We aim to support the recovery housing system, increase access to trauma-informed MAT, and offer holistic and allied therapies for pregnant and parenting women with SUD. Additionally, targeted outreach in underserved communities is a key focus to ensure comprehensive support and access to services

Additionally, we use community surveillance, gap analysis, and stakeholder engagement to guide our decisions. The County is dedicated to funding only evidence-based or evidence-informed programs with settlement dollars and frequently consults with the Opiate Settlement Advisory Council (OSAC) to ensure effective allocation.

Over the years as the students have been surveyed there is a notable uptick in substance misuse from 8th into 10th grade. When the Health Department began working with the Bernards Township School District to revamp the Youth Summit Day program, it was decided to involve PIP staff to lead the workshop portion, given their expertise in the subject.

Our focus is on prevention and education and to develop and maintain connections with the youth in our community to prevent the usage of drugs and alcohol. We are also focused on providing the support needed to our entire community to focus on developing healthy coping strategies for dealing with stress, as an alternative to using alcohol or other drugs to maintain positive mental health.

Analytics from this platform provides our opioid committee with insights across our population by analyzing trends and patterns to identify areas of need and plan intervention strategies. Examining the Somerset County Community Health Improvement Plan along with data from the NJ State Health Assessment Data as well as input from our local Municipal Alliance all factor into the intervention strategies we are implementing for the future.
