

This month we are uplifting Celia Cruz and her contributions to Latin music in the United States.

In honor of National Hispanic Heritage Month, we are sharing the story of the Queen of Salsa herself, Celia Cruz.

Cruz was born in Cuba in 1925. Cruz's big break came at the age of 25 when she became the lead singer of La Sonora Matancera. While on an international tour, the band denounced the Castro regime. This led to Cruz and her husband leaving Cuba and settling in New Jersey where she would reside the rest of her life.

Cruz was known for her beautiful voice, colorful costumes, and prolific artistry. She was also known for her signature "¡Azúcar!" shout. These moments were both a punction in her performance style and a tribute to the enslaved Africans who built Cuba's wealth through their labor on


sugar plantations.

The Absecon Lighthouse in Atlantic City is one of the oldest lighthouses in the country and the tallest lighthouse in our state. Opened in 1857, the lighthouse has undergone a multi-million-dollar restoration through which they created a stunning replica of the Lightkeeper's dwelling, an educational museum, and a Fresnel Lens exhibit in the original Oil House and expansive grounds.

In Fiscal Year 2024, the Absecon Lighthouse received \$30,077 from an NJHC General Operating Support grant. This support enabled them to dedicate staff to their educational programs, school tours, family field trips, and all other fundraising events. The funding is vital to their continuation as a cultural destination in Atlantic City year-round, but

particularly during the summer, when they are open daily from late June through early September to accommodate visitors to their seaside community.

The **Families First Discovery Pass** program provides families and individuals enrolled in state assistance programs with free or highly discounted admission to arts and history organizations, venues, and programs - both in-person and virtual.

Under this initiative, we encourage historical organizations to sign up to offer discounted or free admission and/or virtual registration to individuals and families with a Families First card or eWIC card. We

work with all participating organizations to provide guidance on implementation of the program.

The Families First Discovery Pass Program is a collaboration between the State Council on the Arts, the Historical Commission, the Department of Human Services, and the Department of Health.

Connecting Youth to the 250th


