Program Summary

The new early voting law, N.J.S.A. 19:15A-1a, establishes an early voting procedure that allows voters to cast an in-person ballot at designated polling sites starting on October 23, 2021. All other provisions of Title 19 remain in effect and apply to early voting, including a voter’s right to challenge ineligibility determinations in Superior Court. DAsG duties to provide legal advice and representation to county boards of elections and superintendents of elections have expanded to encompass the new early voting period. This program will provide deputies with the information they need to represent their clients both during early voting and on Election Day.

Eligibility

This program is mandatory for all Division of Law Deputy and Assistant Attorneys General.

He holds a B.A. from the University of Pennsylvania and a J.D. from the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law of Yeshiva University.
