The 16th Annual Pinelands Short Course will feature ten new presentations this coming year. A total of nineteen different presentations will be offered including two field trips at nearby Pinelands locations.

The new presentations include, a Pinelands photography class with Michael Hogan a well-known Pinelands Photographer. History buffs can look forward to learning about the lesser-known New Jersey Revolutionary War history in the Pines.

There are numerous and exciting presentations discussing Pinelands plants and wildlife, including a new presentation on Timber Rattlesnakes.


The Sugar Sand Ramblers will cover Traditional Pinelands Music. There also will be presentations focusing on Pinelands Folk life, and the Traditional Usage of Native Pinelands Plants.

Water resources which are vital to the Pinelands will be showcased in two presentations, one to discuss the Kirkwood-Cohansey Aquifer and another following a drop of water as it travels from the Pinelands to the Ocean.

A new field trip to the Rutgers University, Silas Little Research Station will be offered as well as a tour of Whitesbog Village.

Other presentations included in this year's program are The Health Benefits of Cranberries and Blueberries, Industrial Revolution in the Pinelands, a Pinelands Overview, and Fire Wise.

The Pinelands Short Course flames are still burning bright. Come rekindle the fire in your heart and experience the wild spirit of New Jersey's Pinelands.



Burlington County College Pemberton, New Jersey

From the North

Take New Jersey Turnpike South to Exit 7. Take Route 206 South approximately 9 miles to the intersection with County 530. Turn left and follow 530 through Pemberton to the college.

From the South and West

Use the Benjamin Franklin Bridge from Philadelphia to New Jersey Route 38 or the Walt Whitman Bridge to Interstate 295. From the South, use the Delaware Memorial Bridge to Interstate 295. Interstate 295 intersects with Route 38. Take Route 38 through Mount Holly. Route 38 becomes County 530 in Vincentown. Follow 530 through Pemberton to the college.

From the East

Use New Jersey 72 West to the circle intersecting State Routes 70 and 72. Head toward New Lisbon on Four Mile Rd. (County 646) from the circle until it ends at County 530. turn left at the water tower. The college is the first driveway on your left.

1. Pinelands Overview

William Dunscombe is Chairman of the Department of Biology at Union County College. His lively presentation is an introduction to the ecology and beauty of the New Jersey Pinelands.

2. Health Benefits of Cranberries and Blueberries

Amy Howell is a research scientist at the Rutgers Blueberry and Cranberry Research Center. She offers scientific evidence (recently published in the Journal of the American Medical Association) for why we should include these Pinelands fruits in our daily diet.

3. Pinelands Frogs and Toads

John Bunnell is a research scientist for the Pinelands Commission. His presentation informs us of the ecology of Pine Barren frogs and toads and their use as indicators of environmental conditions.

4. The Jersey Devil

James McCloy co author of *The Jersey Devil*, published in 1976, and *Phantom of the Pines: More Tales of the Jersey Devil*, published in 1998. McCloy's presentation traces the history and folklore of this unique legend.

5. Revolution in the Pines: the NJ Civil War 1775-1783 (New)

Tim Hart, President of the Stafford Historical Society & Thomas Franer, Author of Fighting to be Heard. Their presentation includes descriptions of the Affair at Egg Harbor, Skirmish at Manahawkin, Toms River Blockhouse, Barnegat Light Massacre, and the Battle of Cedar Bridge Tavern, perhaps the last documented land battle of the revolutionary war.

6. Fire Wise (NEW)

Maris Gabliks, State Fire Warden for the NJ Forest Fire Service will discuss how fire in the Pines helps residents and visitors.

7. Pinelands Folklife (NEW)

Angus Gillespie teaches American studies and folklore at Rutgers University and is Director of the New Jersey Folk Festival. He will inform us of the daily life of early Pine Barrens residents.

8. Traditional Use of Native Pinelands Plants (NEW)

Terry O'Leary is Education Coordinator at the New Jersey Forest Resource Education Center. His presentation will focus on the early settlers' diverse uses of indigenous Pinelands plants.

9. Pine Barrens Photography (NEW)

Michael Hogan, Photographer We will cover equipment, film, processing, techniques, digital photography, software for editing, and locations in the Pine Barrens for photography.

10. Timber Rattlesnakes in the New Jersey Pinelands (*NEW*)

Kim J. Laidig, Research Scientist Pinelands Commission. This slide-show presentation will focus on the identification, anatomy, behavior, ecology, and conservation of the only venomous snake species in the Pinelands. Scientific research conducted on the timber rattlesnake in the Pinelands and elsewhere will also be discussed.

11. Research at the Silas Little Research Station (*NEW*)

John Dighton, Director of the Division of Pinelands Research at Rutgers leads a tour of the Silas Little Research Station and explains current investigation into soil organisms and nutrient cycling in the Pines. *(Limited to 30 people)*

12. Rare, Threatened and Endangered Pinelands Plants and their Habitats

Ted Gordon is a rare species specialist and past president of the Philadelphia Botanical Society. He explores rare plants in upland forests, bogs, savannas, pygmy plains, cedar swamps and other unique habitats.

13. Down a Sugar Sand Road (NEW)

The Sugar Sand Ramblers Band, will bring alive the traditional sounds of the Pinelands and pass along their experiences and stories.

14. A Sheltered Existence: Turtles of the Pinelands National Reserve

Christina Watters is a researcher for the Wetlands Institute. She will talk about the nearly twenty species of turtles inhabiting the Pinelands National Reserve.

15. Tour of Whitesbog (Field Trip)

Maria Peter, Program Coordinator of P.I.N.E.S., and her staff conduct a tour of Whitesbog Village and its environs. The tour will include points of both natural and historical interest.

16. Kirkwood-Cohansey Aquifer System (NEW)

Claude Epstein, Professor of Environmental Studies at the Richard Stockton College will explain the flow of water into, through and out of the aquifer. His talk will explain why wetlands and streams exist and how floods are prevented.

17. Industrial Revolution in the Pines

Barry Brady is an archaeologist and planner for the Pinelands Commission. Learn how early industry took root in the Pinelands and changed the natural and cultural map of the region.

18. From the Pinelands to the Ocean (NEW)

Philip Broder, Director of Education for the Wetlands Institute. Learn the interrelationship among ecosystems as his presentation follows a drop of water from the Pinelands down through the salt marsh and out to the Ocean.

19. Pine Barrens to Tropical Forest: Long Distance Migratory Songbirds

Emile DeVito is an ecologist for the New Jersey Conservation Foundation. His talk focuses on Pine Barrens songbirds that overwinter in Neotropical areas.
