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
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Share New Jersey History

Suggested Copy:

Our modern age of computers was made possible by New Jersey researchers.

In 1947, John Bardeen, Walter Brattain, and William Shockley invented the world's first transistor at Bell Labs in Murray Hill, NJ. These tiny devices amplify signals in computers and control the electrical current in electronics. Their small size and powerful abilities allowed for the miniaturization of the computers that run our modern world.

For their work, Bardeen, Brattain, and Shockley won the Noble Prize in 1956. This was one of seven Noble Prizes won by Bell Lab researchers.

The Museum of Early Trades and Crafts (METC) is a history museum working to tell the stories of the people who lived and worked in New Jersey from the colonial era through the age of industrialization. Its exhibits explore and interpret the history and culture of the past, helping visitors understand how it impacts their lives today.

During the 2024 fiscal year, the METC received \$66,300 from the New Jersey Historical Commission as a General Operating Support (GOS) grant. With NJHC support, the METC was able to hire a second museum educator. This allowed the museum to not only update their curriculum materials, but also offer more school tours during peak hours. Since hiring their second educator, the numbers of students who have visited the museum has consistently increased, and METC is now hosting more students in 2024 than they did pre-pandemic.

The GOS program is one important way the NJHC supports history in New Jersey. From FY 2024 to FY 2025, the number of applications for GOS grants doubled. We believe that this is due in part to historic sites preparing for increased visitation during America's 250th in 2026. We are proud to support New Jersey's heritage tourism industry through this critical grant program.

First Sites Selected for the New Jersey Black Heritage Trail

TRENTON, NJ - The New Jersey Historical Commission (NJHC) has selected 32 sites to receive markers for the New Jersey Black Heritage Trail.

Signed into law by Governor Murphy on September 7, 2022, the New Jersey Black Heritage Trail legislation calls for the NJHC to establish a Black Heritage Trail that will "highlight Black heritage sites through historical markers and a trail-like path that connects the stories of Black life and resiliency."

"The Black Heritage Trail will serve an important role in connecting our state's residents and visitors with the complex histories of African Americans in New Jersey," commented Lieutenant Governor Tahesha Way. "We have a responsibility to make all of our histories visible, and I am proud to oversee the New Jersey Historical Commission and its work uplifting these aspects of the American story."

In March, the NJHC Black Heritage Trail team received over 60 responses to their first call for nominations. After passing eligibility and historical accuracy reviews, 32 sites were brought before the New Jersey Historical Commission at their public meeting on April 19th. All of the recommended sites were approved in a unanimous decision.

Historical Briefing: Open Public Records Act

Earlier this month In May 2024, A4045/S2930 was adopted by the New Jersey Legislature, implementing changes to the public process of requesting and accessing government records across the state.
