This month we are sharing the history of the blueberry which was first domesticated here in New Jersey.



Suggested Copy:

In the early 20th century, it was believed that wild blueberries were too small to ever be sold commercially. But in the early 20th century, Elizabeth Coleman White from Whitesbog, NJ and Dr. Frederick Coleville sought to change that.

By crosspollinating different blueberry bushels bearing the largest fruits, White and Coleville produced the first domesticated blueberry in 1916. Over a hundred years later, blueberries are now one of our state's top agricultural products, and blueberry picking is a classic New Jersey summer activity.

Raíces Cultural Center Highland Park, New Jersey



Raíces Cultural Center is a New Jersey nonprofit dedicated to preserving Caribbean and other cultures as reflected in music, art, dance, history and the natural arts. Raíces Cultural Center's principal goal is the investigation, compilation, documentation, preservation, and dissemination of traditional Caribbean culture in New Jersey through art, history, and ecology.

During the 2024 fiscal year, the Raíces Cultural Center received \$24,513 from the New Jersey Historical Commission as an Inclusive History Grant to conduct oral histories as part of their Ancestral Herbal Narratives Project. This project documents and shares stories, narratives, histories, and memories of herbalists and healers from

diverse cultural backgrounds and healing traditions.

In a recent interview, Nicole Wines shared, "We applied because we knew that we would be included... we saw that there was a funder that could see the importance, and so we went for it, and it helped to support our people to be able to do the work that we do."




Registration for the 5K includes a shirt, commemorative magnet, and medal. Registration for the family fun walk will include a shirt and a commemorative magnet.

Call for Proposals: New Jersey History Conference
Due August 23, 2024



The New Jersey Historical Commission and RevolutionNJ will host the 2024 New Jersey History Conference, in partnership with the Eagleton Institute of Politics, on December 3, 2024, at the Rutgers - New Brunswick campus.

This year's theme, *Imperfectly Civil: History of Politics and Civics in New Jersey*, will examine how New Jerseyans have historically engaged with civic life through elections, public debates, activism, and beyond in addition to exploring how the history and public history fields can support democracy today.

NJHC Announces FY25 GOS, Project, Co-Sponsored Project, and CHPP Grant Recipients

After a competitive round of applications, the New Jersey Historical Commission has announced its Fiscal Year 2025 grant recipients encompassing an array of programs to support historical organizations, museums, historic sites, archives, individuals, and county re-grant agencies across the state.

The \$5.2 million in will support the NJHC's General Operating Support (GOS) program, which covers a range of operational expenses for qualified history organizations; Projects and Co-Sponsored Projects, which includes New Jersey-based historical research, exhibits, programs, and archival work; and the County History Partnership Program (CHPP), which provides all 21 counties with funding for local history groups statewide.

New Jersey Winners of the America's Field Trip Contest



RevolutionNJ and America250 have announced that five students from New Jersey were selected as inaugural "America's Field Trip" firstplace awardees.

America's Field Trip is a nationwide scholastic contest encouraging students to reflect on what America means to them, with first-place awardees receiving special behind-the-scenes experiences at iconic American historical and cultural sites. Thousands of students across the country sent in inspiring submissions responding to the prompt "What does America mean to you?" Out of those submissions, 5 New Jersey students were named first-place awardees, and 8 New Jersey students were selected as second-place awardees, receiving a \$500 cash award.
