Program Summary

This presentation will review the recent legislative changes to the decriminalization of marijuana and its impact on criminal prosecutions, including the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory, Enforcement Assistance and Marketplace Modernization Act (CREAMMA), N.J.S.A. 24:6I-31 to -56, and emerging issues related to the new law.

Eligibility

This program is designed for attorneys in the Division of Criminal Justice and county prosecutors' offices. However, it is open to all deputy and assistant attorneys general in the Department of Law and Public Safety. Registrants will receive the course materials prior to the program date.

Faculty

DAG Sarah Hunt is a Deputy Attorney General with the Appellate Bureau of the Division of Criminal Justice where she litigates criminal appeals in the Appellate Division and Supreme Court. She is a member of the Bureau's Pretrial Detention/Speedy Trial Team, and received an Attorney General's Award for Outstanding Contribution to a Special Project for her work on Criminal Justice Reform. Prior to joining the Division, DAG Hunt clerked in the Appellate Division for the Honorable Garry S. Rothstadt, J.A.D. She received a B.A. from Bates College and a J.D. from Rutgers School of Law, Newark, where she was a Managing Notes Editor of the Rutgers Law Review, a Marsha Wenk Public Interest Law Fellow, and a Proskauer Rose Fellow.

DAG Adam Klein is a Deputy Attorney General with the Appellate Bureau of the Division of Criminal Justice, where he litigates criminal appeals in the Appellate Division and Supreme Court. He has tried criminal cases in the Law Division and recently handled a case assigned to a Special Master. DAG Klein has also briefed cases in the United States Courts of Appeals. He is a member of the Division's working group on the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory, Enforcement Assistance, and Marketplace Modernization Act (CREAMMA), and the Bureau's Search and Seizure Team. He is also a member of the New Jersey State Bar Association Cannabis Law Committee. Before joining the Division, DAG Klein was an Assistant Prosecutor with the Camden County Prosecutor's Office and clerked in the Law Division for the Honorable Michele M. Fox, J.S.C. He received a J.D. from Rutgers Law School, where he was a Notes Editor of the Rutgers Journal of Law & Religion.
