Administrative costs cover the partial salary and fringe of the Salem County Division of Mental Health & Addiction Services Senior Outreach Coordinator and the partial salary of the Salem County Overdose Fatality Review Team Coordinator. The Senior Outreach Coordinator strengthens agency relationships, plans and coordinates community outreach 1-2 times weekly, facilitates naloxone trainings and oversees harm reduction education and material distribution throughout the county. The Salem County Overdose Fatality Review Team Coordinator oversees Salem County monthly overdose decedent case reviews, collects and analyzes team recommendations and data, and facilitates partnering community agency relationships to implement recommendations to reduce overdose deaths in Salem County.

We value evidence based and evidence informed practices when creating implementation strategies. The Salem County Opioid Settlement Advisory Council also has and will continue to utilize the list of Opioid Remediation uses.

5	Brief program description:	Salem County Overdose Fatality Review Team was formed in 2020 and continues to expand. The team's goal is, through monthly overdose decedent case review, identify gaps in prevention and intervention and form recommendations to reduce future Salem County overdose deaths. Historically, this program has been underdeveloped due to limited funding.

The mission of the Salem County Overdose Fatality Review Team is, through the review of overdose fatalities, to identify gaps in public systems and social services that if strengthened, could prevent future deaths from drug overdose. This multi-agency/ multi-disciplinary team works to build relationships between local stakeholders and recommend prevention strategies.

	Other:	Key performance indicators vary for each recommendation implemented. For example, for the recommendation of increased harm reduction material distribution and education, number of harm reduction supplies (narcans kits, drug testing strips, drug disposal pouches, etc;) are tracked.

The overall outcome this program aims to achieve is to reduce overdose deaths in Salem County. Through the case reviews that are completed on a monthly basis, recommendations are formed which lead to future implementation. Some of these recommendations include increased harm reduction education and distribution, care coordination improvements, and the continuation of anti-stigmatic materials and outreach. Impact is tracked and measured through quarterly meetings of the OFRT Executive Committee.

Offering Salem County residents recovery supports allows for them to create a firm foundation. Secure, sober living housing has been proven to aide in recovery. This funding covers the initial down payment and first month's rent for a Salem County resident moving into a licensed sober living home or oxford house in NJ. The purpose is to remove the financial barrier to allow them to focus on their recovery during this transitional stage.
21	Please identify the procurement method utilized for this program, describe the procurement process, and explain why the procurement method identified was used for this program.	Salem County Department of Health & Human Services completes an RFP process every 4 years for utilization of funding through DMHAS. Part of this funding is allocated for sober living funding. A contract is awarded to an agency to process checks for sober living funding clients. Due to full utilization of allocated funds, there was a gap in sober living funding. The Opioid Settlement Funds (through the Recovery Supports program) were then able to be used, once previously allocated funding was exhausted.

Education on stigma is also shared. Through this program, Salem County also hosted the first Overdose Awareness Day to remember lives lost and reduce stigma related to substance related passing. As a direct result of the increased community outreach and engagement, we have seen an uptick in utilization of recovery supports and linkages to treatment through the recovery coach hotline.

There were 92 opioid emergency boxes distributed to local schools, bars, businesses and public buildings. There were 26 group naloxone trainings that took place.
