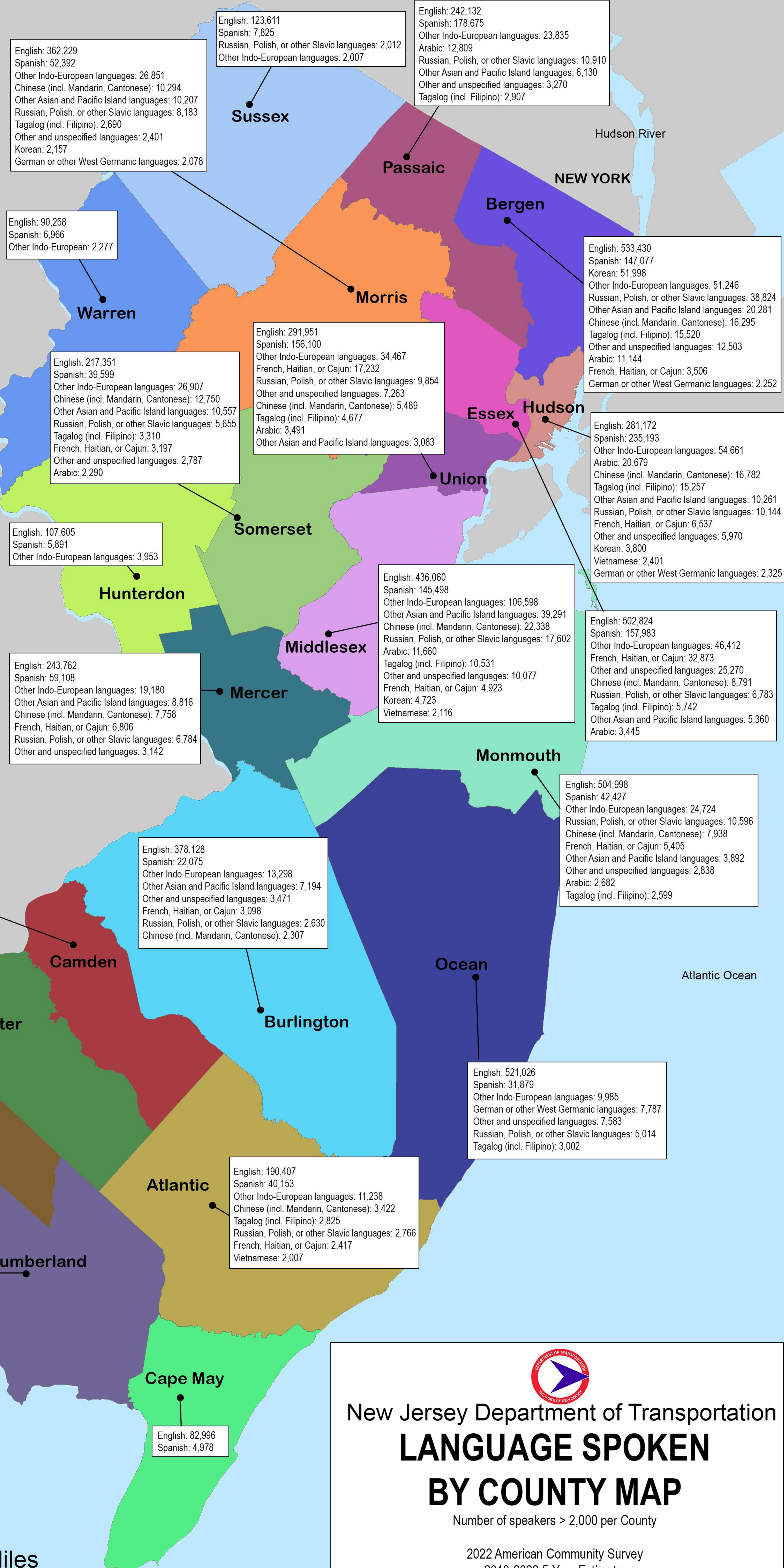

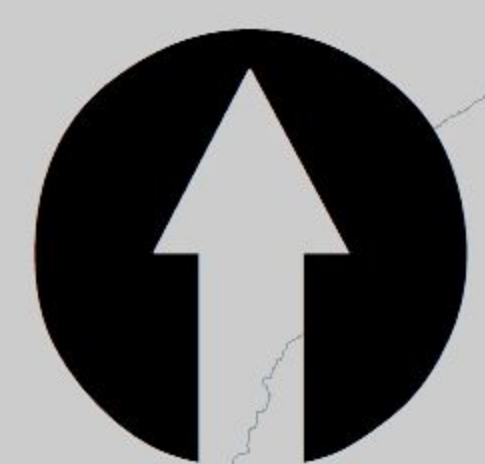
Note: The U.S. Census Bureau gathers data on languages spoken at home for all individuals though data may be aggregated due to confidentiality and sample sizes. Examples of aggregated languages include: Other and unspecified languages (Hungarian, Jamaican Creole English, and Unspecified); Other languages of Asia (Burmese, Karen, Turkish, Uzbek); and Other Native languages of North America (Apache languages, Cherokee, Lakota, Tohono O'odham, Yupik languages), among others. Haitian and some French-based creoles of the Caribbean that are generally mutually intelligible are categorized as Haitian by the Census Bureau. These include Guadeloupe Creole French and Saint Lucian Creole French. French-based creole languages that are not intelligible with Haitian are grouped in "Other and unspecified languages." Beginning in 2016, "Patois" is usually coded by the Census Bureau as Jamaican Creole English unless a more appropriate code is indicated.
