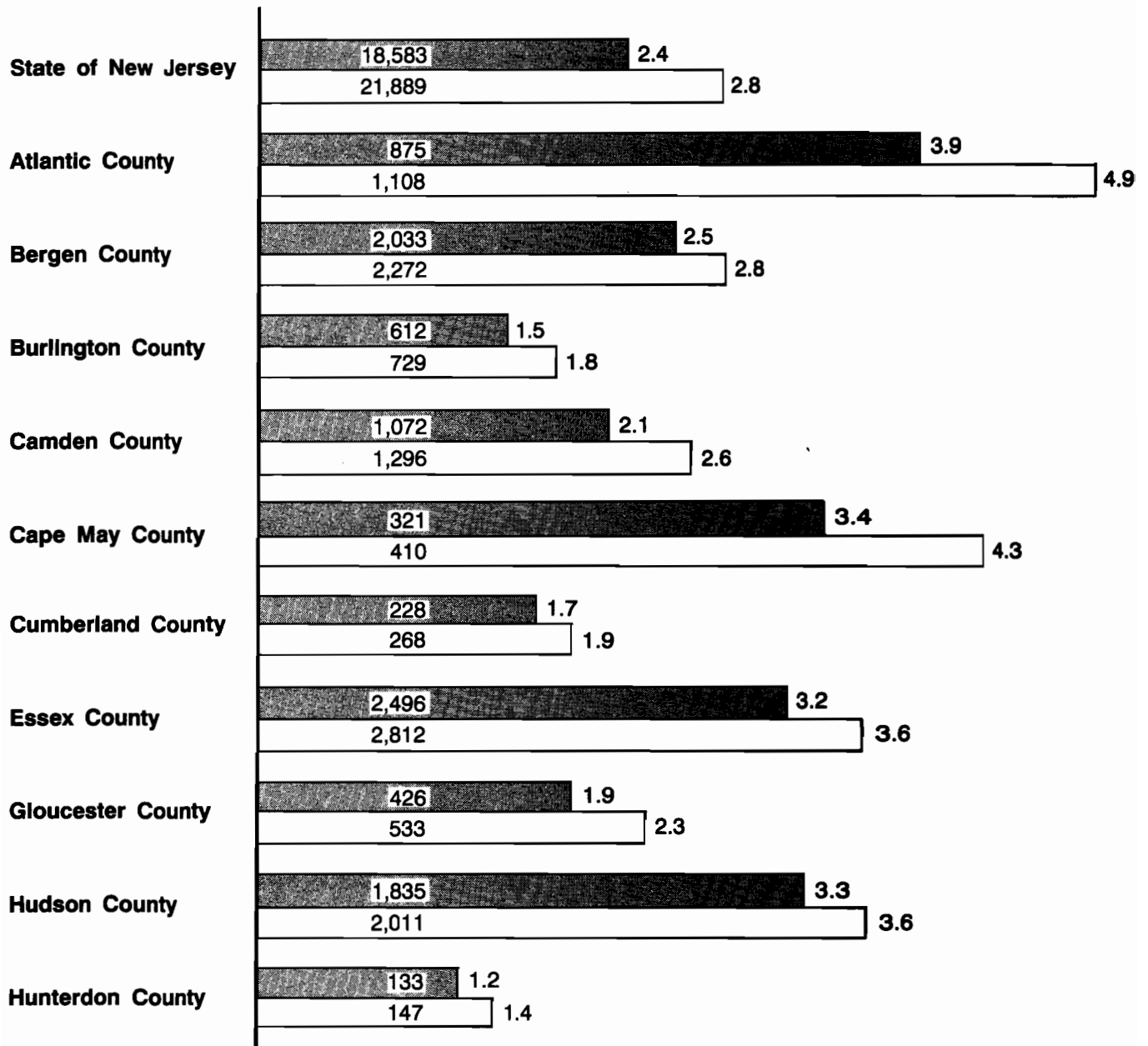
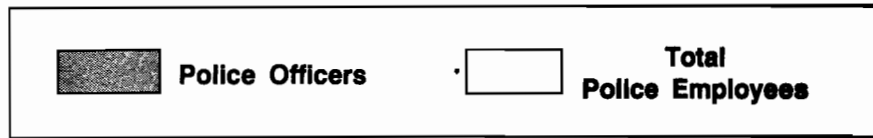

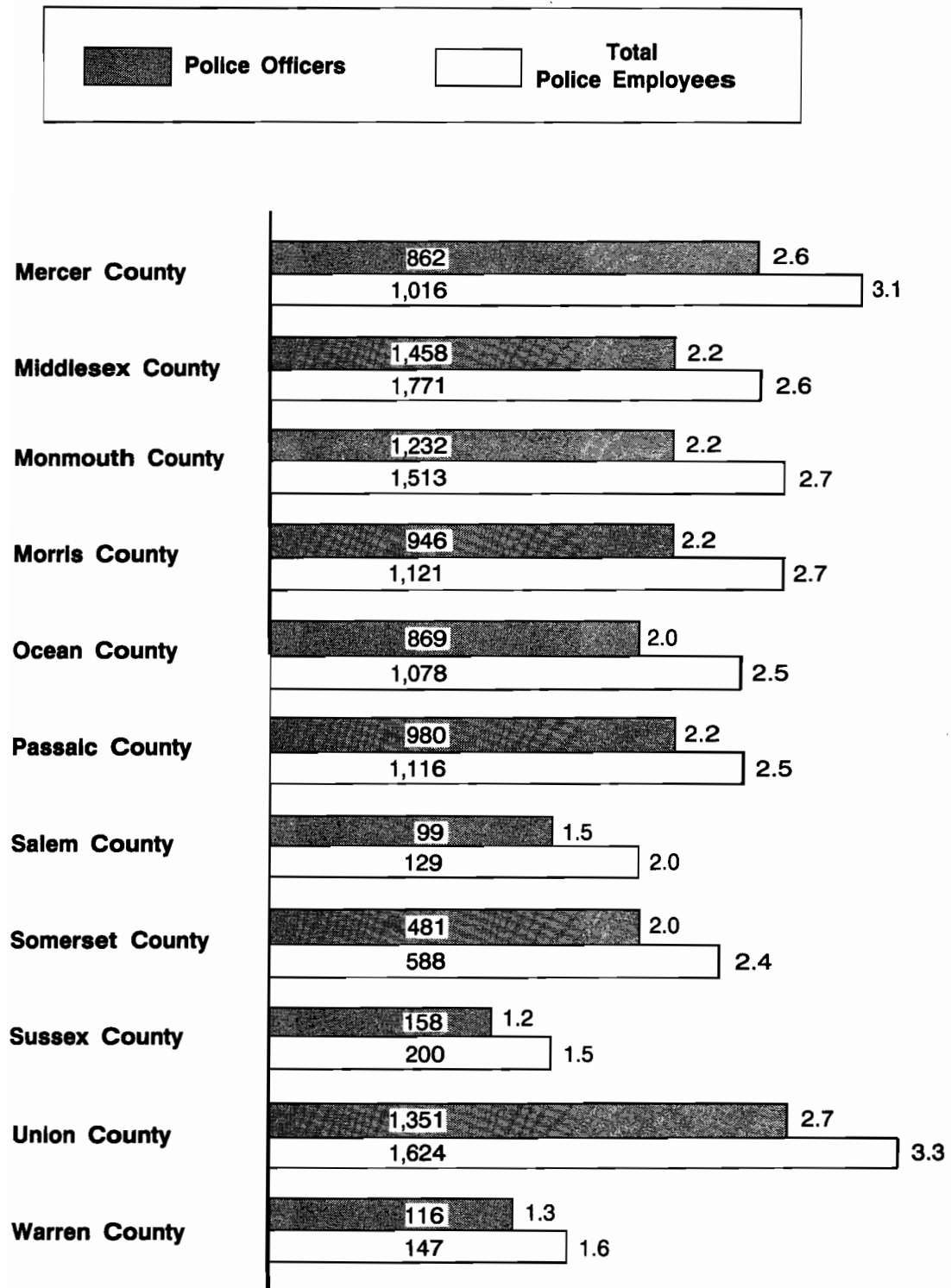

# POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

## TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1992, there were 45,750 full-time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a 1 percent increase compared to the 45,502 full-time police employees in 1991.
- The number of full-time police officers decreased 2 percent, from 33,873 in 1991 to 33,147 in 1992.
- The number of full-time civilian employees increased 8 percent, from 11,629 in 1991 to 12,603 in 1992.
- Seventy-two percent were sworn officers and the remaining 28 percent were civilian employees.

## MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1992, there were 21,889 municipal police employees, a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to the 21,956 in 1991.
- There were 2.8 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state.
- Essex County reported the largest decrease in municipal police employees, a decrease of 1 percent (41 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 4.9 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.4 per 1,000 population.

## **OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)**

In addition to the State Police, there were nine other state agencies reporting to the System. These agencies consist of: N.J. Forest Fire Service, Division of Parks & Forestry, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Office of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park and N.J. Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police service rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 11,021 full-time police employees; a 1 percent increase compared to the 10,915 police employees in 1991.
- There were 5,595 sworn police officers in 1992, a decrease of 12 percent compared to the 6,339 in 1991.
- These agencies reported 5,426 civilian police employees in 1992, representing a 19 percent increase compared to the 4,576 reported in 1991.
- Fifty-one percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 49 percent were civilians.

## **MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES**

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

- There were 3,306 municipal civilian police employees in 1992, a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to the 3,307 in 1991.
- Fifteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

## **MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS**

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 18,583 full-time municipal police officers in 1992; this represents a decrease of less than one-half of one percent when compared to the 18,649 full-time municipal police officers in 1991.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.4 per 1,000 population; this represents no change when compared to 1991.
- Eighty-five percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.
- The largest numerical increase occurred in Hudson County; an increase of 28 municipal police officers, or 2 percent.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Essex County; a decrease of 42 municipal police officers, or 2 percent.
- Atlantic County, with 3.9 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Hunterdon and Sussex counties recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal police officers with 1.2 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

# COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 8,405 full-time police employees in 1992; an increase of 3 percent compared to the 8,152 in 1991.
- There were 6,015 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 1992. This represents an increase of 2 percent compared to the 5,897 in 1991.
- The county police agencies reported 2,390 civilian police employees in 1992; a 6 percent increase compared to the 2,255 in 1991.
- Seventy-two percent were sworn personnel while the remaining 28 percent were civilians.

## STATE POLICE

The State Police total includes personnel from the Marine Police, Alcoholic Beverage Control Enforcement Bureau, and Capitol Police. The breakdown for each bureau is depicted on the State Police Personnel chart.

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,733 full-time police employees; a decrease of 1 percent compared to the 3,787 in 1991.
- There were 2,567 State Police officers in 1992; a decrease of 2 percent compared to the 2,616 in 1991.
- The State Police reported 1,166 civilian employees in 1992; a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to the 1,171 in 1991.
- Sixty-nine percent of the total State Police employees were sworn personnel, while the remaining 31 percent were civilians.

# POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

## POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

### VOLUME/TREND

- This is the fifth consecutive year there were no New Jersey police officers killed as a result of criminal action.
- Since the inception of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program in 1967, forty-seven police officers have been feloniously killed in the line of duty.

## ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place. It is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

### VOLUME/TREND

- There were 3,988 police officers assaulted in 1992, an increase of less than one-half of one percent when compared to the 3,972 in 1991.

### ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-eight percent (1,130) of the officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 87 percent (3,455) of all police assaults.
- Twenty-eight percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Seventeen percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the 2 hour period of 12 midnight to 2 a.m.

### CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 97 percent of the assaults directed at them.

# **ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS**

## **VOLUME/RATE/TREND**

- There were 3,608 municipal police officers assaulted during 1992, a 3 percent increase compared to the 3,498 assaulted in 1991.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 19.4; a 3 percent increase compared to 1991.

## **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- Twenty-seven percent of the municipal officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 87 percent of all municipal police assaults.
- Thirty percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 25 percent of municipal police assaults.

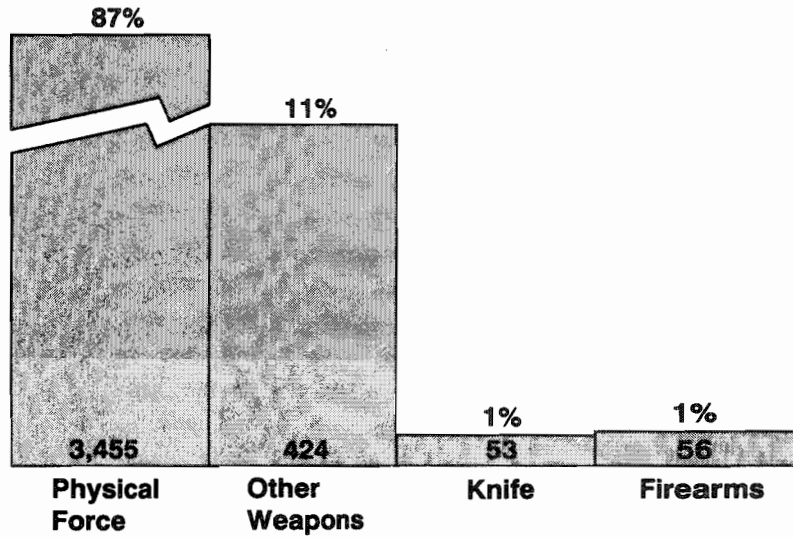
## **OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED**

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and, are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

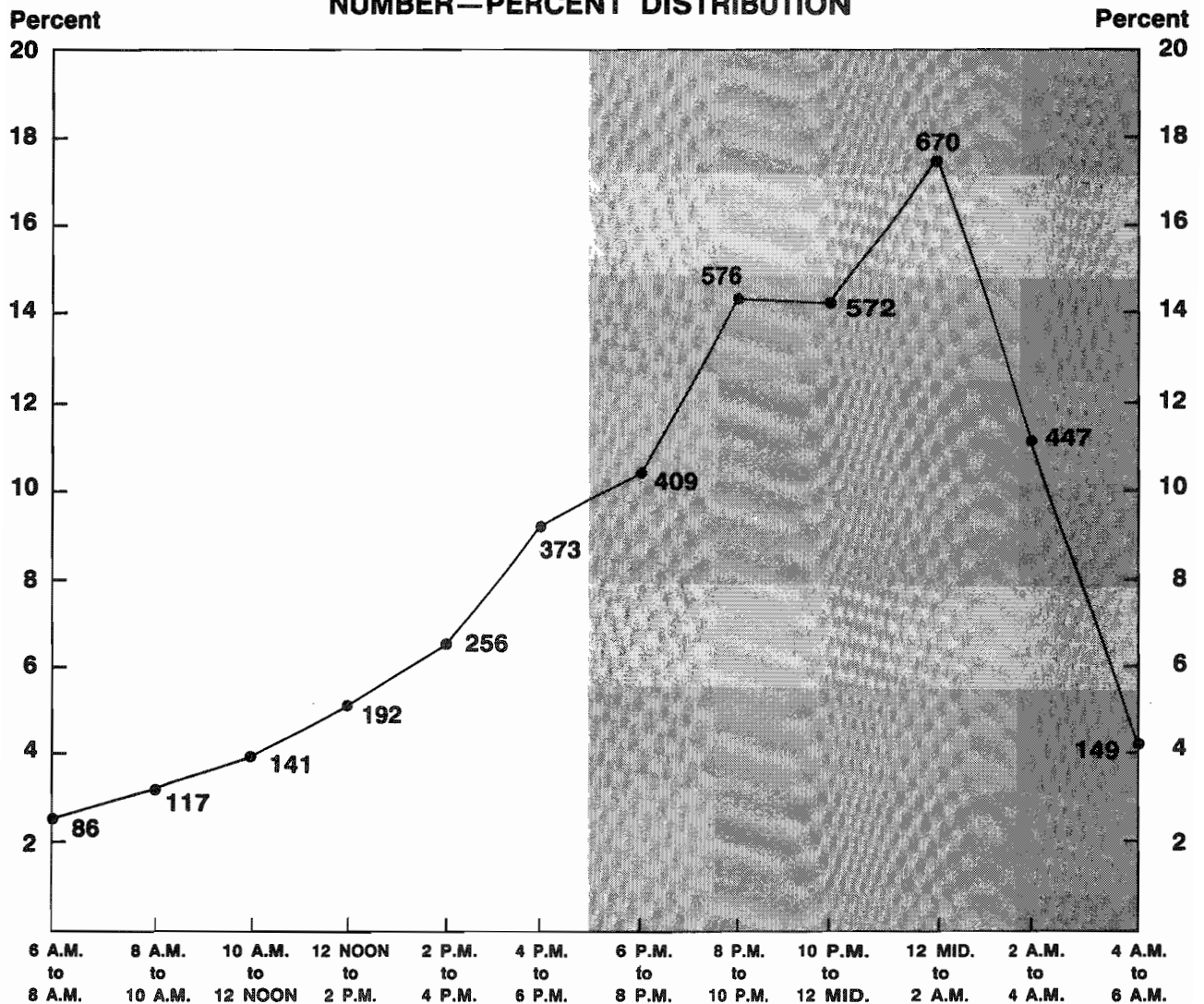
## **VOLUME**

- County law enforcement agencies reported 128 officers assaulted, with 49 sustaining physical injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 67 officers assaulted, with 23 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 156 officers assaulted and 88 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 29 officers assaulted with 6 sustaining injury.

# **SECTION X**

## **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**

## **INTRODUCTION**

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring within the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into this issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing; serious concern has been displayed within many municipal and county agencies whereby various committees and working groups have been formed to help battle this important problem. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. As stated in the following pages, reported domestic violence acts decreased six percent over 1991. (NOTE: Legislation effective November 12, 1991, added terroristic threats and criminal trespass as occurrences which constitute domestic violence acts; these additional offenses may effect comparisons of the volume of reported domestic violence acts.) It is through analysis of this data that, hopefully, the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

## **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY**

Highlights of the 1992 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 52,321 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 1992, a 6% decrease compared to the 55,698\* reported in 1991.
- Murders decreased 2% in 1992 (60) when compared to 1991 (61).
- Assaults occurred for 58% (30,292) of the reported offenses in 1992.
- The total arrests for 1992 (19,720) increased 3% over 1991 (19,127).
- Arrests were made in 38% (19,720) of the offenses reported for 1992.
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (9,651).
- For the tenth consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 30% (15,869) of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 51% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 1992. Specifically, 9% (4,956) were involved and 42% (21,957) were present.
- Wives were the victims in 31% (16,275), and ex-wives were the victims in 3% (1,583) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1992. Overall, females were victims in 83% (43,393) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender decreased from 12,105 in 1991 to 12,051 in 1992. This is a decrease of less than one-half of one percent.
- Alcohol and/or drugs were involved in 42% (22,236) of the reported offenses occurring in 1992. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 37% (19,483) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over were victims in 3% (1,557) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 1992.
- Domestic Violence does not occur at a regular frequency, but when viewed as a ratio of its occurrence to a fixed time interval, one act of domestic violence would occur every ten (10) minutes and four (4) seconds.

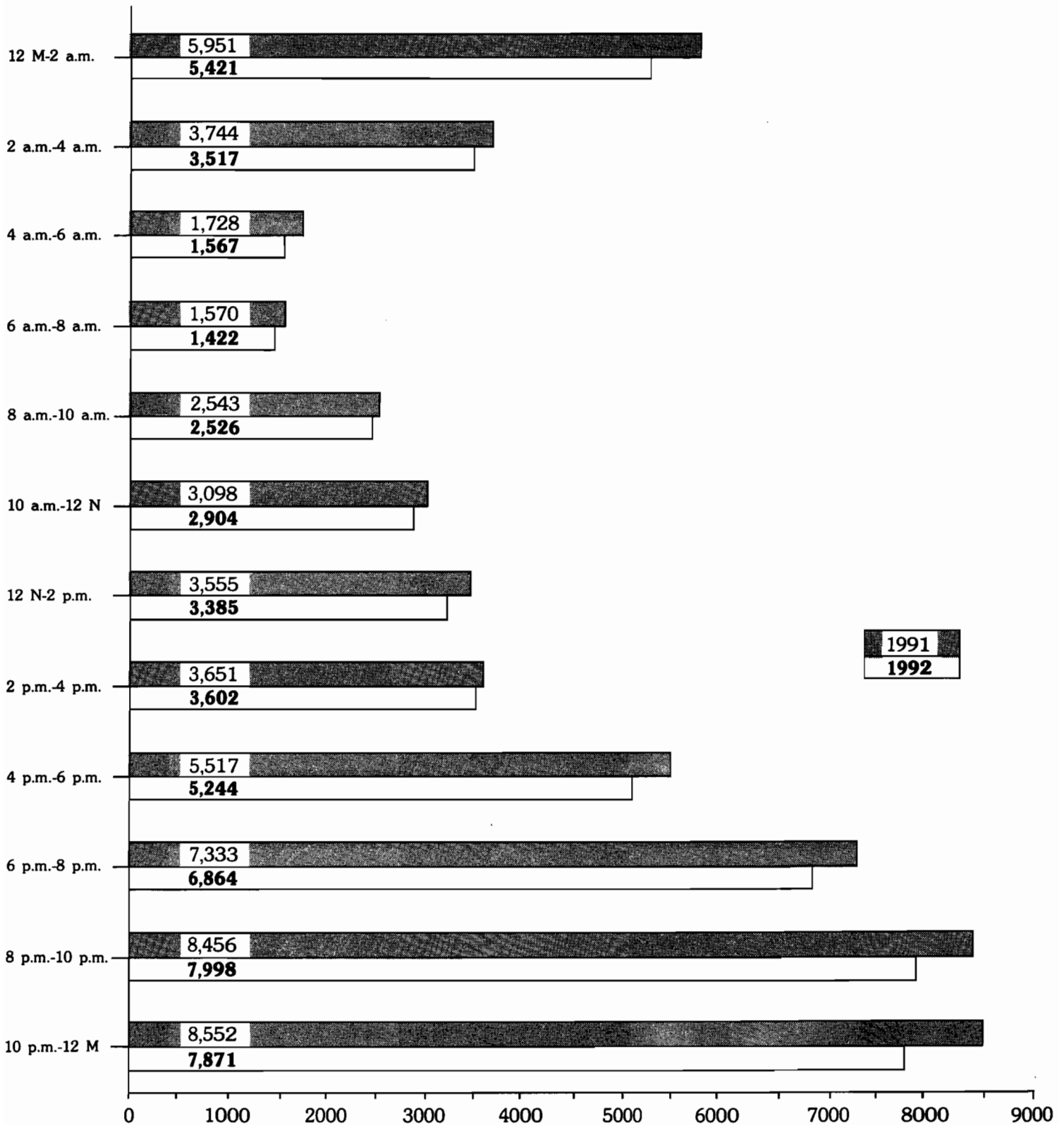

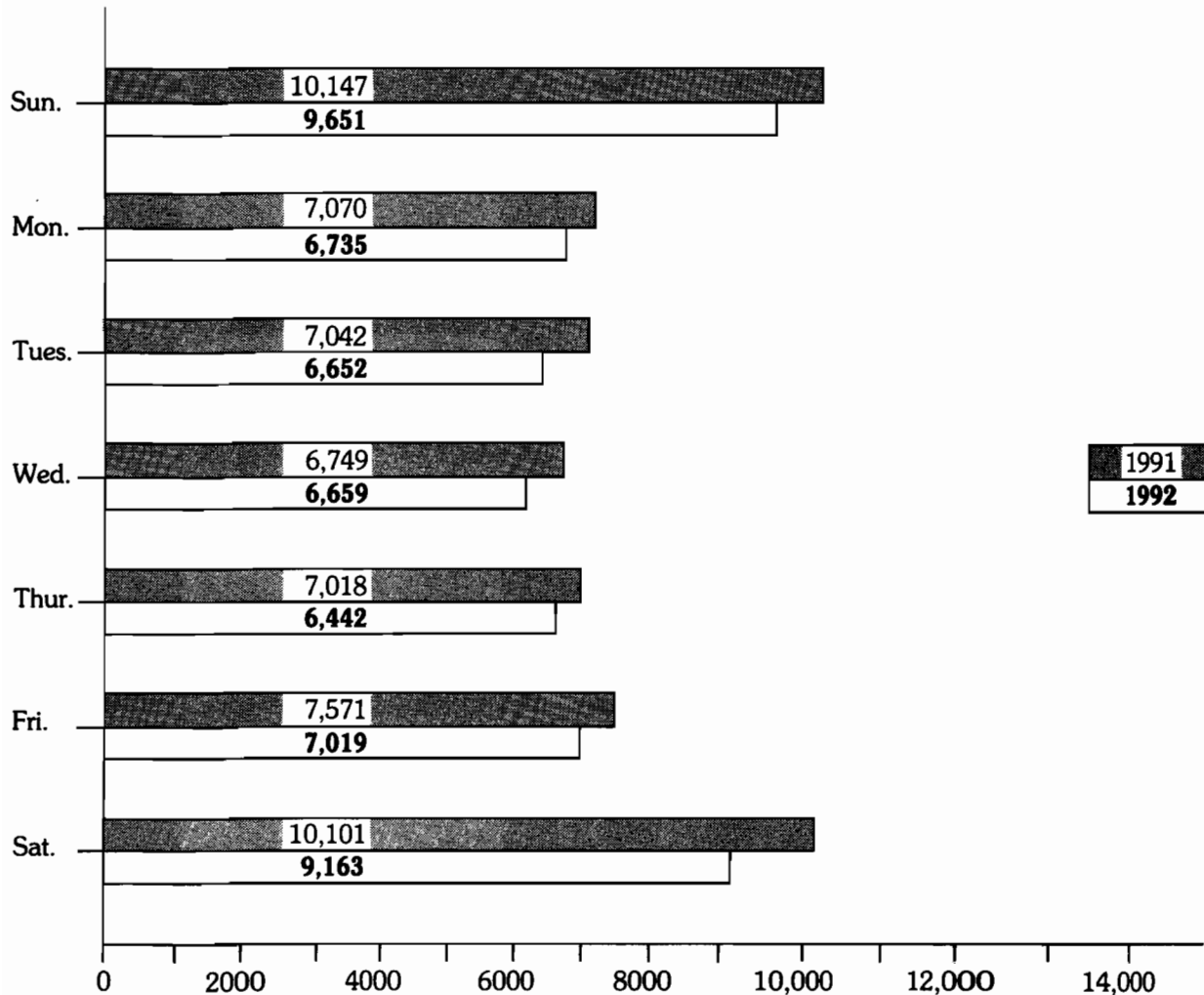
- Assaults accounted for 43% (668) of all domestic violence offenses for victims 60 years of age or over.

## DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY TIME OF DAY 1991/1992



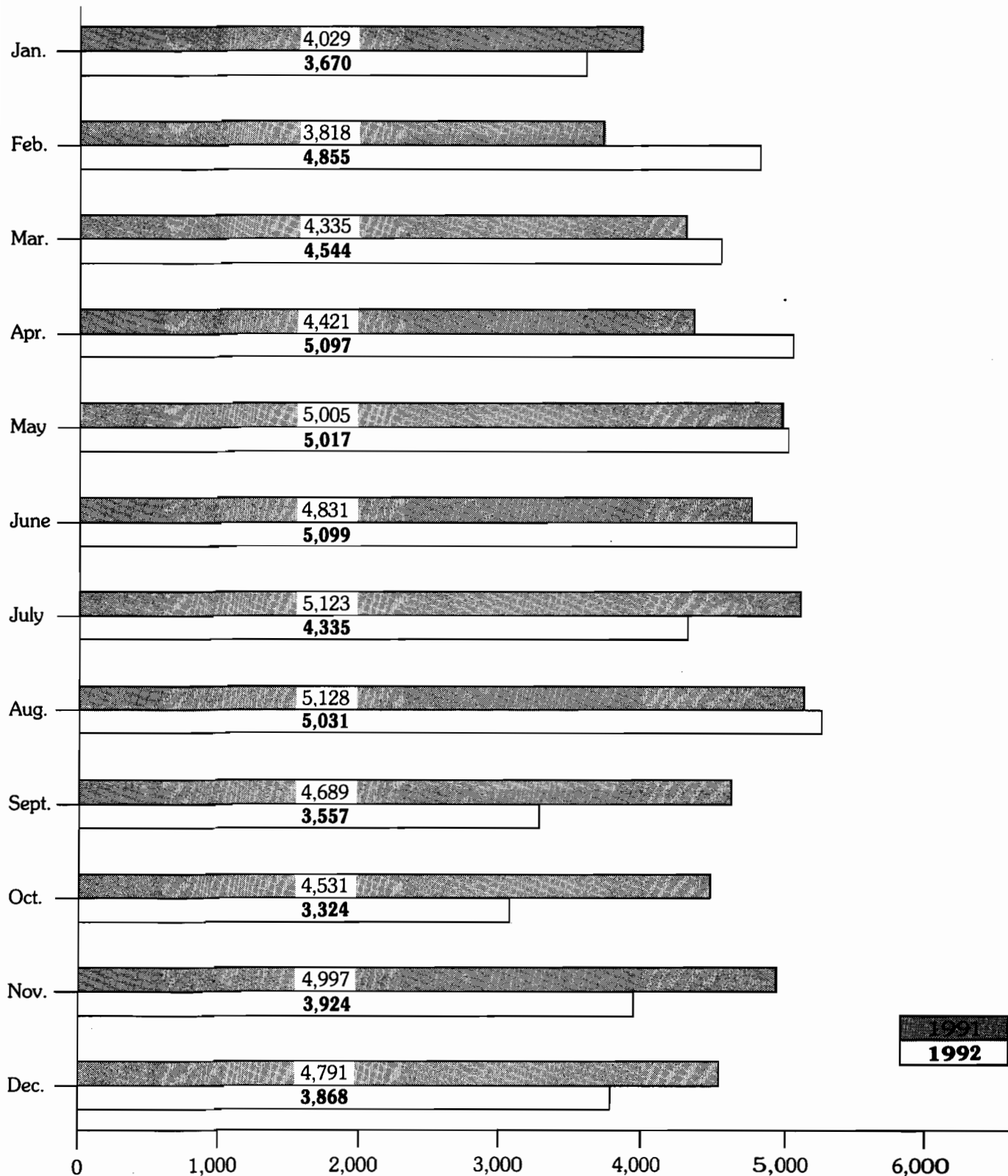
- During 1992 forty-three percent (22,733) of the reported Domestic Violence offenses occurred between 6:00 p.m. and 12 Midnight.

## **INTRODUCTION**

Crimes motivated by hate and bias tend to erode the basic fabric of society. Bias incidents having a racial, religious, ethnic or sexual component manifest themselves in a wide spectrum of criminal activities. These bias incidents jeopardize the active and open pursuit of freedom and opportunity. They attack the racial, religious, ethnic heritage and sexual orientation of our citizens. Closely linked to such heritage are individual values, beliefs and identities.

Realizing that no agency within the state was collecting complete data on bias incidents, a broad-based Ad Hoc committee was created to develop a comprehensive statewide reporting system. As a result of the committee's recommendations, Attorney General Executive Directive No. 1987-3 was issued mandating all New Jersey law enforcement agencies to begin reporting bias incidents to the Division of State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit on a monthly basis, effective January 1, 1988.

The directive was instituted to capture vital data in an effort to identify the problem. This information will permit proper evaluation of progress in preventing bias crime and assist with necessary planning for the future.

This is the fifth annual publication concerning bias crimes, which contains comparisons to the previous year's statistics. The published statistics and graphs are the result of data submitted by the police community of New Jersey.

Hopefully, the information contained in this publication will be of value to various segments of society and serve its intended purpose.

# BIAS INCIDENT

## DEFINITION

*A Bias Incident is defined as any suspected or confirmed offense or unlawful act which occurs to a person, private property, or public property on the basis of race, color, creed, ethnicity, religion or sexual orientation. An offense is bias-based if the motive for the commission of the offense or unlawful act is racial, religious, ethnic or sexually oriented in nature.*

Highlights of the 1992 bias incident offense statistics are listed below:

- There were 1,303 actual bias incident offenses reported by the police in 1992, a 34% increase compared to 1991.
- Harassment accounted for 34% (444) of all bias incident offenses.
- Criminal mischief and damage to property accounted for 30% (394) of all bias incident offenses.
- Racial bias accounted for 57% (747) of all bias crimes in 1992.
- Persons were the target in 878, or 67%, of all bias incident offenses reported.
- The Black race represented the most frequent racial group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 37% (486) of all bias incidents.
- The Jewish religion represented the most frequent religious group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 26% (334) of all bias incidents.
- The Hispanic ethnicity represented the most frequent ethnic group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 6% (78) of all bias incidents.
- The most frequent day of occurrence was Tuesday (218 incidents).
- The most frequent month of occurrence was May (132 incidents).
- The most frequent place of occurrence was a residence, where 30% (387) of all bias incidents occurred.
- Forty-three percent (555) of all bias incident offenses were cleared, with 25% (323) being cleared by arrest, and 18% (232) being exceptionally cleared.
- There were a total of 444 arrests (288 adults and 156 juveniles) made as a result of bias incidents, a 49% increase compared to the 297 (180 adults and 117 juveniles) persons arrested in 1991.
- The involvement of organized hate groups was not substantiated in any of the reported bias incidents.

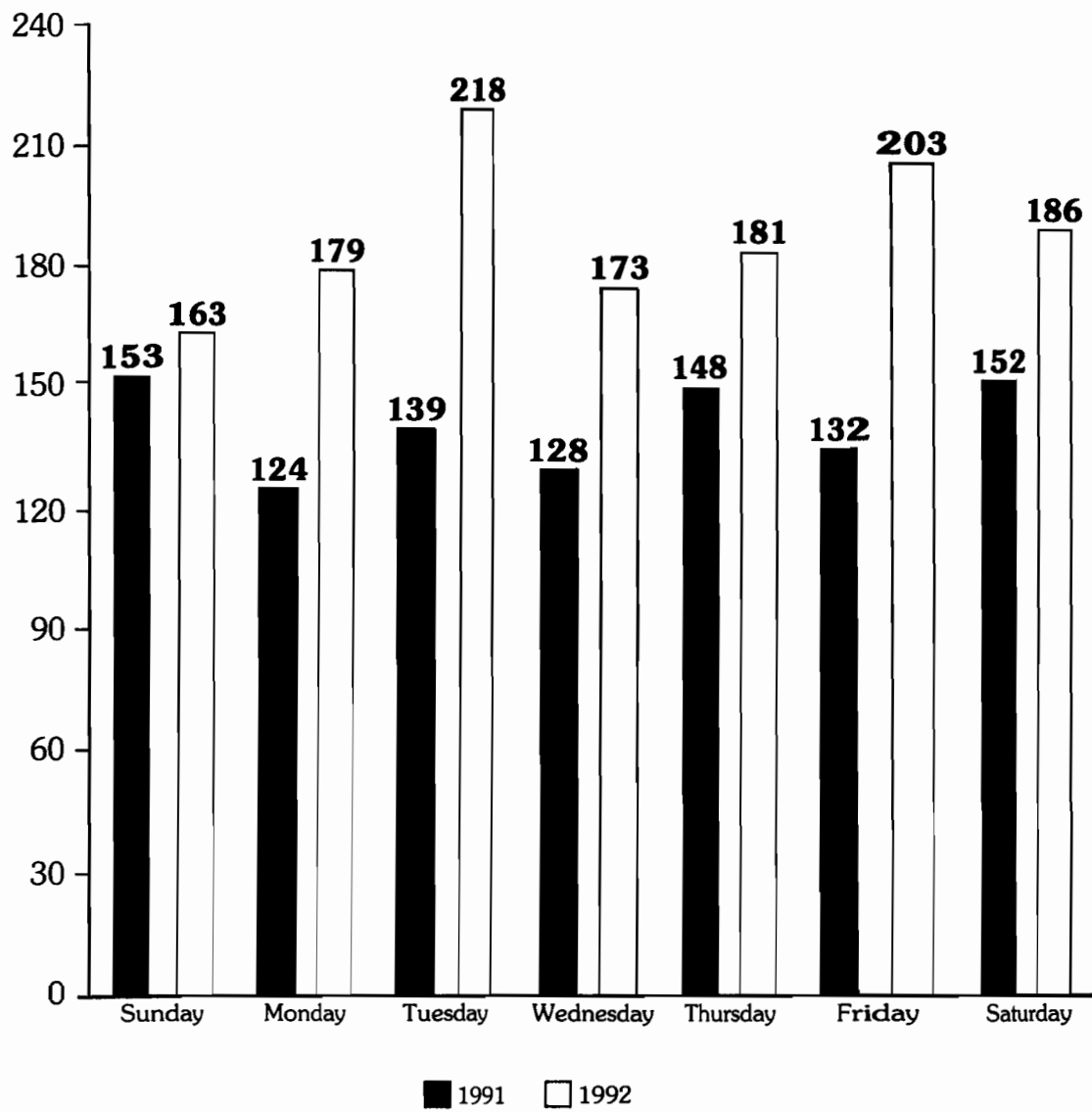

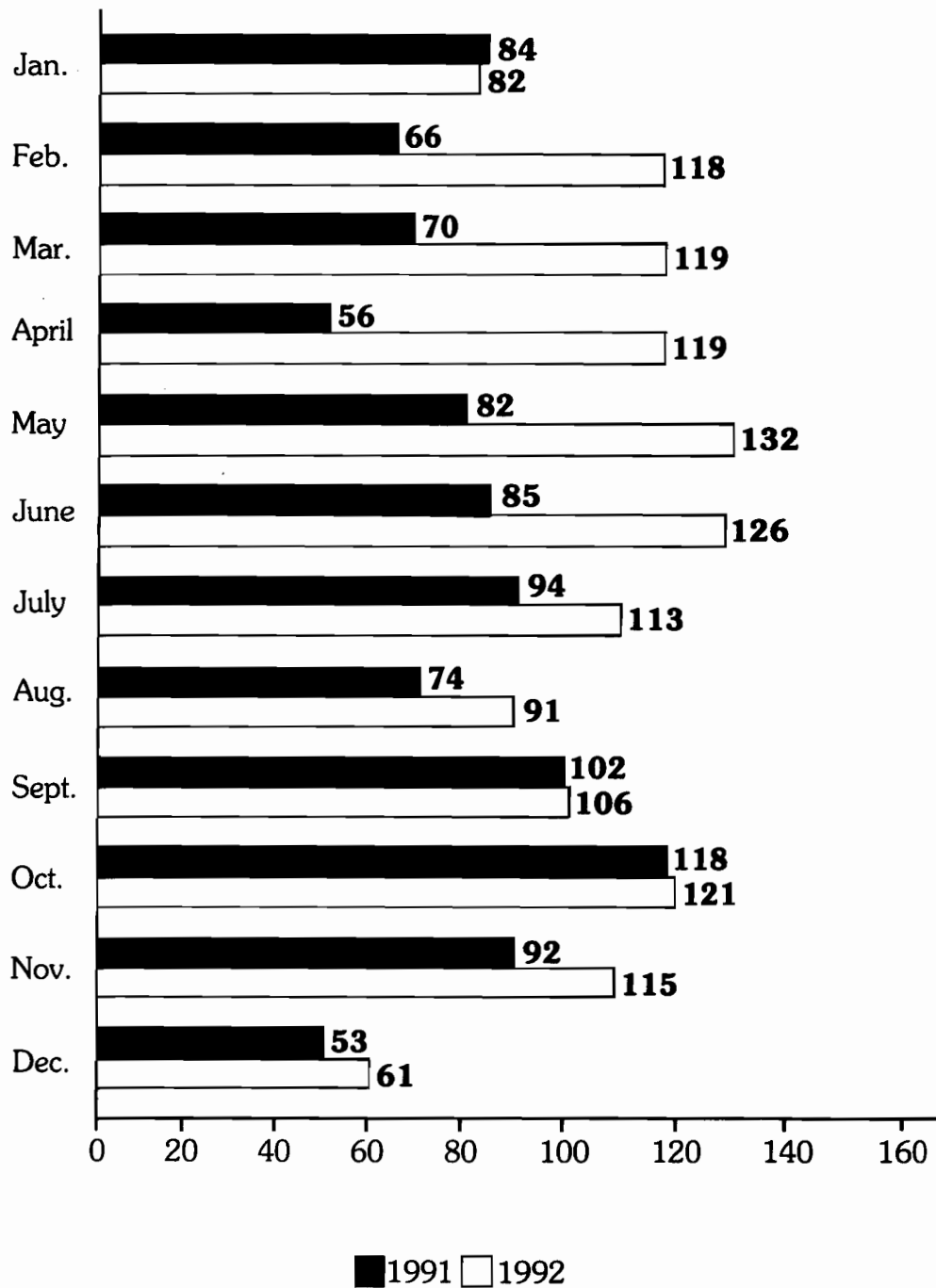

# GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes for example; China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from racial, linguistic, or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared in this manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond police control which prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense you recognize from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

<b>JUVENILE</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
<b>JUVENILE CLEARANCE</b>	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.
<b>NIGHT</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.
<b>NONVIOLENT CRIME</b>	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
<b>UNFOUNDED</b>	Classification of reported crimes that are found to be false or baseless.
<b>VIOLENT CRIME</b>	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
<b>WHITE</b>	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

## CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants.

For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0$  (crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants)

2. **Crime Trend**—A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year.

For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in 1991 and 513 Index offenses in 1992. What is the percent of the increase?

$513 \text{ (1992 Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (1991 Index offenses)} = 249$  (numerical increase)

$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\%$  (percent increase)

Note: If there were more Index offenses in 1991 than in 1992, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police Personnel Per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This is calculated in the same manner as a crime rate.

For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many police officers are there per 1,000 population?

$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4$  (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)

Note: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate**—This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers.

For example: A municipality with 25 officers had 5 of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20$  (police assaulted per 100 police officers).

5. **Clearance Rate**—This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specified period of time.

For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in 1992, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} = .185 \times 100 = 18.5$  (percent cleared).
